1. Introduction

The SABS has a moral and legal obligation to ensure that employees, the public, and other parties are protected against environmental risks and hazards as well as occupational health and safety concerns whenever it is reasonably practical. From a practical and legal perspective, it is crucial for employees and management to have the proper knowledge and understanding of the law.

This service will reduce the difficulty individuals experience obtaining specific compliance requirements related to complexed environmental, health, and safety legislation.

The report cannot be used against the SABS in a legal or criminal case. 4. Auditors
