ESTABLISH A MONITORING, REPORTING AND VERIFICATION (MRV)
SYSTEM OF THE PROVINCE'S GHG EMISSIONS**

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1 PURPOSE

The aim of this request for proposal is to appoint an independent, professional, and suitably qualified Service Provider to support the Gauteng Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (GDARD) to develop a Gauteng Greenhouse Gas Inventory System (GGHGIS) and to establish a Monitoring, Reporting, and Verification (MRV) system of its GHG emissions in line with the IPCC Guidelines.

2 BACKGROUND

A greenhouse gas inventory determines baseline emissions and identifies key emission sources and sinks in a country, province, or city over a particular time, usually over a year. Once this data has been collected, the inventory can be used to help identify priority emissions reduction activities, set goals and targets, and measure progress for reducing GHG emissions. Future inventories, if they are constructed using the same methodologies as the original inventory, can be compared to the initial inventory, to determine which emissions have grown, remained the same, or reduced, thereby providing a measure of the success of mitigation action and where further action is needed. Developing a GHG inventory requires the collection of emissions activity data from a range of activities.

The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) laid the foundation for the current system of reporting of information related to its implementation. As part of South Africa's ratification of the UNFCCC it is obliged to act to protect the climate system based on "common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities", undertaking activities, programmes and projects that will impact positively in reducing emissions and limiting the impacts of climate change. Information on greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by sources and removals by sinks, as well as on the actions that Parties are taking to mitigate and adapt to climate change and to implement the Convention, is key in determining the progress, both internationally and at the national level. Provisions for domestic frameworks for measurement, reporting and verification (MRV) of GHG emissions, actions to mitigate emissions, and support needed and received were also established. Aiming to strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change, Parties adopted the Paris Agreement in 2015, and through it established an enhanced transparency framework (ETF). This aims to strengthen reporting and measure and report on progress of Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs). Under the Paris Climate Agreement, South Africa is committed to reducing its contribution to the global GHG (greenhouse gas) budget and has an obligation to report its GHG emissions to international climate bodies. Consistent, comparable, complete, accurate, and transparent information on emissions and actions is therefore an important foundation of both international and national processes.

The UNFCCC requires Non-Annex 1 (mostly developing) countries, of which South Africa is one, to submit inventory reports every two years as part of their Biennial Update Reports (BURs) or National Communications (NCs). At national level, a GHG Inventory Management System (NGHGIS) has been developed by Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) as a web-based, collaborative platform that allows for relevant and necessary data collection methods. In order that mitigation actions be recognised and properly documented as having been implemented, as well as being verifiable to enable international reporting requirements, a Monitoring, Reporting and Verification (MRV) system forms part of the overall framework. This enables the recording of current emissions and potential for their reduction, to plan and implement measures, for monitoring and reporting the measures with their resultant emission reduction. Furthermore, legal aspects and implications have been considered together with MOUs for data suppliers while the necessary quality assurance or quality control measures have been developed as part of the overall process of collecting and reporting the data. This is outlined in the article by Stevens (2017) titled, "A National Greenhouse Gas Inventory Management System for South Africa" and listed in the CLEAN AIR JOURNAL, Volume 27, No 2, 2017.

In response to climate change impacts and vulnerabilities, the South African Government developed the National Climate Change Response Policy (NCCRP White Paper 2011) for an effective climate change response and the long-term just transition to a climate-resilient and lower-carbon economy and society and the policy outlines two objectives:

1. Effectively manage inevitable climate change impacts through interventions that build and sustain South Africa's social, economic and environmental resilience and emergency response capacity.
2. Make a fair contribution to the global effort to stabilise greenhouse gas (GHG) concentrations in the atmosphere at a level that avoids dangerous anthropogenic interference with the climate system within a timeframe that enables economic, social and environmental development to proceed in a sustainable manner.

The NCCRP was followed by a draft National Climate Change Bill that was promulgated in 2018 and work is underway towards the development of the National Climate Change Act. The draft Bill also emphasises that all spheres of government have varying roles in the implementation of climate change responses and that provinces are required to coordinate provincial adaptation and mitigation responses across their own line departments, as well as between municipalities within the province. In response to this, Gauteng has developed Climate Change Response Strategy which evaluates provincial climate risks and impacts and seeks to give effect to the National Climate Change Response Policy at provincial level.

The Gauteng Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (GDARD) in its work to combat climate change, is mandated to mitigate projected climate change impacts through the reduction of GHG emissions, which will also assist South Africa's cause in fulfilling its overall international obligations in combatting climate change. To this end an initial Gauteng Climate Change Response Strategy was developed in 2011, while the Climate Change Over-arching Response Strategy and Action Plan for the Gauteng City Region (the 2020 Strategy) has been approved in 2020. These documents provide a comprehensive range of interventions in dealing with climate change. Currently GDARD is gathering and monitoring information on relevant implementation measures being undertaken in Gauteng by provincial, local government and the private sector in fulfilment of the action plan.

A centralised NGHGIS serves mainly international purposes in terms of climate change reporting obligations and protocols. It also ensures the safekeeping and protection of climate data, improving continuity between different inventories and assists in the timely completion of inventory updates. A subnational GHG inventory and MRV system at provincial level however, can bring benefits to as well as gains from a coordinated national GHG inventory. Use of common guidelines, approaches and assumptions and pooled resources/expertise between national and subnational estimation activities will also help to improve the efficiency and credibility of GHG estimates for both, and facilitate decision-making processes associated with them and tracking policy impacts. Implementation of projects normally happens at the local level and the provincial government is closer to the source of the data, which can facilitate improved performance, better service delivery, gathering of more granular data and verification thereof. Transparency, credibility and improved access to finance opportunities can also be further enhanced.

These benefits can result from interest in and contribution to combined efforts to gather/collate/use geographically resolved data such as for regulated sites (including large industrial installations, waste disposal and recycling/treatment sites), and diffuse traffic and transport, agriculture and forestry. Use of common guidelines, approaches and assumptions and pooled resources/expertise between national and subnational estimation activities will also help to improve the efficiency and credibility of GHG estimates and decision-making processes associated with them.

GDARD is seeking to appoint an independent, professional and suitably qualified Service Provider with the relevant competencies and expertise to develop a Gauteng Greenhouse Gas Inventory System (GGHGIS) and to establish a Monitoring, Reporting and Verification (MRV) system of its GHG emissions.

3 LINKAGES TO GOVERNMENT PRIORITIES AND STRATEGIES

- **Growing Gauteng Together Plan 2030 vision:** One of the priorities of the Growing Gauteng Together (GGT) is sustainable development for future generations in which one of the targeted interventions is to combat GHG emissions across the province, including 42% reduction in total Greenhouse Gas emissions by 2024.
- **Gauteng City Region Over-Arching Climate Change Response Strategy and Action Plan (2020):**
The Gauteng Government has adopted the 10 Pillar programme of Transformation, Modernisation and Re-industrialisation (TMR), the overall strategy identifies climate change as a risk to the successful implementation of the TMR. Implementing projects to directly measure the risk and implement targeted actions to mitigate the Climate Change risk is essential to the strategy.
- **Gauteng Energy Security Strategy (GESS) (2016):** Since 2008 the Gauteng Provincial Government has been addressing provincial energy risks to ensure a reliable supply and the GESS was developed as part of managing provincial energy security and to address provincial energy risks through its Implementation Plan. Its direct objectives are for an enhanced security of supply, the uptake of energy efficiency and the modernisation of energy infrastructure. These can contribute significantly to the reduction of GHG emissions in Gauteng.

5 REQUIRED SECTOR SPECIFIC COLLABORATION

The successful Service Provider will be required to collaborate, consult and source information from the following institutions, including, but not limited to:

- Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) in order to ensure the alignment of the provincial inventory and its integration at national level. The experience of DFFE in developing and managing the NGHGIS and MRV system would prove invaluable for the project. Other National Departments such as Department of Mineral Resources and Energy, Department of Agriculture, Land Reform and Rural Development, Statistics South Africa, Department of Water and Sanitation.
- Gauteng Provincial Government Departments such as GCoGTA (Gauteng Department of Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs) who can provide data sets related to energy. Other relevant departments could be Economic Development (GDED), Human Settlements (GHS), Infrastructure Development (GDID) as well as Roads and Transport (GDRT).

- The three metropolitan municipalities of Tshwane, Johannesburg and Ekurhuleni as they are members of C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group and are large contributors to economic activities in the Province.
- The District Municipalities of Gauteng, to ensure all the necessary data is timely gathered and collated. They have high emitting sectors within their jurisdiction.
- Industry and also sector associations particularly the sectors that will have been identified as being the main emitters of GHG gases.
- Universities and other academic or research institutions which may be undertaking similar or related research or have climate related experts within their ranks such as the Gauteng City Region Observatory (GCRO).

6 PROJECT DESCRIPTION AND SPECIFICATION

7.1. Project Description

The purpose of the project is to develop a Gauteng GHG Emissions Inventory with a related MRV monitoring system that is aligned to the national system and in compliance to the IPCC Guidelines. The provincial institutional arrangements for an MRV system will facilitate reporting requirements on climate change to inform national and international stakeholders, strengthen national capacities and ensure sustainability of reporting processes. Access to the Inventory will be determined by the requirements of the users, transparency determination and the sensitivity of the information.

7.2. Problem Statement

The Gauteng Provincial Government needs to be aware of the GHG emissions profile for the Province, to understand the contribution to national GHG emissions and impacts of climate change. It must keep track of its efforts to reduce GHG emissions and how those efforts affect the GHG provincial emissions levels. Having reliable climate information on GHG emissions that is quantified, measured, reported and verified on a regular basis can provide confidence and enhance accountability of the climate responses.

7.3. Aim

To have a mechanism to measure, track and monitor GHG emissions in the province with the goal to chart a low carbon economy path for Gauteng.

7.4. Project Objectives

- Develop a Provincial GHG Inventory (in line with the latest DFFE National Inventory and the IPCC Guidelines) i.e., compile data to determine the Provincial GHG emissions and removals profile, report a comprehensive GHG inventory, and highlight gaps and areas of improvement. this will allow for the following:
 - ✓ Assess, measure, and track the GHG emissions in Gauteng.
 - ✓ Allow for long- and medium-term projection of GHG emissions.
 - ✓ Monitor and evaluate the performance of Gauteng in reducing its GHG emissions in terms of national targets.
 - ✓ Assess the effectiveness of related policies and legislation.
 - ✓ Contribute towards South Africa's international climate change mandatory reporting requirements to climate change bodies such as the UNFCCC.
 - ✓ It is anticipated that the Gauteng GHG Inventory and MRV system will be a useful and informative tool, to government officials at all levels, environmental management practitioners, scientists, educational institutions, industry stakeholders and the public.
 - ✓ This Terms of Reference document seeks to set requirements for the outsourcing of work relating to the data collection, interpretation, analysis and compilation Gauteng GHG Inventory and MRV system.

7 SCOPE OF WORK FOR SERVICE PROVIDER

- The Service Provider must compile and report of a provincial Greenhouse Gas emissions inventory from sources and removals from sinks, covering all sectors (province relevant subsectors), which should be consistent with the latest available national GHG Inventory Report and the IPCC Guidelines.
- The Provincial GHG emissions and removals profiles must make use of the most up to date data and information. In cases of data gaps, strategies to address these gaps should be employed and these should be highlighted, with recommendations for approaches to collect improved data included in the inventory report. For the AFOLU sector, specifically the Service Provider should make use of existing data of the National Terrestrial Carbon Sinks Assessments including resources contained in the National Terrestrial Carbon Sinks Atlas.
- The GHG inventory should be informed by analysis of best practices relating to GHG inventory systems and MRV systems utilised by subnational government in other locations in Africa and the world, particularly in developing countries.

- The Service Provider should consider the current Air Quality Management Plans available in the province and municipalities as well as other available documents that relate to the identified sectors emissions, and opportunities for alignment of data.
- Specially, the Service Provider should:
 - Determine the specific GHGs that will constitute the inventory.
 - Determine the collection and calculation methods to gather data or to compile the inventory and develop data collection templates as required.
 - Determine reporting frequency and reporting formats.
 - Prioritise specific sectors and sub-sectors that will be reported upon (such as AFOLU and Waste management sector)
 - Allow for the coordination, inventory preparation, management, and review of data.
 - Identify gaps, inconsistencies and uncertainties in data and reporting frameworks, and undertake actions overcome gaps, with recommendations for future improvements.
 - Identify the necessary institutional arrangements for the various stakeholders, such as data providers and other key roles, allowing for collaboration.
 - Determine the need to and provide for the development of legal and / or collaboration arrangements for the stakeholders (such as MOUs and data supply agreements).
 - Determine procedures to enable quality assurance and quality control of data and its analysis.
 - Recommend how the Provincial MRV system can support integration with other levels of government (National and Municipal).
 - Identify and implement a method to handle sensitive data or classified data where this may arise.
 - Recommend a process and structure for archiving and storage of data, building and maintaining of institutional memory.
 - Produce a detailed Inventory Report on the process, methods and key improvements needed. This should also document all assumptions and data sources.
 - Organise and manage stakeholder workshops as required for delivery of the tasks.

- Energy;
- Industrial Processes and Product Use (IPPU);
- Agriculture, Forestry and Other Land Use (AFOLU);
- Waste; and

8 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

- ✓ **Project Steering Committee:** The Service Provider should establish a Project Steering Committee (PSC), coordinate an inception meeting, produce an inception report, draft a project organogram, coordinate monthly PSC meetings, and produce a close-out Report and coordinate a close-out meeting, as part of the project delivery. In addition, the Service Provider is expected to produce monthly progress reports by the 5th business day of the following month.
- ✓ **Stakeholder Engagement Workshops:** The Service Provider should coordinate stakeholder workshops to enable consultation, collaboration and engagement for the delivery of assignment. The Service Provider must budget for hosting the workshops, venue, catering and any payments that could be required in relation to each engagement held. - Upon termination of the agreement for any reason whatsoever, the Service Provider must return all materials in its possession to the GDARD, regardless of whether such materials were originally supplied by the GDARD to the Service Provider or not. All web-based applications and software's generated as part of this project shall be the property of GDARD and shall be returned upon termination of the contract and shall not be utilised for any other project without the Department's consent.

16 EVALUATION METHODOLOGY

The tender will be evaluated and adjudicated in terms of the Public Finance Management Act (Act No. 1 of 1999), Preferential Procurement Policy Framework, Act no 5 of 2000, Preferential Procurement Regulations 2017, Supply Chain Management Policy of the Department of Agriculture and Rural Development and applicable Supply Chain Management Treasury Regulations.

The first stage will be the evaluation of bids on compliance which consist of Compliance, Administrative Requirements (Mandatory returnable Documents and other returnable documents) and Functionality criteria. During this stage, bids that do not meet the Mandatory documents requirements and the minimum threshold for functionality, will be disqualified and will not be considered for the second stage of evaluation, i.e., evaluation on Price and Preference Points.

Second Stage of evaluation: The 80/20-point system will apply to this project. 80 maximum points will apply to Price (Ps) and 20 maximum points will apply to B-BBEE status.

The bid will be evaluated in the two stages stated below:

Stage 1A: Administrative Compliance Evaluation

Stage 1B: Functionality Evaluation

Stage 2: Price and Preference Points evaluation

- ✓ **Preference = 20 Points**

16.1 STAGE 1: ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLIANCE AND FUNCTIONALITY EVALUATION

16.1.1 Stage 1A: Mandatory Returnable Documents

A bidder must submit the following mandatory documents as listed below

- c) Completed and signed Preference Points Claim Form SBD 6.1;

- e) A detailed project implementation plan with clear timeframes including the methodology, technical approach and costing (matching exactly the amount quoted in the Pricing Schedule); and
- f) A project organogram, clearly indicating the key project team/ key expertise in relation to the project with qualifications and detailed CVs for each project team member/ key expertise, attached thereto.

Please Note: non-adherence with the above will be cause the bid to be disqualified from the bid process.

 - An original or copy of the signed teaming agreement (the agreement must be signed by all party representatives, clearly indicate the leading partner and revenue split).
- e) Proof of registration with the National Treasury Central Supplier Database (CSD) (in the case of a partnership/consortium/joint venture, proof for each party is to be submitted)
- f) A valid Tax Compliance Status (TCS) pin from SARS (in the case of a partnership/consortium/joint venture, a TCS pin from SARS, for each party is to be submitted)

16.1.3 Stage 1A: BEE Validation Requirements

- f) The deponent shall sign the declaration in the presence of the commissioner of oaths (COA).

16.1.4 Stage 1B: Functionality Evaluation

Stage 1B will entail the evaluation of bids on functionality, as per the criteria contained in the table below – the total functionality points are 100 and the minimum functionality threshold is 65 points. During this stage bids that do not meet the minimum threshold for functionality will be disqualified and will not be considered for the second stage of evaluation i.e., evaluation on price and preference. It must be noted that the functionality points allocated will not form part of the total preference points.

Note: Any supplier scoring less than 65 points during this stage of evaluation shall not be considered for the next stage of the evaluation process.

NOTES

The purpose of this document is to:

- (i) Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and
- (ii) To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

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General Conditions of Contract

1. Definitions

1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
 - 1.1 “Closing time” means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
 - 1.2 “Contract” means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
 - 1.3 “Contract price” means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
 - 1.4 “Corrupt practice” means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
 - 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
 - 1.6 “Country of origin” means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
 - 1.7 “Day” means calendar day.
 - 1.8 “Delivery” means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
 - 1.9 “Delivery ex stock” means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
 - 1.10 “Delivery into consignees store or to his site” means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
 - 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.

- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

- 1.25 “Written” or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.
- 2. Application**
- 2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.
- 2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.
- 3. General**
- 3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.
- 3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from www.treasury.gov.za
- 4. Standards**
- 4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.
- 5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.**
- 5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.
- 5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.
- 5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier’s performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.
- 5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier’s records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.
- 6. Patent rights**
- 6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.
- 7. Performance**
- 7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award,

the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.

- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
- (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
 - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the

cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.

- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

12. Transportation

- 12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

13. Incidental services

- 13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
 - (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
 - (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
 - (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties,

- provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.

13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

14. Spare parts

14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:

- (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
- (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

15. Warranty

15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser

may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. Payment

- 16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
- 16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
- 16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
- 16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.

17. Prices

- 17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

18. Contract amendments

- 18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.

19. Assignment

- 19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

20. Subcontracts

- 20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

21. Delays in the supplier's performance

- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily

available.

21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.

21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:

- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
- (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
- (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.

23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the

envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

- (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
- (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
- (iii) the period of restriction; and
- (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

24. Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights

24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anti-dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which may be due to him

25. Force Majeure

- 25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.
- 25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

26. Termination for insolvency

- 26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of Disputes

- 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of liability

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
- (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and

- (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.
- 29. Governing language** 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.
- 30. Applicable law** 30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.
- 31. Notices** 31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice
- 31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.
- 32. Taxes and duties** 32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.
- 32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.
- 32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.
- 33. National Industrial Participation Programme (NIP)** 33.1 The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.
- 34. Prohibition of Restrictive practices** 34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).
- 34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.

- 34.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.
