**THE APPOINTMENT OF AN ELECTRICAL ENGINEER TO DESIGN, IMPLEMENT AND PERFORM PROJECT MANAGEMENT IN THE PROCUREMENT AND INSTALLATION OF A BATTERY BANK FOR THE EXISTING PHOTOVOLTAIC/SOLAR GRID SYSTEM AT THE HEAD OFFICE OF THE NATIONAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION IN BRUMMERIA, PRITORIA**

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<b>HIGH LEVEL SUMMARY OF REQUIREMENTS</b>
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The National Research Foundation (NRF) seeks to appoint an Electrical Engineer to design, implement and perform project management in the procurement and installation of a battery bank for the existing photovoltaic/solar grid system at the head office of the NRF as indicated in this bid document. The NRF requires an independent technical resource to design, specify, evaluate potential bidders, and verify delivery according to specifications in order to avoid risks of incorrect deliverables, poor workmanship, and delivery of equipment below the set specification standard. The appointed Electrical Engineer will act as a principal agent and also assist in appointing the service providers for both the installation of the battery bank to generate 6 hours run time, the HVAC system and the fire suppression system.

The main objective of the installation of the battery bank is to store the excess electricity generated by the existing solar panels. This stored electricity will be used at times when the solar panels do not generate enough electricity, including nights, cloudy days and during load shedding/ power blackouts from the City of Tshwane.

## TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR BIDDING (SBD 1B)

The NRF compares each bidder's pricing proposal on an equal and fair comparison basis equitable to all bidders, taking into account all aspects of the bid's pricing requirements including the application of fair pricing tests as set out below in the section "Insufficiency of Funds".

### Ranking of the bidders pricing:

The NRF ranks the qualifying bids on price with lowest priced Bid receiving the maximum points (either 80 or 90) and the remainder ranked in relation to the lowest priced bid. The NRF adds the bidders' claimed preference points as verified to the submitted preference claim form (SBD 6.1) to provide the final ranking for the award decision.

### **Stage 4 – Checking Tax Compliance**

#### Stage 4A – Taxpayers Resident in South Africa

The NRF notifies the recommended bidder in writing where their tax compliance check reflects that they are non-compliant and provides the recommended bidder seven (7) working days to submit written proof from SARS of their tax compliance status or proof that they have made an arrangement with SARS to meet their outstanding tax obligations. Failure to deliver such written evidence of compliance results in the rejection of that recommended bid.

#### Stage 4B – Non-Resident Foreign Bidders

Where foreign bidders are submitting a bid, they complete all sections of the SBD1 especially the tax questionnaire. The NRF submit the Foreign Bidder's completed SBD1 to the South African Revenue Service to obtain from the South African Revenue Service the Confirmation of Tax Obligations letter. Where South Africa Revenue Services does not issue the letter, Stage 4A applies in clearing the reason for not receiving the letter.

### **Stage 5 – Award and Contract Signing**

The NRF nominates the bidder with the highest combined score for the contract award subject to the bidder having supplied the relevant administrative documentation.

## **6. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF READING EACH PAGE**

The bidder warrants by signature in this document that the bidder has read and accepts each page.

## **7. CENTRAL SUPPLIER DATABASE REGISTRATION**

Bidders are requested to register on the Central Supplier Database and to include in their bid their Master Registration Number (Supplier Number) in order to enable the NRF to verify the supplier's tax status on the Central Supplier Database.

## **8. CLARIFICATION**

The NRF is not liable for any costs incurred by a bidder in the process of responding to this Bid Invitation, including on-site presentations.

## **10. COLLUSION, FRAUD AND CORRUPTION**

Any effort by Bidder/s to influence evaluation, comparisons, or award decisions in any manner will result in the rejection and disqualification of the bidder concerned.

## **11. FRONTING**

The NRF, in ensuring that bidders conduct themselves in an honest manner will, as part of the bid evaluation processes where applicable, conduct or initiate the necessary enquiries/investigations to determine the accuracy of the representation made in the bid documents. The onus is on the bidder to prove that fronting does not exist, should the National Research Foundation establish and notify the bidder of potential breaches of any of the fronting indicators as contained in the Department of Trade and Industry's "Guidelines on Complex Structures and Transactions and Fronting". Failure to do so within a period of 7 days from date of notification will invalidate the bid/contract and may also result in the restriction of the bidder to conduct business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years, in addition to any other remedies the NRF may have against the bidder concerned.

**Invalid Bid Procedure:** The NRF cancels the Quotation Invitation prior to making an award if a material irregularity occurred in the bid process.

**Insufficiency of Funds or Quotations not within a fair price range:** The NRF cancels the Quotation Invitation prior to making an award if the funds are no longer available to cover the total envisaged expenditure or if the price offered by the bidder scoring the highest points is not market related.

The NRF conducts fair pricing tests to arrive at an opinion of reasonableness of the bid price offered. **SCOPE OF WORK**

**INTRODUCTION TO THE NRF**

The National Research Foundation Act, Act 23 of 1998, establishes the National Research Foundation ("NRF") as the juristic person that makes this bid invitation and will contract with the awarded bidder. The Public Finance Management Act classifies the organisation as a Schedule 3A Public Entity.

## CONTEXT OF THIS PROCUREMENT

The NRF seek to appoint an Electrical Engineer to act as a principal agent and also assist in the appointment of a service provider for the installation of the battery bank to generate 6 hours run time, HVAC system and Fire suppression system. The main objective of the installation of the battery bank is to store the excess electricity generated by the existing solar panels. This stored electricity will be used at times when the solar panels do not generate enough electricity, including nights, cloudy days and during load shedding/ power blackouts from the City of Tshwane.

## CONTRACT PERIOD

The contract will commence immediately after signing the contract form (SBD7). The services of the appointed electrical engineer or firm acting as a principal agent on behalf of the NRF will be utilized until the project is complete (Works completion Certificate).

## DESCRIPTION OF GOODS/DETAILED SPECIFICATION

### SERVICES REQUIREMENT SPECIFICATIONS

The Electrical Engineer should carry out the services as outlined on the 'Guideline for Services and Processes for Estimating Fees for Persons Registered in terms of the Engineering Profession Act, 2000, (Act No.46 of 2000)'.

#### A. SCOPE OF WORK -ELECTRICAL ENGINEER

The National research foundation (NRF) requires a qualified Electrical engineer to provide the following services in respect of the NRF's Photovoltaic system:

1. The Electrical Engineer must advise the NRF on the best location to use for the Photovoltaic battery bank storage and advice on the suitability to use the proposed basement storeroom.
2. The Electrical Engineer to advise the NRF on the suitability of the current solar inverter system to the proposed battery storage.
3. The Electrical Engineer must design and implement a Battery backup system generating an output of 210KWH, to produce 6 hours of electricity to the NRF. The system must be integrated into the existing Photovoltaic grid system comprising both the East and West wing of the NRF.
4. Conferring with the NRF representative to discuss existing electrical infrastructure and determine the best way to save electrical consumption.
5. Ensuring that the installation and operations of the solar battery bank backup system conform to standards and NRF's requirements by preparing electrical systems specifications and technical drawings.
6. Establishing the design/construction and installation standards or specifications of Photovoltaic battery bank grid tied system by performing a wide range of detailed analysis and calculations.
7. Ensuring compliance with specifications, codes, or NRF requirements by directing or coordinating installation, construction, maintenance, documentation, support or testing activities.
8. The engineer must verify that the solar battery bank backup system has been properly installed to ensure reliable operation.
9. The Electrical Engineer must provide technical assistance to the NRF in the procurement process of appointing qualified electrical contractors.
10. The Electrical Engineer must act as the principal agent in supervising the entire electrical aspects of the project.
11. The Electrical Engineer must verify that the delivery and workmanship are in line with the specifications set out for the electrical aspects of the project.
12. The Electrical Engineer must verify the contractor's work and Certificate of Compliance (CoC) at the final handover stage.
13. The Electrical Engineer must sign-off on the design and installation work and that delivery has met the set specifications after project finalization.
14. The appointed electrical engineer or firm acting as a principal agent on behalf of the NRF is not allowed to bid as the electrical contractor during the procurement process for the installation of solar battery bank backup system.
15. The appointed electrical engineer or firm acting as a principal agent on behalf of the NRF must disclose any interest in contractors that may bid for the main supply & installation bid. Failure to disclose such potential conflicts of interest is a special condition of disqualification.

**B. THE ENGINEER MUST COMPILE A REPORT OUTLINING THE FOLLOWING CONCEPTS: (STANDARD ECSA STAGE 1 TO 6 SCOPE OF WORKS):**

1. Design/Development – the design, outline specifications, cost plan, financial viability and program for the project.
2. Documentation and Procurement – Prepare procurement and construction documentation.
3. Contract Administration and Inspection – Manage, administer and monitor the construction contracts and processes including preparation and coordination of the procedures and documentation to facilitate the practical completion of the works.
4. Close out – Fulfil and complete the project close out including necessary documentation to facilitate effective completion, handover and operation of the project.
5. The proposed solar battery bank room is located in the NRF East Wing Basement. The appointed Electrical Engineer must obtain structural verification from a sub-consultant that the NRF proposed basement storage room to be used for the installation of the solar battery bank. All approved documentation from the sub-consultant must be supplied to the NRF representative.
6. The appointed engineer will also be responsible for the registration of the battery bank installation with the Local Grid Authority of the City of Tshwane.
7. Even though South Africa still has a lack of regulations and standards regarding PV installations, existing regulations must be adhered to: SANS 10142, EIR 2009 and NRS 097

**C. PROJECT PLANNING**

1. Pre-Project Plan must be compiled and submitted to the NRF in advance together with the bid proposal.
2. The bidders, as part of their bid submission, must propose timelines for executing the project so that the evaluation committee can evaluate their experience & skills. The Pre-Project plan must include the following specific details:
  - 2.1. Activities;
  - 2.2. Scheduling of activities;
  - 2.3. Resources required;
  - 2.4. Project deliveries; and
  - 2.5. Budget
3. The appointed service provider together with the project leader will finalise the appointed contractors' project plans to deliver the consolidated project plan.
4. The appointed electrical engineer must prepare a project plan for setting out the planning required by the appointed contractors to deliver the supply, installation, testing, and site-acceptance work for the solar battery bank which must be integrated into the existing Photovoltaic/ Solar grid system and the backup generator.
5. The appointed electrical engineer will manage the appointed contractors for the installation of the solar battery bank in terms of the agreed project plan ensuring that the project achieves its milestones.

**D. FAIR PRICING ANALYSIS**

1. The appointed electrical engineer must assist the project leader in determining the ranges of fair pricing to allow the analysis

of whether the bidders' pricing on the actual project work is fair and market-related.

#### **E. SITE ACCEPTANCE AND SIGN-OFF PHASE**

1. The appointed electrical engineer must sign-off the work of the appointed contractors for the installation of the solar battery bank as the NRF's technical representative.

#### **F. VERIFYING THE CONTRACTORS' INVOICES**

1. The appointed electrical engineer will review the accuracy and validity of invoices issued by the contractors and provide monthly invoicing detailing services rendered or equipment being delivered/installed.

2. Provide with each invoice all signed service-verification evidence to allow Finance to process the payment within 30 days.

#### **G. PROCUREMENT OF NECESSARY RESOURCES FOR EXECUTION OF THE PROJECT**

1. The NRF and the Electrical Engineer will compile the specifications & bid invitations for the appointment of contractors to execute the project as per the electrical engineering design.

2. The appointed electrical engineer will act as the technical advisor when compiling the specifications & bid invitations before they are submitted to the Bid Specification Advisory Committee (BSAC) for quality assurance including contract execution management before the bid invitations are submitted to the delegated authority for approval and acceptance.

#### **H. MINIMUM SKILLS & QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED.**

1. The Electrical Engineer must have at least a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering or electrical engineering technology certificate from an accredited institution. A competency certificate from SAPVIA (South African Photovoltaic Industry Association) in solar power and renewable energy (PV Green CARD).

2. Registration with a professional engineering association as a Professional Engineer (PrEnG). Proof of registration with a professional engineering association must be provided. A valid license as a professional engineer with the Engineering Council of South Africa (ECSA). Knowledge of applicable codes related to electrical engineering. Proficient in design and calculation software.

3. The bidder must submit a CV that must indicate projects, values, and roles played and indicating a minimum of 3 years' experience in solar power and or renewable energy generation. The skill set must include relevant technical knowledge and up-to-date sector knowledge, project management, the ability to multitask, commercial awareness, flexibility in order to adapt to evolving technologies, planning and organizational skills, such as time and resource allocation and the ability to work in a multidisciplinary team.

4. The bidder must have an intimate knowledge of local standards and international codes OHS Act, SANS, IEC codes and standards and industry practices.

5. The bidder must have knowledge of engineering design management best practices with the ability to implement this knowledge.

6. The bidder should have knowledge and understanding of Fire alarm, Security & Access Control systems, (beneficial).

7. The bidder must provide proof of registration with project management South Africa (PMSA) as a project manager.

8. The bidder must have knowledge of Solar Power Storage Solutions.

9. The bidder must have knowledge of solar plant installation and maintenance requirements.

#### **I. BIDDER'S PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE**

1. The bidder must provide a minimum of two (2) written reference letters relating to similar work from previous and present customers/ clients. The reference letters must have a company logo/ letterhead, contact details of the referee, must be dated, signed and not older than three years. The references must include details which the customer/ client declares the following:

- Value of the contract works.

- Role of the Electrical Engineer.
- Satisfactory with the work done.

2. The bidder must provide a list of two electrical engineering projects undertaken by the bidder in the last three years, detailing the duration of the project, contract value and contact details allowing for conducting due diligence on their ability to manage this contract. At least one of the projects must be in photovoltaic/ solar system design and installation.

**J. TERMINATION OF CONTRACT DUE TO NON-PERFORMANCE**

1. In the event of non-performance as per the agreed contract, the NRF will terminate the contract and appoint a third party. The defaulting party is obliged to settle the damages/additional costs that the NRF has incurred as a result of the non-performance of the Electrical engineer.
