1. BACKGROUND

The Social Housing Regulatory Authority ("SHRA") was established by the National Department of Human Settlements as prescribed by the Social Housing Act (Act 16 of 2008). The SHRA is classified as a national public entity listed under Schedule 3A of the Public Finance Management Act (Act 1 of 1999) ("PFMA").

The SHRA has been operational since January 2011, with a mandate to regulate, invest in and capacitate the social housing sector. The social housing programme aims to deliver affordable rental housing for low to medium income groups, currently these are households whose income levels are between R1 850 and R22 000. There are social housing projects throughout all nine (9) provinces.

The delivery and management of social housing units and projects is done through accredited Social Housing Institutions (SHIs) and private sector companies known as other delivery agents (ODAs) collectively defined as social housing landlords (SHLs).

1.1 MISSION

To ensure there is quality housing for lower- to middle-income households in integrated settlements by investing in, enabling, regulating, and transforming the affordable social housing rental market, in collaboration with all strategic partners.

1.2 VISION

Quality, affordable rental homes - harmonious communities.

1.3 FUNCTIONS

- Promote the development and awareness of social housing and promote an
- Enabling environment for the growth and development of the Social Housing Sector;
- Provide advice and support to the NDoHS in its development of policy for the social housing sector and facilitate national social housing programmes;
- Provide best practice information and research on the status of the social housing sector;
- Support provincial governments with the approval of project applications by SHIs and assist, where requested, in the process of the designation of restructuring zones;

- Enter into suitable agreements with Social Housing Institutions and Other Delivery Agents for the protection of the government's investment in social housing;
- Enter into agreements with provincial governments and the National Housing Finance Corporation and debt financing institutions to ensure that implementation by these entities is coordinated;
- Provide financial assistance to SHIs through grants to enable them to develop institutional capacity, gain accreditation as SHIs, and submit viable project applications;
- Accredit institutions meeting accreditation criteria as SHIs and maintain a register of SHIs. In addition, conduct compliance monitoring through regular inspections and enforce compliance where necessary;
- Approve, administer, and disburse institutional investment grants and capital grants and obtain applications for such grants through engagement with provincial governments and municipalities;
- Make rules and regulations in respect of the accreditation of SHIs and the disbursement of government funds to them; and
- The SHRA is empowered to intervene if it is satisfied on reasonable grounds that there has been maladministration by a SHI.

3. TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE PROJECT

3.1. BACKGROUND

The Social Housing Regulatory Authority ("SHRA") was established in terms of section 7 as prescribed by the Social Housing Act (Act 16 of 2008). The SHRA is classified as a national public entity listed under Schedule 3A of the Public Finance Management Act (Act 1 of 1999) ("PFMA").

The SHRA has been operational since January 2011, with a mandate to regulate, invest in, and capacitate the social housing sector. The social housing programme aims to deliver affordable rental housing for low to medium income groups, currently these are households whose income levels are between R1 850 and R22 000. There are social housing projects throughout all nine (9) provinces.

The delivery and management of social housing units and projects is done through accredited Social Housing Institutions (SHIs) and private sector companies known as other delivery agents (ODAs), collectively defined as social housing landlords (SHLs).

The Social Housing Regulatory Authority (SHRA) has played a pivotal role in enabling access to affordable rental housing for low- to middle-income households in urban areas across South Africa. While previous evaluations have examined operational compliance and project performance, there is a critical lack of longitudinal evidence on the broader socioeconomic, spatial, and developmental impacts of social housing.

To address these, the SHRA will undertake a five-year longitudinal research study (2025–2030) that goes beyond physical infrastructure to evaluate the broader developmental impacts of social housing. The study will investigate outcomes related to community health, education, socio-economic mobility, financial sustainability, spatial integration, and conduct international benchmarking with countries offering similar housing programmes.

The study will produce a body of longitudinal evidence to inform policy refinement, strengthen regulatory frameworks, guide programme innovation, and support the development of sustainable and inclusive housing models in South Africa. The findings

will also enhance SHRA's role in influencing housing delivery at scale while aligning with the national agenda for integrated human settlements. Importantly, the longitudinal nature of the study will allow for data-driven projections on future housing trends, resident outcomes, and sectoral risks, enabling SHRA to proactively plan for emerging challenges and opportunities within the social housing landscape

3.2. PURPOSE OF THE BID

To appoint a suitably qualified and experienced research institution or consortium to conduct a five-year longitudinal study that tracks and evaluates the social, economic, spatial, and policy impacts of social housing in South Africa. The appointed service provider will also be expected to develop a baseline and data from 2019–2024, and also build analytical models, provide annual and final reporting aligned with the SHRA's specified requirements.

3.3. OBJECTIVES

The objective of the study is to:

- 3.3.1. Evaluate the long-term socioeconomic impacts of social housing on residents and surrounding communities.
- 3.3.2. Measure changes in health, education, employment, household income, and social inclusion.
- 3.3.3. Analyse spatial integration, land use and rights, and access to urban services.
- 3.3.4. Assess sustainability challenges, financial models, social housing projects maintenance, and implementation of good governance practices (SHRA delivery agents).
- 3.3.5. Benchmark South African practices against international models with similar related housing programs.
- 3.3.6. Generate predictive insights and forward-looking scenarios using longitudinal data to model future trends in resident outcomes, housing demand, sustainability risks, and sectoral performance
- 3.3.7. Create SHRA's data management tool.
- 3.3.8. Produce evidence-based recommendations to inform policy, urban planning,
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and program implementation.

3.4. SCOPE OF WORK

The scope includes, but is not limited to:

3.4.1. Research Design and Planning

- 3.4.1.1. Develop a full research methodology (mixed methods).
- 3.4.1.2. Finalise a 5-year project plan including retrospective data integration.

3.4.2. Data Collection and Analysis

- 3.4.2.1. Conduct surveys, interviews, focus groups, and site visits.
- 3.4.2.2. Extract and analyse historical data (2019–2024) to build baselines.
- 3.4.2.3. Collect longitudinal data in annual cycles through 2030.

3.4.3. Stakeholder Engagement

- 3.4.3.1. Consult the SHRA staff, beneficiaries, NGOs, provinces, municipalities, delivery agents, private partners, and international bodies.
- 3.4.3.2. Facilitate virtual stakeholder workshops and validation sessions.

3.4.4. Reporting

- 3.4.4.1. Prepare and present baseline, annual progress, mid-term, and final reports.
- 3.4.4.2. Develop infographics and visualisations for stakeholder presentations as and when required.

3.4.5. Capacity building and knowledge sharing

3.6. TIMEFRAME

The research will span from the 2025/26 financial year to the end of the 2029/30 financial year. It will include retrospective data collection covering the 2019/20 to 2024/25 financial years, followed by five years of active longitudinal data collection and analysis aligned with the SHRA's planning and reporting cycles.
