



NOTES

The purpose of this document is to:

(i) Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and

(ii) To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all hid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if (applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

General Conditions of Contract

1. Delintinas

- 1. The following terms shalf be interpreted as indicated:
- 1.1 "Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
- 1.2 "Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices therein and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
- 1.3 "Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
- 1.4 "Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procumement process or in contract execution.
- 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
- 1.6 "Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or submanial and major assembly of components, a compercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
- 1.7 "Day" mems calendar day.
- 1.8 "Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
- 1.9 "Delivery as stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
- 1.10 "Delivery into consignees store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplier are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
- 111 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad impries its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to have the local industries in the

RSA

- 1.12 "Force majoure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not forescenble. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, nots of the purchaser in its covereign espacity, ware or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions said freight embaggees.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any hidder, end includes collective practice among hidders (prior to or after hid submission) designed to establish hid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the hidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.25 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs made as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that parties of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such

obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

1.25 "Written" or "in writing" means handwritten in ink or coy form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

- 2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.
- 2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions thall apply.

3. General

- 3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.
- 3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bug X85, Preteria 0001, or accessed electronically from **New-treasury-bov-za**

4. Standards

4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

5. Use of existract documents and information; impossion.

- 5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information flurnished by or on behalf of the purchaser is connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.
- 5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.
- 5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause
 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier's performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.
- 5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by suditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

6. Patent rights

5.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of pasent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

7. Performance security

- 7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.
- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contrast, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
 - (a) s bank guerantee or an irrevocable latter of credit issued by a reputable bank focated in the purchaser's country or alread, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser, or
 - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

6. Impertions, tests and malynes

- 8.1 All pre-hidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or exception or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all seasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization setting on bahalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or

analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Pailing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the supplies that has comment one supplies for the capabilities supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplies further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expanse of the spoier.

- 8.8 The provisions of clauses $8.4 \pm 0.5.7$ shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.
- 9. Packing
- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be carfficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme surperstures, salt and precipitation during femali, and open storage, Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages ability provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other desuments to be famished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- II. Insurance
- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contrast shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.
- 12. Transportation
- 12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.
- 13. Incidental
- 19.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
 - performance or expervision of on-site assembly and/or (a) commissioning of the supplied goods;
 - formishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance **(b)**
 - of the supplied goods; furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual (c) for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;

- (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.
- 13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and thall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.
- 14. Spare parts
- 14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier;
 - (a) such spare parts as the purchases may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
 - (b) in the event of termination of production of the sparte parts;
 (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, famishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.
- 15. Wermanty
- 15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.
- 15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (16) months after the date of shipment from the part or place of leading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.
- 15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this waventy.
- 15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.
- 15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, falls to stanedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed in take

such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expanse and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. Payment

- 16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
- 16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
- 16.3 Payments shell be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
- 16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stigulated in SCC.

17. Prices

17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services parformed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

18. Contract

- 18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written atneadment signed by the parties concerned.
- 19. Assignment
- 19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the parchaser's prior written consent.

20. Subcontragis

20.1 The supplier shall notify the numbers in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

21. Delays in the supplier's performance

- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and parformance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(a) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(a). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser thall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or survices from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the

- supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplier are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.
- 21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time it agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6 Upon any dulay beyond the delivery puriod in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the sants quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, he entitled to plain damages from the supplier.

22. Penaltine

22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or imperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

- 23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written tortice of default scat to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:
 - (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods withtn the period(e) specified in the contact, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
 - (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
 - (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulem practices in competing for or in executing the contract.
- 23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may process, upon such terms and in such manner as it decres epiropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.
- 23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by probabiliting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.
- 23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any

person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the savisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier find to respond within the stipulated finateou (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

- 23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any parmer, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise central over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.
- 23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:
 - the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
 - (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
 - (hii) the period of restriction; and
 - (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be leaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2064, the court may also rate that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a person will be prohibited from and not more than 10 years. The National Tressury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Tressury website.

24. Anti-Sumping end countervalling duties and rights 24.1 When, after the date of bld, provisional payments are required, or antidamping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a
provisional payment or anti-damping or countervailing right is
increased in respect of any damped or subsidized import, the State is
not liable for any amount so required or supposed, or for the amount of
any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional
payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or
countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such
provisional payment or any such right is reduced, say such favourable
difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the
State or the State may deduct such amounts from maneys (if any)
which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or
services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in
terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which

may be due to him

25. Farce Majeure

- 25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for furfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majoure,
- 25.2 If a force majoure situation arises, the capplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the couract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majoure event.

26. Termination for insolvency

26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect eny cight of action or remedy which has scenario or will scorne thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of

- 27.) If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute of difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this menter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Netwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings
 - (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier my monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of liability

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful miscondact, and in
 - the case of infiringement pursuant to Clouse 6;
 (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, test, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and

- (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in test or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.
- 29. Governing language
- 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties aball also be written in English.
- 30. Applicable law
- 30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.
- 31. Notices
- 31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or partified shall and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary shall of the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice.
- 31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such afterested notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.
- 32. Taxes and
- 32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed dutied the purchaser's country.
- 32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duries, license free, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.
- 32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate amust be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.
- 33. National 33.1 Industriei Participation (NIP) Programme
- The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.
- 34 Prohibition of Restrictive practices
- 14.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (fill) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a hurizontal relationship and if a bidder (a) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).
- 34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative parallels as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.

34.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the putchener may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remady provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public scotor for a puriod not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. The South African Social Security Agency ("SASSA") is a statutory body that is mandated to ensure effective and efficient delivery of services of high quality with regards to management and administration of social grants. Further, SASSA is mandated to ensure that the entire processes and systems from application to payment of social grants is performed in a manner that is sensitive, caring and restores the dignity of beneficiaries as well as the integrity of the social security system.
- 1.2. SASSA was established in terms of the South African Social Security Agency Act of 2004 (Act no. 9 of 2004) as a Schedule 3A Entity according to the Public Finance Management Act (PFMA) Act 1 of 1999 as amended, to administer social security grants in terms of the Social Assistance Act, 2004 (Act no. 13 of 2004).
- 1.3. The principal aim of the South African Social Security Agency Act is to make provision for the effective management, administration and payment of social assistance through the establishment of the South African Social Security Agency.
- 1.4. SASSA Gauteng operates in 5 districts; viz. Ekurhuleni, Tshwane, West Rand, Johannesburg and Sedibeng, 40 local offices and 33 service point within these district. Each district office and local offices are responsible for the efficient and effective administration and management of social assistance.
- 1.5. Amongst the social grants offered by the Agency are disability related grants which require applicants to be subjected to assessments conducted by Health Practitioners. These disability related grants are as follows:
- 1.5.1. A Person is eligible for a Disability Grant (DG), in terms of the requirements set out in section 9 of the Social Assistance Act of 2004 as amended, and in regulation 2(B), (c), (d) and (e) as amended in May 2022. This grant can be awarded on a temporary basis for a period of between 6 and 12 months after which the grant is lapsed or a permanent basis to those in which the disability is expected to last for longer than 12 consecutive months. The DG may be reviewed at any time where there is reason to believe that the medical circumstances of the beneficiary might have changed or when the beneficiary is due for such Medical Review.
- 1.5.2. The Care Dependency Grant (CDG), which in terms of the section 7(a)of the Social Assistance Act of 2004, as amended in May 2022, is awarded to "...a parent, primary care giver or foster parent of a child who requires and receives permanent care or support services due to his or her physical or mental disability". The CDG may be reviewed at

any time where there is reason to believe that the medical circumstances of the child might have changed or when the child is due for such Medical Review.

1.5.3. The Grant in Aid, which in terms of section 9(b) of the Social Assistance Act of 2004, as amended, is awarded to a person who "...is in such a physical or mental condition that he or she requires regular attendance by another person".

2. OBJECTIVES

- 2.1. The objective of this expression of interest is to appoint and contract suitable Health Practitioners (individuals and/or firms) to conduct medical assessment on clients wishing to apply for disability related grants on behalf of the South African Social Security Agency (SASSA) Gauteng Region for a period of thirty-six (36) months so as to:
- 2.1.1. Improve access to disability related grants.
- 2.1.2. Improve the quality of conducting medical assessments.
- 2.1.3. Improve relations with contracted disability assessors.

3. SCOPE OF WORK ON MEDICAL ASSESSMENT

- 3.1. Health practitioners will conduct medical assessment on applicants wishing to apply for disability related grants on behalf of the South African Social Security Agency (SASSA) in Gauteng Region.
- 3.2. Conduct medical assessments as and when ordered by SASSA on clients booked at the designated assessment sites.
- 3.3. Refer applicants for additional required services, e.g. at Department of Health and other specialist for treatment optimization.
- 3.4. From time to time, the Agency shall request the Health Practitioners and firms to do home visits to assess applicants as requested.
- 3.5. The contracted Health Practitioners will report to their respective District or Local Office Managers or their delegates.
- 3.6. Meetings between SASSA and individual Health Practitioners and / or Firms will be held as and when required to address any issues of interest.
- 3.7. The duration of the contract shall be for a period of thirty-six (36) months.

4. HEALTH PRACTITIONER'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- 4.1. Successful Health Practitioners will undergo compulsory trainings on disability management conducted by SASSA before conducting assessment.
- 4.2. Bill the Agency for completed medical assessments.
- 4.3. Maintain confidentiality over information.
- 4.4. Every Health practitioner/firm will maintain a full register of all applicants and/or beneficiaries examined and assessed using EMAST booking register the following information will be required:
- 4.4.1. Full names and surnames of applicant and ID number
- 4.4.2. Date, time and place of examination
- 4.4.3. Submit a copy of the register which will be used to compare against the time sheet of the Health Practitioners.
- 4.5. The entities will be individually required to comply with administrative requirements.
- 4.6. Health Practitioners shall ensure that alternative Health Practitioners are deployed immediately to the site in case where Health Practitioners scheduled cannot honor their scheduled appointment.
- 4.7. Health Practitioners shall adhere to the agreed time frames as set by SASSA in the Service Level Agreement (SLA).

5. SASSA'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- 5.1. SASSA shall subject all successful Health Practitioners to compulsory trainings on disability be management before conducting assessment.
- 5.2. Communicate assessments timeously on clients booked by SASSA at the designated assessment sites.
- 5.3. Scrutinize completed medical referral forms, upon completing assessment forms to a designated SASSA official servicing the assessment site.
- 5.4. The Agency shall pay all bills for the verified completed medical assessments.
- 5.5. From time to time, the Agency shall request the Health Practitioners and /or firms to do home visits to assess applicants.
- 5.6. The Agency shall use the copy of EMAST register to compare against the time sheet of the Health Practitioners.
- 5.7. Quality Assurance of completed medical assessment forms.
- 5.8. Provision of training or retraining whenever necessary.

5.9. SASSA shall implement measures that will monitor quality of work done by Health Practitioners. These may include, monitoring the process at assessment sites, random sampling of completed medical assessment forms to evaluate if the forms are properly completed, assessing the statistics of the various health practitioner and any other quality assurance measure deemed fit to preserve high quality outcome assessments.

6. REQUIRED PROFILE FOR HEALTH PRACTITIONERS AND FIRMS

- 6.1. Proof of qualification as a Health practitioner (Certified copies of qualification not more than six months).
- 6.2. South African Qualification Authority (SAQA) Certificate for all foreign qualifications.
- 6.3. Registration Certificate as an independent Health Practitioner with the Health Professions Council of South Africa (HPCSA).
- 6.4. Proof of Renewed and valid registration with the Health Professions Council of South Africa (HPCSA) as a Health Practitioner.
- 6.5. HPCSA certificate of good standing.
- 6.6. Minimum of two (2) years' experience as an independent Health Practitioner.
- 6.7. Updated detailed Curriculum Vitae for Health Practitioner(s).
- 6.8. Must be registered with the National Treasury Central Supplier Database (CSD).
- 6.9. CIPC certificate in case of a firm.
- 6.10. Must have a valid tax printed PIN and must be tax compliant on CSD.
- 6.11. Certified copies of individual documents for all company directors/members/owners not older than six months.
- 6.12. Proof of health practice address or residential address if freelancing.
- 6.13. Work permit in case of non-residence.
- 6.14. Submit Remunerative work outside public service (RWOPS) if employed by state institution.
- 6.15. The ability to conduct assessments at SASSA's designated sites within Gauteng province.
- 6.16. Must have the ability and experience in the analysis of health information for the purpose of determining eligibility.
- 6.17. Must not be a health professional who have been excluded or suspended from conducting medical evaluations for SASSA/ Department of Health/ Department of Transport (RAF)/ Correctional Services and others.
- 6.18. Must not have been committed any Social Grants related fraud.

Terms of Reference for the contracting of Health Practitioners (Individuals and/or Firms) who will be accredited to conduct Medical Assessments for SASSA Gauteng Region for a period of thirty-Six (36) months

- 6.19. Must not have been convicted in any court of law.
- 6.20. Must not have been excluded from any other Government service.
- 6.21. Firms must contract with Health Professionals who have the ability and experience in the analysis of health information for the purpose of determining eligibility.

7. COMPETENCIES REQUIRED FOR HEALTH PRACTITIONERS

- 7.1. Health / Clinical medical expertise.
- 7.2. Data analysis.
- 7.3. Time management.
- 7.4. People management and customer focus.
- 7.5. Negotiation skills.
- 7.6. Problem solving and analysis.

8. ACCREDITATION PROCESS

8.1. Pre-qualification criteria

- 8.1.1. Compulsory Briefing session will be held as an essential part of this bidding process, as it promotes efficiency, transparency and equality. The briefing session will further afford the bidders an opportunity to clearly understand the services required and the environment in which the services will be rendered.
- 8.1.2. Briefing session will be conducted in **Benoni SASSA Offices**.

NB: Failure to attend the compulsory Briefing session will disqualify bidder's proposal.

8.2. Stage One - Phase One: Administrative Compliance

- 8.2.1. A valid tax printed PIN with tax compliant status on CSD.
- 8.2.2. Proof of company registration (CIPC), in the case of a firm.
- 8.2.3. Submit fully completed and signed SBD 1 and SBD 4 forms.
- 8.2.4. Certified copies of identity document, and for all shareholders in the case of firms (not older than six months).
- 8.2.5. Registration on Central Supplier Database (CSD).

NB: Bidders may be requested to submit outstanding information within a given time and failure to comply will lead to disqualification of the BID.

8.3. Stage One- Phase Two: Mandatory Requirements

- 8.3.1. Proof of annual membership with HPCSA (Renewal slip acceptable).
- 8.3.2. Registration Certificate as an independent Health Practitioner with the Health Professions Council of South Africa (HPCSA). Minimum of two (2) years' experience as an independent Health Practitioner.
- 8.3.3. Valid Certificate of good standing with HPCSA or Proof of payment for certificate of good standing.
- 8.3.4. Updated detailed Curriculum Vitae for Health Practitioners.
- 8.3.5. Certified copies of qualifications (within six months).
- 8.3.6. Proof of health practitioner's address or residential address if freelancing.
- 8.3.7. Certified copy of work permit (within six months) In the case of non-residence.
- 8.3.8. Submit an RWOPS (Remuneration work outside of Public Services) if employed by any state institution.

NB: 1- Bidders who submitted proof of payment for the certificate of good standing will be activated only when the actual valid certificate of good standing is received.

NB: 2 - Failure to submit or comply with compulsory requirements will result in the bidder being disqualified.

9. ACCREDITATION AND BID CONDITIONS

The performance of the Health Practitioners will be closely supported and monitored by SASSA through the following measures:

- 9.1. Health Practitioner and/or firms:
- 9.1.1. Must not have been convicted in a court of law for Social Grants related fraud.
- 9.1.2. Must not have been excluded or suspended from any Government service.
- 9.1.3. Must not have been found guilty of misconduct or facing disciplinary charges by the Health Professions Council of South Africa (HPCSA).
- 9.2. The costs of preparing proposals and negotiating the contract will not be reimbursed.
- 9.3. The Agency is not bound to accept any of the proposals submitted and reserves the right to call for presentations from short-listed interested parties before final selection.
- 9.4. Health Practitioner/firm with non-compliance tax status on CSD at awarding may be disqualified.
- 9.5. No late submission will be considered.

10. CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION

- 10.1. All completed medical assessment forms, information and assessment books remain the property of SASSA.
- 10.2. Health practitioners must provide their own transport to the assessment sites.
- 10.3. The Health Practitioner will be requested in writing by the Grant Administration Manager/Local Office Manager or any delegated authority of the Agency to travel to that particular assessment venue.
- 10.4. Health Practitioners must provide their own medical equipment that is ENT 3 in 1 set, Stethoscope, BP Machine, Tongue Presser and Knew Hummer to be utilized when required. In the case of the firm of health professionals, firms must ensure that Health Professionals have all stated medical equipment necessary to make assessment possible.
- 10.5. All information, documents and reports must be regarded as confidential and may not be made available to any unauthorized person or institution without the written consent of the Agency.
- 10.6. The Health Practitioner is entitled to general knowledge acquired in the execution of this agreement and may use it, provided that it shall not be to the detriment of the Agency.
- 10.7. The Health Practitioner will be expected to formally hand over completed task/work to the relevant official of the Agency.
- 10.8. The Agency will become the owner of all information, documents, programs, advice and reports collected and compiled by the Health Practitioner in the execution of this agreement.
- 10.9. The copyright of all documents, programs and reports compiled by the Health Practitioner will vest in the Agency and may not be reproduced or distributed or made available in any other way without the written consent of the Agency.
- 10.10. The Agency will furnish the contracted Health Practitioners and firms with the necessary infrastructure and relevant available information that might be necessary for execution of the contract.
- 10.11. The maximum number of applicant to be assessed should not exceed 40 per session unless directed otherwise when the need arises.
- 10.12. SASSA undertakes to make full payment within 30 (thirty) days of all valid claims for work done to its satisfaction upon presentation of a substantiated claim.
- 10.13. No payment will be made where there is outstanding information/work not submitted by the Health Practitioner until that outstanding information is submitted.
- 10.14. Health Practitioners will be paid amount determined by SASSA time to time inclusive of

- VAT and also considering factors such as CPI increment.
- 10.15. Health Practitioner will be paid per completed assessment within 30 days of SASSA receiving a correct and valid tax invoice.
- 10.16. The Health Practitioner is entitled to claim transport costs calculated in accordance with the Department of Transport public sector transport tariff guideline for kilometers travelled by Health Practitioners for purposes of conducting Medical Assessments.
- 10.17. Transport costs shall be claimed for distances exceeding 80 (eighty) kilometers from the place of work or residence of the Health Practitioner or whichever is nearer, to and from the designated assessment venue or as amended by SASSA.
- 10.18. The agency may review the traveling SOP/conditions if deemed necessary.
- 10.19. Transport costs will not exceed the cost of a sedan motor vehicle with an engine capacity of 2000cc.
- 10.20. Profiling of the Health Practitioners assessments in respect to number of assessments conducted, diagnoses made and payments received and other related issues.
- 10.21. The parties, SASSA and Health Practitioners shall enter into a Service Level Agreement (SLA) upon acceptance of appointment letters.
