## **STANDARD CONDITIONS OF TENDER (Goods / Services)**

### **1. DEFINITIONS**

#### **General:**

- (1) Defined words / phrases are printed in *Italic font*.
- (2) Definitions apply to the singular as well as the plural.
- (3) Any reference to the masculine gender shall be taken to include the feminine and any reference to the feminine gender shall be taken to include the masculine.
- (4) The words “bid” and “tender”, and “bidder” and “tenderer” can be used interchangeably.
- (5) All definitions as defined in the ***General Conditions of Contract*** are applicable to these ***Standard Conditions of Tender***. These definitions include:

  - 2) “Contract”
  - 3) “Contract Price”
  - 4) “Corrupt practice”
  - 5) “Countervailing duties”
  - 6) “Country of origin”

- (6) **Bid or Tender:** The offer submitted in respect of an invitation to submit such an offer.
- (7) **Bidder or Tenderer:** An entity (company, close corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietor) which submits a *bid/tender*.
- (8) **Municipality:** The eThekweni Municipality, as represented by the duly authorised delegate, official or committee.
- (9) **SCT:** Special Conditions of Tender (found in Section 3).
- (10) **Week:** A period of seven (7) consecutive *days*.
- (11) **Material Deviation:** A material deviation or qualification is one which, in the *Municipality's* opinion, would:
  - (a) Detrimentially affect the scope, quality, or performance of the services or supply identified in the Scope;
  - (b) Significantly change the *Municipality's* or the *Tenderer's* risks and responsibilities under the contract; or
  - (c) Affect the competitive position of other *Tenderers* presenting responsive *tenders*, if it were to be rectified.

### **2. CONDITIONS OF TENDER & CONTRACT**

The specification will be governed by the ***Standard Conditions of Tender*** (Goods and Services), ***Special Conditions of Tender (SCT)***, ***General Conditions of Contract (GCC)*** (Government Procurement General Conditions (July 2010), as amended by National Treasury Circular 52 dated 30 July 2010), the ***Special Conditions of Contract (SCC)***, the ***Occupational Health and Safety Act*** (Act No. 85 of 1993), and the ***eThekweni Code of Conduct***.

#### **Complete Acceptance of Conditions**

Unless otherwise expressly stipulated in a letter covering the *tender*, every *Tenderer* shall be deemed to have waived, renounced, and abandoned any conditions printed or written upon any stationery used for the purpose of, or in connection with, the submission of their *tender*, which are in conflict with the ***General Conditions of Contract*** and ***Special Conditions of Contract***. *Tenderers* are advised that any *material divergences / qualifications* from the official Conditions or Specification will render their *tenders* liable to disqualification.

### **3. TENDER INFORMATION**

#### **(1) General**

- (a) *Tenders* will be liable for rejection unless made out on the official tendering documentation.
- (b) Any alterations effected upon any of the tendering documents must be clearly shown by means of a hand written (black, non-erasable ink), or typed, entry and must be signed in full by the *Tenderer*. **The use of correction fluid is not permitted.**
- (c) *Tenderers* may submit alternative solutions that, in the *Tenderer's* opinion, are to the *Municipality's* advantage economically and technically. Full technical details of the alternative *tender(s)* shall be submitted with the tender documents. Alternative *tender(s)* shall be submitted separately.

#### **(2) Obtaining Tender Documentation**

All tenders must be submitted on official tender documentation issued (either in hard copy or in electronic format) by the eThekweni Municipality. Electronically downloaded documentation (obtainable free of charge) should be printed and bound by tenderer. Hard copy versions are available as indicated on the tender notice, for the non-refundable tender charge as indicated in the ***SCT*** (payment by Bank Cheques (where the Drawer of the Cheque is the Bank) OR cash). Tender documents must be collected no later than 3 days prior to close of tender.

#### **(3) Queries Relating to this Tender**

Queries can be directed to the person / Department as stated in the ***SCT***.

#### **(4) Briefing Session (Clarification Meeting)**

Details of the briefing session are stated in the ***SCT***. Failure to attend a ***compulsory*** briefing session will invalidate the *tender*. *Tenderers* must sign the attendance list in the name of the tendering entity. Tenders will only be evaluated from those tendering entities appearing on the attendance list.

**(5) Closing Date and Delivery of Tender Submissions**

Sealed *tenders* made out on the enclosed Official Tender Form, which shall be signed by or on behalf of the *Tenderer*, and addressed to the Head: Supply Chain Management Unit, marked with the appropriate Tender number, must be placed in the **Tender Box** as stated in the **SCT** not later than the **date and time** as stated in the **SCT**, where after they will be opened publicly.

All tender documents **must** be placed directly into the Tender Box and should not be delivered to any other Municipal Department. *Bidders* are advised that *tenders* submitted by post, fax or email **will not** be considered. All couriered documents must be placed directly into the Tender Box and should not be delivered to any other Municipal Department.

Any *tender* received after the closing date and time stated for the receipt thereof **shall not** be accepted for consideration and shall be returned to the *Tenderer*.

**(6) Tender Validity and Withdrawal of Tenders**

*Tenders* must hold good until 16:00 of the 5th week following the date on which *tenders* are opened, or during such other period as may be specified in the **SCT**. The *Municipality* may, during the period for which *tenders* are to remain open for acceptance, authorize a *Tenderer* to withdraw their *tender* in whole or in part on condition that the *Tenderer* pays to the *Municipality* on demand, a sum of one thousand Rand (R1,000.00). The *Municipality* may, if it thinks fit, waive payment of such sum in whole or in part.

**4. RETURNABLE SCHEDULES, FORMS, CERTIFICATES**

Each *Tenderer* shall complete fully and accurately the following documents and submit these documents with the *tender*:

- (1) **Authority of Signatory:** In terms of Clause 4(10)(c) of the Conditions of Tender.
- (2) **Declaration of Municipal Fees:** Only those *Bidders* whose municipal fees are fully paid, or those that have concluded acknowledgement of debt agreements with the *Municipality*, are eligible to *tender*.  
All *Bidders* must sign the Declaration of Municipal Fees returnable form, declaring that their municipal fees are in order or that acknowledgement of debt agreements have been concluded, and include the relevant account numbers in the declaration. Failure to include account numbers or sign will invalidate the *tender*. The completion of the declaration is also applicable to *Bidders* outside of the eThekweni Municipal Area.
- (3) **Declaration with respect to the Occupational Health and Safety Act:** Acceptance of undertaking in terms of the Occupational Health and Safety Act (Act 85 of 1993) and the relevant Regulations.
- (4) **Consolidated Municipal Bidding Documents** (which includes):
  - **MBD 2:** Tax Clearance Certificate Requirements: *Bidders* are to include with their tender submission a valid (at time of tender closing), tax clearance certificate OR Tax Clearance Status PIN, which has sufficient validity to ensure that the tender process is adequately covered. Non-submission, or submission of an expired certificate/TCS PIN, will preclude *Bidders* from the tender process.
  - **MBD 4:** Declaration of Interest: All *Bidders* are to sign the Declaration of Interest wherein they declare any relationship that may exist with an official of the *Municipality* involved in the evaluation process.

Regulation 44 of the Supply Chain Management Regulations states that a *Municipality* or *Municipal Entity* may not make any award to a person:

- (i) Who is in the service of the state;
- (ii) If that person is not a natural person, of which any Director, Manager, Principal, Shareholder or Stakeholder is a person in the service of the state; or
- (iii) Who is an advisor or consultant contracted with the *Municipality* or *municipal entity*.

Should a contract be awarded and it is subsequently established that Regulation 44 has been breached, the *Municipality* shall have the right to terminate the contract with immediate effect.

- **MBD 5:** Declaration for Procurement Above R10 Million (if applicable): For all procurement expected to exceed R10 million (all applicable taxes included), tenderers must complete this questionnaire.  
If the bidder is required by law to prepare annual financial statements for auditing, the bidder must submit their audited annual financial statements:

- i) for the past three years; or
- ii) since their establishment if established during the past three years.

If the bidder is not required by law to prepare audited financial statements, then the bidder must submit a Public Interest (PI) Score, whereby if the PI score is above 350 points then the bidder must submit audited financial statements.

- **MBD 6.1:** Preference Points Claim Form: For the awarding of Preference Points, *Bidders* are required to complete the attached MBD 6.1 form and return it with their tender submission. Failure on the part of a tenderer to submit a B-BBEE Verification Certificate from a Verification Agency accredited by the South African Accreditation System (SANAS), or a Sworn Affidavit for an EME, or sworn affidavit for a QSE (in line with the revised BBBEE codes of Good Practice), together with the bid will be interpreted to mean that preference points for B-BBEE status level of contribution are not claimed.

The *Municipality* reserves the right to require of a tenderer, either before a bid is adjudicated or at any time subsequently, to substantiate any claim in regard to preferences, in any manner required by the *Municipality*.

- **MBD 6.2:** Declaration Certificate for Local Production and Content for Designated Sector: If this tender is subject to "Local Content and Production", the tenderer must complete and sign MBD 6.2 and attach Annexure C (of SATS 1286:2011).
- **MBD 8:** Declaration of *Bidders* Past Supply Chain Management Practices Form: This form serves as a declaration to be used by *municipalities* and *municipal entities* in ensuring that when goods and services are being procured, all reasonable steps are taken to combat the abuse of the supply chain management system.
- **MBD 9:** Certificate of Independent Bid Determination: Section 4(1)(b)(iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, prohibits an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms if it involves collusive tendering or tender rigging. In order to give effect to this, the Certificate of Bid Determination must be completed and submitted with the tender.



(5) **Official Tender Form** (see Section 9)

- **Legal Status of Tenderer**

It is essential for the purpose of entering into a legal contract that *Bidders* state on the Official Tender Form, under "Name and Address of Tenderer", their full legal status:

- 1 the full registered name of the company making a *tender*; or
- 2 if the *Tenderer* is a person conducting business under a recognised trading name then:
  - State the name of the person(s);
  - State recognised trading name; and
  - State whether an owner, co-owner, proprietor, etc.

(b) **Signing of Official Tender Form**

Failure of a *Tenderer* to complete, in its entirety, and sign the Official Tender Form will invalidate the *tender*.

(c) **Authority of Signatory**

*Bidders* are to complete and sign the Authority of Signatory returnable document, and attach the required additional documents.

(d) **Differences or Discrepancies**

Should there be any difference or discrepancy between the prices or price contained in the Official Tender Form and those contained in any covering letter from the *Tenderer*, the prices or price contained in the Official Tender Form shall prevail.

(6) **Any additional Schedules, Forms, or Certificates as stated in the SCT.**5. **INFORMATION TO BE SUPPLIED REGARDING SUB-CONTRACTORS**

*Bidders* are to state in their *tenders*, or covering letters, whether, if the contract were to be awarded to them, the whole of the work would be executed by them in their own workshop / factory. If the answer is in the negative, they are required to state which part(s) would be handed to sub-contractors and the name and address of such sub-contractors.

6. **SAMPLES**

*Bidders* may be required to state where samples of the full range of products can be inspected or be required to submit samples for inspection prior to the closing date of the *tender*.

7. **MANUFACTURERS**

The names of the manufacturers of the goods or equipment offered must be stated in the *tender*.

*Bidders* who are not manufacturers, accredited distributors, or agents must provide a valid agreement / Joint Venture Agreement, entered into with the manufacturer, accredited distributors, or agents, with their submission. This agreement must meet all the requirements as laid down in the *tender* document, and must cover the contract period.

8. **CLARIFICATION**

The Head: Supply Chain Management Unit, or an authorized representative, may request clarification or further information on any aspect of the *tender*. The *Tenderer must* supply the requested information within the time specified. Failure to comply will render the *tender* non-responsive.

9. **PRICING**

*Bidders* would be precluded from this *tender* if their pricing structure deviates from the Official Tender Form.

- **Nett Prices**

All prices shall be quoted in South African currency (Rand) after deduction of any brokerage or discount allowed to the Municipality.

- **Unit Prices**

*Bidders* shall quote only one price in respect of each item. Such price is to hold good for the full duration of the contract period, being subject to variation only in accordance with specified criteria, as stated in the **Conditions of Contract**.

- **Firm Tenders**

*Bidders* may submit firm prices for each 12 month period. These prices shall be free from all fluctuations, including any statutory increases.

- **Value Added Tax (V.A.T)**

Prices exclusive and inclusive of VAT must be stated separately on the Official Tender Form.

10. **ESTIMATED QUANTITIES**

The estimated quantities are set out in Section 8 : Bill of Quantities / Schedule of Rates/Activities which forms part of the official tender documents. The quantities are stated purely for the information of the *Bidders* and are in order to ascertain an estimated total contract price. The *Supplier* will, however, be bound to supply whatever quantity or quantities the *Municipality* may actually require, and may be in excess or less than the estimated quantities stated.

11. **DELIVERY, RISK, PACKAGES, ETC**

- (1) Unless otherwise provided, all goods are to be supplied only against the form of order issued by the *Municipality*.
- (2) *Bidders* shall quote a unit price which shall include delivery to the specified delivery point, as stated in the **SCT**.
- (3) The risk in all goods purchased by the *Municipality* under the contract shall remain with the *Supplier* until such goods shall have been duly delivered.
- (4) *Bidders* shall clearly state the period within which delivery will be made after receipt of the official order, as this may be material in the adjudication of the *tender*.



**12. RATES OF EXCHANGE**

- (1) Where the goods are imported the *Supplier* shall, within seven days of date of official Purchase Order, arrange through their bankers for the foreign commitment to be covered forward down to the Rand in order to fix the rate of exchange. The *Supplier* shall notify the *Municipality* as soon as possible thereafter regarding the rate which has been fixed on such forward exchange.

Any increase or decrease between the basic rate of exchange as at a date seven days prior to the date of closing of *tenders* and that existing at the date of establishment of the forward exchange cover within the period stipulated above shall be paid or deducted by the Municipality. Upon the failure of the *Supplier* to arrange forward exchange cover, the *Supplier* shall be liable should there be any increase in the basic rate of exchange occurring after the last mentioned date.

The bank charges incurred in obtaining the forward exchange cover shall be for the *Municipality's* account.

- (2) The *Supplier* shall on request:
- Submit documentary proof of the rate of exchange; and
  - When an adjustment is claimed in terms of this sub-clause, whether by the *Supplier* or the *Municipality*, submit documentary proof to the satisfaction of the Deputy City Manager: Treasury in respect of such claim.

**13. IMPORT PERMITS**

- In order to minimise special importation, *Bidders* should, where possible, have recourse to local suppliers and / or manufacturers.
  - Bidders* must state whether their *tender* is dependent upon the issue of a special import permit or whether they are able to supply the goods by making use of the import facilities available to them.
- (3) In the event of a *tender* being dependent upon the issue of a special import permit, application for such special import permit shall be made by the *Tenderer*, unless otherwise provided for in the [SCT](#).

**14. EVALUATION PROCESS**

The procedure for evaluation of responsive Tender Offers will be in accordance with the eThekweni Municipality's current SCM Policy and the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act (5 of 2000), and the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act Regulations (January 2017).

**Details of additional evaluation criteria, if applicable, are stated in the [SCT](#).**

Evaluation points for price and preference will only be calculated for *Bidders* who comply with the contractual and technical specification, and if applicable, have attained the minimum Functionality Score as stated in the [SCT](#).

The evaluation process of responsive *tenders* will be as follows:

- Score each *tender* in respect of the financial offer made and preferences claimed (if any);
- Calculate the total number of evaluation points ( $T_{EV}$ ) in accordance with the following formula:  
 $T_{EV} = N_{FO} + N_P$  where:  $N_{FO}$  : is the number of evaluation points awarded for the financial offer; and  $N_P$  : is the number of evaluation points awarded for preferences claimed.
- Rank *tenders* from the highest number of evaluation points to the lowest.
- Recommend the *Tenderer* with the highest number of evaluation points for the award of the contract, unless there are compelling and justifiable reasons not to do so.
- Rescore and re-rank all *Bidders* should there be compelling and justifiable reasons not to recommend the *Tenderer* with the highest number of evaluation points, and recommend the *Tenderer* with the highest number of evaluation points, unless there are compelling and justifiable reasons not to do so, and the process set out in this sub-clause is repeated.

**(1) Evaluation points awarded for the financial offer:**

The financial offer will be scored using the formula:

$$N_{FO} = W \left( 1 - \frac{P - P_m}{P_m} \right)$$

Where the value of W is:

- 90** where the financial value inclusive of VAT of all responsive *tenders* received have a value in excess of R 50,000,000; OR  
**80** where the financial value inclusive of VAT of one or more responsive *tenders* offers have a value that equals or is less than R 50,000,000;
- P<sub>m</sub>** is the comparative offer of the most favourable comparative offer; and
- P** is the comparative offer of the *tender* offer under consideration.

**(2) Evaluation points awarded for preference:**

Up to 100 minus W (see (1) above) tender evaluation points will be awarded for preference to *Bidders* who attain the BBEE status level of contributor in accordance with the table below:

**15. BRIBERY AND COMMUNICATION WITH COUNCILLORS / OFFICIALS****(1) Bribery**

No *Tenderer* shall offer, promise or give to any person or person connected with a *tender* or the awarding of a contract, any gratuity, bonus or discount etc, in connection with the obtaining of a contract.

**(2) Communication, Councillors and Officials**

A *Tenderer* shall not in any way communicate with a member of the *Municipality* or with any official of the *Municipality* on a question affecting any contract for the supply of goods or for any work, undertaking or services which is the subject of a *tender* during the period between the closing date for receipt of *tenders* and the dispatch of the written notification of the *Municipality's* decision on the award of the contract; provided that a *Tenderer* shall not hereby be precluded:

- (a) At the request of the Head: SCM Unit, or an authorized representative, from furnishing him with additional information or with a sample or specimen for testing purposes or otherwise from giving a demonstration so as to enable the recommendation to the Bid Committee on the award of the contract to be formulated;
- (b) From obtaining from the Head : SCM Unit, or an authorised representative, information as to the date upon which the award of the contract is likely to be made, or, after the decision upon the award has been made by the *Municipality* or any Committee to which the *Municipality* has delegated its powers, information as to the nature of the decision or such information as was publicly disclosed at the opening of *tenders* or from submitting to the Accounting Officer in writing any communication relating to their *tender* or the award of the contract or a request for leave to withdraw their *tender*; and
- (c) Provided further that nothing contained herein shall be construed so as to prevent information being sought and obtained from an Official in regard to any decision taken at an open Municipal meeting, or any Committee to which the *Municipality* has delegated its powers.

A contravention of subsection (1) and / or (2), or an attempt to contravene such subsection, shall be reported to the Accounting Officer, who may on receipt of such report disqualify the *tender* of the *Tenderer* concerned.

**16. NEGOTIATIONS WITH PREFERRED BIDDERS**

The *Municipality* reserves the right to invoke Regulation 24 of Municipal Finance Management Act if required.

- (1) The Accounting Officer may negotiate the final terms of a contract with *Bidders* identified through a competitive tendering process as preferred *Bidders*, provided that such negotiation:
  - Does not allow any preferred *Tenderer* a second or unfair opportunity;
  - Is not to the detriment of any other *Tenderer* ; and
  - Does not lead to a higher price than the *tender* as submitted.
- (2) Minutes of such negotiations must be kept for record purposes.
- (3) Such negotiation may be delegated by the Accounting Officer.

**17. CANCELLATION OF TENDER PROCESS**

The municipality is entitled to cancel the tender at any time before the award of a tender and the decision to cancel the tender shall be published in the same manner in which the original tender invitation was advertised. The Municipality shall, in no way, be liable for any damages whatsoever, including, without limitation, damages for loss of profit, in any way connected with the cancellation of this bid.

**18. ACCEPTANCE OF BID**

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**1. Definitions**

The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:

- a. "Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
- b. "Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
- c. "Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
- d. "Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of anything of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
- e. "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
- f. "Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
- g. "Day" means calendar day.
- h. "Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
- i. "Delivery ex stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
- j. "Delivery into consignee's store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the goods are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
- k. "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad markets its goods on its own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.
- l. "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- m. "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- n. "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- o. "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- p. "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the goods covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- q. "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price, which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- r. "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- s. "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- t. "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- u. "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- v. "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- w. "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- x. "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.
- y. "Supplier" means the successful bidder who is awarded the contract to maintain and administer the required and specified service(s) to the State.
- z. "Tort" means in breach of contract.
- aa. "Turnkey" means a procurement process where one service provider assumes total responsibility for all aspects of the project and delivers the full end product / service required by the contract.
- 1.28 "Written" or "in writing" means hand-written in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

**2. Application**

- 2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services (excluding professional services related to the building and construction industry), sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific goods, services or works.
- 2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

**3. General**

- 3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.
- 3.2 Invitations to bid are usually published in locally distributed news media and on the municipality/municipal entity website.

**4. Standards**

- 4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

**5. Use of contract documents and information inspection**

- 5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.
- 5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.
- 5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier's performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.
- 5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

**6. Patent Rights**

- 6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.
- 6.2 When a supplier developed documentation / projects for the municipality / municipal entity, the intellectual, copy and patent rights or ownership of such documents or projects will vest in the municipality / municipal entity.

**7. Performance security**

- 7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the [amount specified in SCC](#).
- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
- (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
  - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque.
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, [unless otherwise specified](#).

**8. Inspections, tests and analyses**

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that goods to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage be subject to inspections, tests and analyses, the bidder or contractor's premises shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the purchaser or organization acting on behalf of the purchaser.

- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.

- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the goods to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.

- 8.5 Where the goods or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such goods or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.

- 8.6 Goods and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.

- 8.7 Any contract goods may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analysed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected goods shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with goods, which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected goods shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute goods forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected goods, purchase such goods as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.

- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 22 of GCC.

**9. Packing**

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, [including additional requirements](#), if any, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

**10. Delivery and documents**

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods and arrangements for shipping and clearance obligations, shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms [specified in the contract](#).

**11. Insurance**

- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery [in the manner specified](#).

**12. Transportation**

- 12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, [this shall be specified](#).

**13. Incidental Services**

13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, **including additional services**, if any:

- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
- (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
- (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
- (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.

13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

**14. Spare parts**

14.1 **As specified**, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:

- (1) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and;
- (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
  - advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
  - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

**15. Warranty**

15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, **unless specified otherwise**.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, **within the period specified** and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) **within the period specified**, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

**16. Payment**

16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract **shall be specified**.

16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfilment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.

16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.

16.4 Payment will be made in Rand **unless otherwise stipulated**.

**17. Prices**

17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any **price adjustments authorized** or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

**18. Variation orders**

18.1 In cases where the estimated value of the envisaged changes in purchase does not vary more than 15% of the total value of the original contract, the contractor may be instructed to deliver the goods or render the services as such. In cases of measurable quantities, the contractor may be approached to reduce the unit price, and such offers may be accepted provided that there is no escalation in price.

**19. Assignment**

19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

**20. Subcontracts**

20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contract if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

**21. Delays in the supplier's performance**

21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the **time schedule prescribed** by the purchaser in the contract.

21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.

21.3 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the goods are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.

- 21.4 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 22.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.5 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a goods contract, the purchaser shall, without cancelling the contract, be entitled to purchase goods of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.
- 22. Penalties**
- 22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.
- 23. Termination for default**
- 23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:
- if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
  - if the supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
  - if the supplier, in the judgement of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.
- 23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner, as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.
- 23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.
- 23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the supplier as having no objection and proceed with the restriction.
- 23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the purchaser will, at the discretion of the purchaser, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the purchaser actively associated.
- 23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:
- the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
  - the date of commencement of the restriction
  - the period of restriction; and
  - the reasons for the restriction.
- These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.
- 23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.
- 24. Antidumping and countervailing duties and rights**
- 24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anti-dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the supplier to the purchaser or the purchaser may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the supplier in regard to goods or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which may be due to him.
- 25. Force Majeure**
- 25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.
- 25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.
- 26. Termination for insolvency**
- 26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy, which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.



**27. Settlement of Disputes**

- 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
  - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier for goods delivered and / or services rendered according to the prescripts of the contract.

**28. Limitation of Liability**

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or wilful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
- (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and
  - (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.

**29. Governing language**

- 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.

**30. Applicable law**

- 30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified.

**31. Notices**

- 31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice.
- 31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.

**32. Taxes and duties**

- 32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.
- 32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.
- 32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid SARS must have certified that the tax matters of the preferred bidder are in order.
- 32.4 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose municipal rates and taxes and municipal services charges are in arrears.

**33. Transfer of Contracts**

- 33.1 The contractor shall not abandon, transfer, cede assign or sublet a contract or part thereof without the written permission of the purchaser.

**34. Amendment of contracts**

- 34.1 No agreement to amend or vary a contract or order or the conditions, stipulations or provisions thereof shall be valid and of any force unless such agreement to amend or vary is entered into in writing and signed by the contracting parties. Any waiver of the requirement that the agreement to amend or vary shall be in writing, shall also be in writing.

**35. Prohibition of restrictive practices**

- 35.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder(s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding.
- 35.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s) based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in section 59 of the Competition Act No 89 Of 1998.
- 35.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s) has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.



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**SECTION 6: SPECIAL / ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT**

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The **Conditions of Contract** make reference to the **Special Conditions of Contract (SSC)** for details that apply specifically to this bid. The **Special Conditions of Contract** shall have precedence in the interpretation of any ambiguity or inconsistency between it and the **Conditions of Contract**.

Each item below is cross-referenced to the clause in the **Conditions of Contract** to which it mainly applies.

**SCC 1.2     CONTRACT**

This contract is for 36 months.

**SCC 7.1     PERFORMANCE SECURITY**

The liability of the Performance Security shall be Nil.

**SCC 11.1     INSURANCE**

The Service Provider will be required to take and maintain a Public Liability Fire Insurance and Spread of Fire Insurance which will cover claims arising from any fire related incidents for the duration of this contract.

The Service Provider will be required to submit a copy of the insurance policy to the EThekweni Municipality within a week of receiving a letter of appointment.

**SCC 12.1     TRANSPORTATION**

The terrain onto which the programme operates requires off-road vehicles (4x4), hence the appointed company must be prepared to use own/ leased transportation to access the sites. Vehicles to be used by staff for operational purposes must be well suited for Invasive Alien Plant Control and Fire Management (i.e., fire vehicles and crew carriers).

**SCC 16.1     PAYMENT**

The Contractor shall submit to the Department concerned a detailed account which shall reflect the identifying number of each item / service. Payment will be made on this account when checked and substantiated by the authorised official.

Payment for goods received and accepted by the Municipality shall be made no later than 30 days after submission of invoice or claim, provided however that all the terms of the contract are duly complied with.

Payment will be made only to the supplier. Factoring arrangements will not be accepted.

**SCC 17     PRICES**

Prices are fixed for the duration of the contract.

**SCC 21.1 DELAYS IN THE SUPPLIER'S PERFORMANCE**

The supplier's performance will be monitored closely within the first 6 months of implementation. If there are performance delays noted within the first 3 months of the contract, they will be communicated with the service provider, and interventions will be sought (i.e., engagements with business support). If the performance does not improve thereafter (from month 4-6), the department will engage with SCM to initiate the termination process. The monthly progress reports are to be submitted within the first week of the following month.

**SCC 22.1 PENALTIES**

If the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price (as a penalty):

- A penalty of 5% of the invoice value will be charged if services and monthly reports are delivered after the first week of the following month.

**ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT****ACC1      PERFORMANCE MONITORING & ASSESSMENT OF SERVICE PROVIDERS**

For contract awards that are greater than R10m, the Contractor shall be subjected to "Performance Monitoring" assessments in terms of the applicable Section of the Council's current Supply Chain Management Policy.

**ACC2      QUALITY OF PRODUCTS**

No inferior products will be accepted under this enquiry.

Should there be any cause for complaint against the standard of service or quality of products offered which is not resolved within a period of 10 working days, the Municipality reserves the right to cancel the contract after serving one month's notice, in writing, to the supplier involved. Should such notice be given, the supplier shall nevertheless be obliged to perform the duties covered by the contract up to the date of expiration of the period of notice.

**ACC3      SATISFACTORY PERFORMANCE**

The supplier shall employ for the purpose of this contract only such personnel as are careful and competent and the Municipality shall be at liberty to object to and require the supplier to remove from the job forthwith any person, including supervisory staff, employed by the supplier who, in the opinion of the Municipality, misconducts himself/herself or is incompetent or negligent in the proper performance of his/her duties and such person shall not again be employed upon this contract without the permission of the Municipality.

**ACC4      OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES AND DISEASES ACT**

This act replaces the Workmen's Compensation Act:

**The supplier shall, before commencement of work, produce documentary proof to the Deputy Municipal Manager, Treasury: Finance that he has complied in all respects with the provisions of the Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act.** The supplier undertakes that he/she will perform and comply with all provisions of the Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act and more particularly that he/she will render all returns and pay all assessments for which he/she is liable in terms of such Act.

**ACC5      DAMAGE TO PERSONS AND PROPERTY**

- (1) The supplier **shall** indemnify and keep indemnified the Council against any claim for death, injury, damage or loss to any person or property whatsoever in respect thereof or in relation thereto.
- (2) The supplier enters into this contract as an independent contractor and shall be solely liable in respect of any claim for death, injury, damage or loss to any person or property whatsoever in respect thereof or in relation thereto.

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**ACC6      SERVICE PROVIDER OFFICE REQUIREMENTS**

The service provider must have, for the duration of the contract, a local presence (within the geographical eThekweni boundary).

**ACC7      EMPOWERMENT REQUIREMENT**

The service provider must provide proof that the proposed team members are not employed elsewhere on a full-time basis.

**ACC8      EMPOWERMENT REQUIREMENT: CPG PENALTY**

Failure to meet the contract participation goal shall result in the application of penalties, at the discretion of the Employer, payable in Rands, equal to one and a half times the difference between the tendered and achieved participation goals multiplied by the Award Value and divided by one hundred.

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## **SECTION 7: SCOPE AND SPECIFICATION OF REQUIRED SUPPLY / SERVICES**

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### **Scope of Supply / Services**

#### **Background and Introduction**

Proposals are invited from suitably qualified service providers to implement the eThekweni Municipality's Fire and Invasive Species Control (FISC) Programme.

The Biodiversity Management Department, of the eThekweni Municipality has initiated a programme for control of invasive alien plants on important biodiversity sites. The programme aims to ensure optimal restoration of such biodiversity sites while at the same time delivering green job creation and skills development through employment and training of local people.

It is anticipated that through appropriate control of invasive alien plants, ecological functionality and environmental integrity can be restored to local ecosystems, with the result that the resilience of such ecosystems as well as the ecosystem services that they deliver, will be improved. Control methods are to include manual, mechanical, and chemical means as well as the use of fire.

The programme is expected and required to undertake follow-up control practices in areas previously cleared, particularly in areas where fire control is being implemented as a management tool, as well as to roll-out to other/new pre-determined sites.

The Biodiversity Management Department seeks to appoint a suitable implementing agent to undertake this work, for a three-year period starting from 01 October 2022 to 31 September 2025. The successful implementing agent should provide a trained, experienced and institutionally robust service to eThekweni Municipality in order to fulfil the required duty of care, towards these grassland assets (see figure and table below), and to continue and expand the work executed in previous management programmes. Individuals, consortiums and non-governmental organizations who are interested in applying to implement the programme are invited to bid for the tender.

This is acknowledged to be a novel and complex programme, given the objectives of

- a) Protecting critically important biodiversity assets within natural environmental areas,
- b) Promoting the sustainable supply of environmental services to the city and its people,
- c) Providing green jobs and skills development opportunities for previously disadvantaged communities, and
- d) Maximising high quality exit opportunities for workers who leave the programme.

#### **Specifications**

The bidder is requested to respond to the following scope of work, and submit a detailed project proposal, which includes detailed information on human resources to be allocated to the project, project approach, methods and plan, and a fixed price cost estimate to complete the work (NB: costs to include VAT where applicable). The contracting period will be for 36 months (3 years) from the date of appointment.

##### **7.1.1 Invasive Alien Plant Infestation Level Assessments**

- Details of Invasive Alien Plant species distribution and densities are to be collected and assessed prior to initiation of control operations. The assessment should include (a) recording of densities of all invasive plant species occurring on each site prior to any control operation. Such data must be reported on the monthly report as well as on the Invasive Alien Plant database to be supplied to the successful bidder by the Municipality.

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**7.1.2 Project Management Plan**

- In conjunction with the Biodiversity Management Department, plan and implement Invasive Alien Plant control methods on municipal-owned sites. Such control methods should include initial, follow-up and maintenance control methods.
- A detailed project management plan is to be presented to relevant staff within the municipality's Biodiversity Management Department's, by the successful service provider, four weeks after appointment.
- The Municipality to provide a template for the report.
- The project management plan is to be accompanied by a detailed Budget Plan. The Budget Plan is to be updated at the beginning of each year of the contract.

**7.1.3 On-going Monitoring and Verification**

- Data capture relating to Invasive Alien Plant control (including through the use of fire) is to be done in a format as proposed by eThekweni Municipality and is to be submitted on a monthly basis.
- Evaluate and assess all work in order to improve outputs and report to eThekweni Municipality.
- Mapping of all Invasive Alien Plant control operations, including burn scars. A relevant geographic information system (GIS) to be used for capture, analysis and presentation of spatial data is required. Maps and shapefiles are to be submitted together with monthly reports.
- Prior to implementing prescribed burns, conduct Veld Condition Assessment and fixed-point photography monitoring (which must be supported by a formal monitoring protocol) initiative with relevant municipal staff on the sites specified in the plan, and use that data, along with fire history data, to inform the fire plan for a specific fire season.
- Collect data on Fire Behaviour for all prescribed burns undertaken on municipal-owned sites. The form and method of capture of this data will be provided, by the Biodiversity Management Department, to the successful bidder.
- Report sightings of the top listed and critically endangered species found on all Biodiversity Management Department municipal-owned sites. The list of these species, their images and a field form to be used to capture this data will be supplied to the service provider by the Biodiversity Management Department.
- Record and report sightings of emerging weeds and where required, respond to requests to control such weeds. The Emerging weeds data is to be recorded and reported in the monthly report, as well as in the Emerging Weeds database and on the Emerging weeds website.

**7.1.4 Community Liaison**

- Liaise with stakeholders including local authorities and leaders, community members, and land owners.
- Establish an understanding of community ideas and aspirations prior to initiating projects.
- Work with the Municipality and the community to ensure successful project initiation and implementation.
- In conjunction with the Biodiversity Management Department, provide information to land owners/community members regarding the nature of the project and the legal and environmental requirements for control of invasive alien plants.

**7.1.5 Employment of Local Staff**

- Advertise positions and employ 100 percent locally based and suitable candidates (within the eThekweni Municipal area) into the project teams.
- Staff appointed must be able to undertake physically strenuous work in difficult working conditions.
- Selection is to be done in a manner that is transparent and equitable.
- Remuneration values are to be in line with national and provincial guidelines as dictated by the Working for Water and KZN Invasive Alien Species programmes which oversee similar Invasive Alien Plant control operations.
- The tenderer must also adhere to the country's minimum wage specifications.

### 7.1.6 Skills Transfer

Tenderer to transfer current and relevant Invasive Alien Plant control methodologies to employees including:

- Invasive Alien Plant and Weed Control
- Invasive Alien Plant Impacts
- Mechanical control methods (including chainsaw and brush-cutter operations)
- Use of fire as a management tool
- Herbicide Application and Advanced Herbicide Use
- Basic invasion ecology.
- Basic map reading and interpretation for Crew leaders (both type 1 and type 2)
- Bee and bee-sting Awareness
- Snake Awareness and handling
- Training on Bio control (collection, release and mapping of spread)

In the event where most of the above training has been provided, the tender should train employees on the following:

- Refresher: Chainsaw Operations
- Refresher: Brush cutter Operations
- Refresher: Herbicide Application
- Refresher: Health and Safety
- Refresher: First Aid

Provide the following additional training to all employees:

- First aid: basic
- Firefighting: Advanced Veld & Forest Fire, Block burns, Tracer belts and Firebreaks
- HIV/Aids awareness
- Life Skills
- Personal Finance Management
- Workplace Nutrition
- Basic banking
- Basic ecological principles
- Grassland Ecology, Forest Ecology, Urban Ecology
- Health and fitness awareness.

Provide additional training, as may be required, to selected employees in the following:

- First aid: Level 2 to 3
- High altitude (rope access) training and certification (where required)
- Chain saw Operator, Brush cutter Operator and Machine Maintenance
- Driver Advanced PDP
- Leadership skills
- Conflict Management
- Indigenous plant identification
- Basics of bird identification
- Substance abuse
- Adult Based Education and Training (where necessary)
- Project management
- Tender procedures
- Entrepreneurial skills
- Advanced fire fighting
- Advanced Crew Leader Course
- Disaster Management and
- Advanced Fire Prevention and Management

### 7.1.7 Safety Standards and OHS Requirements

- Ensure all employees have suitable Personal Protective Equipment and tools for Invasive Alien Plant and Fire Control.

- Comply with all relevant OHS legislation and regulations, as well as the conditions stated in the following:
  - The Scheduled Trade and Occupational bylaws permit from the eThekweni Municipality for registration on the use of herbicides,
  - The certificate for registration as a pest control operator (limited weeds controller).
  - Occupational Health and Safety Act (Act 85 of 1993).

#### 7.1.8 Equipment and Herbicides

- Ensure all employees have suitable equipment and necessary tools for efficient and effective Invasive Alien Plant control, including:
  - Personal Protective Equipment
  - Invasive Alien Plant control tools
  - Firefighting Personal Protective Equipment and firefighting equipment.
- Ensure appropriate herbicide use, as per guidelines issued by product manufacturers and the eThekweni Municipality, and:
  - Ensure appropriate safety containers and materials are available and in use in order to prevent or deal with accidental herbicide spills
  - Provide the necessary storage containers for tools and other equipment
  - Ensure the appropriate safety and directional signage are available and in use at all sites.
  - Ensure accurate record keeping of the use of herbicide and other tools and equipment.

#### 7.1.9 Transportation

Ensure workers have suitable transport or receive remuneration for transport to enable them to report to work on time, and to ensure vehicles are available on site for emergency purposes. Vehicles to be used by staff for operational purposes must be regularly serviced and they must be road worthy. A first aid kit is required to be kept in each vehicle. This will be regularly reviewed by the Onsite Auditor.

#### 7.1.10 Office Location

The successful bidder will be expected to have a formal office from which the team will operate. The address of the said office should be communicated to the Municipality during the inception meeting. Alternative accommodation will be arranged and agreed upon by both the Municipality and the service provider in the event where the suggested location is deemed unsuitable for use.

#### 7.1.11 Reporting

All reports, data and maps are to be submitted in a succinct, professional format and these can be submitted on a CD/Flashdrive or emailed, at the end of each month, using the template provided by the Biodiversity Management Department. The successful bidder is to ensure that the required tasks, products and services are rendered on time and within budget. The requirements for reports and best practice management are noted to be of particular importance.

#### 7.1.12 Monthly Progress Reporting

Monthly progress reports are to include:

##### 7.1.12.1 Invasive Alien Plant Control

- Place name: Name and locality of area of work.
- Management block: Each management block on site plan to be numbered/named.
- Map number(s): Maps for each area cleared/burned to be included and shapefiles to accompany.
- Extent: Area cleared in square meters for each block.
- Time: Days taken for team(s) to clear these areas.
- Species data: Invasive Alien Plants encountered with approximate densities for top ten plants.
- Densities for each of the top ten invader plant species to be indicated on separate maps for each block cleared. Maps to be appended.
- Emerging weeds: Lists of potentially new or emerging weeds encountered.
- Research projects.
- Control methods: Notes on control methods used for each species.
- Other notes: Other relevant information including problems encountered.



- Details as above for all fire control activities implemented.
- Monthly key performance indicators relating to staff numbers and demographics including a breakdown of project spend, person days worked, training undertaken and training days. In addition, all required data for the Expanded Public Works Programme reporting, are to be submitted monthly to the Municipality.

#### 7.1.12.2 Meetings

- Capture notes or minutes (including action points decided upon) of all relevant meetings including monthly meetings with the designated contact person from eThekweni Municipality.
- Notes or minutes to include all proposals for changes to project scope, as well as details of authorised scope changes. Signed change request forms to be appended.

#### 7.1.12.3 Employment

- All Expanded Public Works Programme and Key Performance Indicators reports to be submitted in full on a monthly basis.
- Preferably, all field staff must be sourced locally and preference must be given to persons who are coming from previously disadvantaged backgrounds.

#### 7.1.12.4 Other

- Statement of work that has been completed during that month.
- Statement of work anticipated to be completed in the forthcoming month.
- Any key learnings, including:
  - Failures, issues, concerns or challenges that have been encountered and how these have been/will be overcome.
  - Successes, special stories, or notes on important achievements in the project that have arisen.
- Details of the suitability of implemented quality control and risk management measures, and any required changes to such.
- Other relevant information including problems encountered.
- Full details of spend, for the month, in a comprehensive monthly budget spreadsheet.

Provide the following data electronically, updated on a monthly basis, within a template provided by the eThekweni Municipality.

### 7.1.13 Annual Progress Reporting

Submit detailed year-end reports at the end of each municipal financial year (30 June). The reports should include the following:

#### 7.1.13.1 Detailed financial account:

- Provide accounted lists of all expenses, payments, wages (including UIF and COIDA related payments) etc.
- A full independent audit, verifying relevant expenses and other financial transaction details, is to be included and submitted.

#### 7.1.13.2 Invasive Alien Plant and Fire Control:

- Summary of the information supplied in monthly reports, giving an overview of how and where the work was undertaken, as well as square meters cleared, locality details and Invasive Alien Plant species encountered including maps.
- Details of where and when follow-up control is to take place (to be agreed upon in conjunction with staff from the eThekweni Municipality), including maps.
- A full annual independent audit, summarising the monthly reports, which verifies where and how implemented Invasive Alien Plant control and fire management took place, is to be undertaken at bidder's own cost, and submitted.
- Maps of where Invasive Alien Plant were controlled and where fire was controlled.

#### 7.1.13.3 Veld Condition Assessment (VCA) and Fixed-point photography monitoring

- A summary report of all VCA and fixed-point photography monitoring to be included.
- Relevant shapefiles and details of all VCA and fixed-point monitoring activities to be included, as well as a synopsis of observations relating to changes observed.

**7.1.13.4 Training:**

- Summary of all training provided, including course content, trainer/facilitator, duration, number of people, and date of training.
- A full independent audit, summarising the quarterly reports, which verifies all training implemented, is to be submitted.

**7.1.13.5 Staff advancement:**

- Indicate ways in which staff (if any) were trained, mentored and/or encouraged to advance themselves in the programme.
- List exit opportunities and/or promotions afforded to any staff member employed as part of this programme, and/or any cooperatives/SMME's established.

**7.1.13.6 Community liaison:**

- Provide a summary of how (if any) local communities were engaged with, and any benefits (apart from direct employment) that communities surrounding project work areas have benefited from the programme.

**7.1.13.7 Staff Database:**

- A spreadsheet in electronic format listing all employees, their contact details, and the training they received. Independent audits clearly indicating the validation of employment details are to be submitted.

**7.1.13.8 Other:**

- Other relevant information as agreed on by both parties.
- Include any noted pitfalls/problems and any lessons learnt for future projects of this nature, which includes input from all programme stakeholders.

**7.2 Meetings, advocacy and stakeholder engagement****7.2.1 Coordinate regular meetings**

7.2.1.1 Meetings to be held at the client's premises in order to present feedback to the client and other stakeholders, and to record and circulate all relevant meeting minutes.

7.2.1.1.1 To hold other meeting relating to the Fire and Invasive Species Control programme at venues to be agreed upon between the service provider and the client.

**7.2.2 Advocacy**

7.2.2.1 Attend relevant workshops, presentations, seminars, symposiums and conferences, and where necessary, present work on behalf of the eThekweni Municipality.

**7.2.3 Professional advice and guidance**

7.2.3.1 Provide professional advice and guidance, relating to all aspects of the Fire and Invasive Species Control Programme, to relevant Municipal staff members.

**7.2.4 Stakeholder engagement**

7.2.4.1 Liaise with relevant stakeholders, including other Municipal and external government departments as well as with private individuals and organizations, for the duration of the programme.

**7.3 Best environmental practice (BEP) guidelines**

Best environmental practice (BEP) guidelines for work undertaken in natural areas or any other areas with potentially sensitive natural environments.

The clearing of listed Invasive Alien Plants in the eThekweni Municipality is often in sensitive grassland and

forest ecosystems which can be susceptible to environmental degradation. The slopes are often steep and the soils prone to erosion. Furthermore, much of the biodiversity (plant and animal life) found in these areas may be considered to be of conservation significance. As such every effort should be made to minimise the impacts on such biodiversity at the time of alien plant control.

The following best practices are to be observed while the contractor is working on site:

- Roads and paths are not to be created across contours and straight down the slopes.
- Every effort should be made to minimise a.) the trampling of indigenous plants; and b.) the disturbance or destruction of indigenous fauna.
- When a species identification is in doubt, it must be confirmed before control is undertaken.
- Vehicles on site are to be roadworthy and should not discharge oil and fuel onto the site.
- Vehicles on site are to travel slowly and with minimal damage/gouging into the soil.
- When working on or near the roads, visible safety beacons are to be displayed.
- No littering or fouling of the site area is permitted by the contractor/workmen.
- No harvesting of fauna or flora considered to be of medicinal value is permitted in any area of the eThekweni Municipality.
- Every effort is to be made to ensure the safety of visitors, and commuters in and around the work site.
- Any alien trees felled without applying herbicide need to be recut horizontally before application of herbicide.
- Trees felled are to be cut as close to their ground base as possible.
- Every effort should be made to leave site in a good state and with minimal disturbance to the natural area.
- Every effort should be made to limit disturbing the peace when working in close proximity to residential areas.
- All fire control best practices to be adhered to.

The above Best Practices will be assessed on a regular basis by a Municipal-appointed Site Auditor. Any transgressions must be immediately addressed and reported, or the appointed service provider may be investigated for potential breach of contract.

#### 7.4 Required Supporting Documentation

The bidder is requested to respond to the scope of work and submit a detailed project proposal. The following documents should be included:

- Valid original tax clearance certificate
- Valid BBBEE certificate
- VAT Registration Certificate (if number is not shown on Tax Clearance Certificate)
- eThekweni Municipality Supplier Registration Number
- If not already registered on the eThekweni Municipality's Supplier Database and able to supply the above registration number, please include a fully completed Supplier Registration Application Form with all required supporting documentation (ID's, CK forms, VAT Registration Certificate, Company letterhead, cancelled cheque etc. as is outlined in further detail in the checklist)
- A signed commitment that the company has or will establish a local Durban office. Confirmation is also required that the company will not bill eThekweni Municipality for transport, including flights, from other cities should their employees/contractors not reside in Durban.
- Details of Public Liability Fire Insurance including Spread of Fire Cover which covers claims arising from a fire spreading from one property to a neighbouring property.
- The following information relating to Health and Safety:
  - Proof of relevant insurances;
  - A written undertaking to comply with the requirements of the Occupational Health and Safety Act (Act 85 of 1993) and other applicable legislation to be submitted;
  - Copies of letters of appointment and acceptance as required in terms of the Occupational Health and Safety Act (Act 85 of 1993). These to be lodged with the Head: Development Planning, Environment and Management.

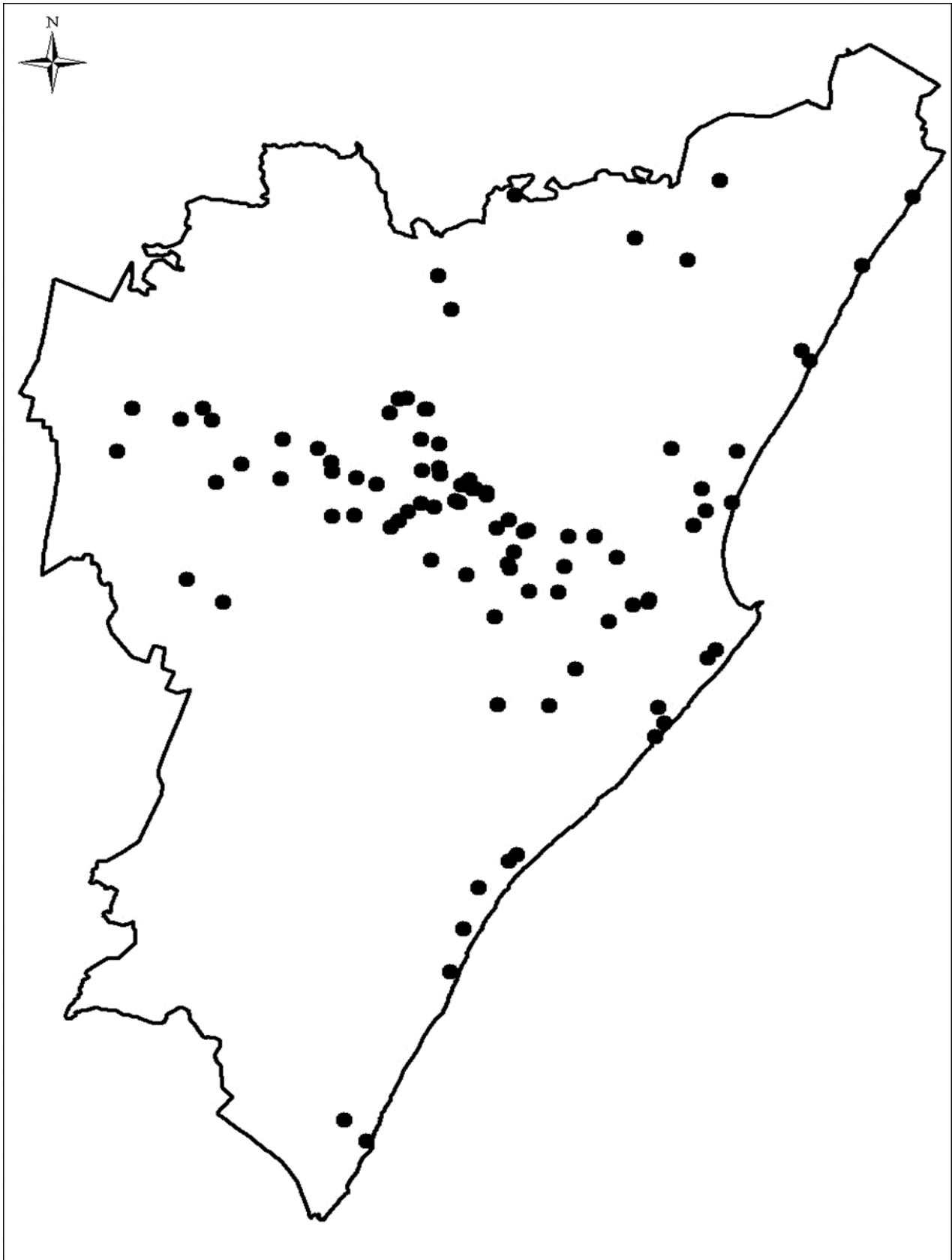


Figure 1. Management sites for fire and INVASIVE ALIEN PLANT control within the eThekweni Municipality.
