SECTION 2: BACKGROUND, PURPOSE, AND SCOPE OF WORK

2.1 Background and/or Purpose of this Bid

Since its inception 32 years ago, Airports Company South Africa SOC Limited (ACSA) has transformed into a focused commercial enterprise that is market-driven and customer service oriented. The company was formed in 1993 as a public company under the Companies Act of 1973, as amended, and the Airports Company Act of 1993, as amended.

ACSA operates South Africa's Nine (9) principal airports, comprised of the country's major international airports, namely, O.R. Tambo (ORTIA), Cape Town (CTIA) and King Shaka (KSIA) and the smaller regional airports, namely, Chief Dawie Stuurman International Airport (PLZ), King Phalo Airport (ELN), George Airport (GRJ), Bram Fischer (BRAM), Kimberley Airport (KMB), Upington (UTN). ACSA's registered corporate office operates from Airport Park in Kempton Park right next to the OR Tambo International Airport.

ACSA's vision is to be the most sought-after partner in the world for the provision of sustainable airport management solutions by 2030. ACSA's strategy is to create and operate world-class airports measuring up to international standards, its strategic intent is supported by three strategic pillars, namely:

- Run Airports: Run our airports efficiently, optimally, and innovatively.
- Develop Airports: Optimise assets and plan for new capacity and growth opportunities.
- Grow Footprint: Seek growth opportunities in the continent and world.

Cape Town International Airport (CTIA) has, in line with its approved Expansion Master Plan, started with planning for future infrastructure. One of the key elements to its expansion is increased airfield capacity driven by increasing passenger numbers and aircraft operators. Increased runway and apron capacity is integral to CTIA's ability to increase its offering to airlines for key time slots. In line with the above, the need for additional runway infrastructure (additional taxiways, rapid exit taxiways and new Code F compliant parallel taxiways) as well as expansion of aircraft parking stands is evident.



In line with the airport masterplan, the terminals will expand in an easterly direction towards the current runway, displacing existing apron parking bays. This in turn necessitates the construction of new bays to replace those that have been displaced as well as to cater for future growth. Given the number of bays required, preliminary designs have shown that the current runway 01/19 in its existing configuration will limit much of the planned expansion, and as a result will have to be relocated to allow for terminal and apron bay expansion. Furthermore, the new runway orientation will be turned 11,5 degrees to the east to avoid the obstacle created by Tygerberg Hill from the northern approach.

2.2 Scope of Work

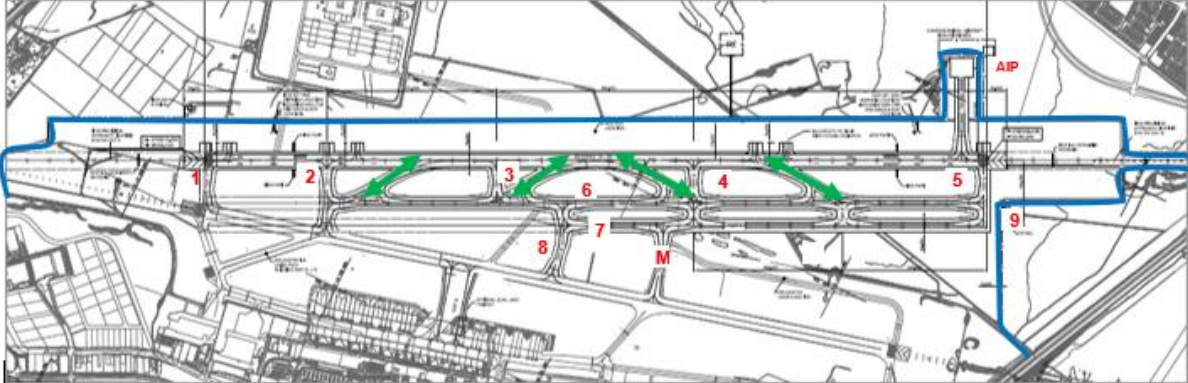
The scope of works is to construct a new re-aligned runway at Cape Town International Airport with its associated taxiways and navigational aids to primarily facilitate safe touchdown and safe guidance of aircraft to and from an appropriate taxiway and apron in all weather conditions all year round.

The updated Master Plan for CTIA requires that a new runway be constructed east of the existing main runway. The northern end of the new runway is located 220 meters to the east of the northern end of the current runway 01-19 and is rotated approximately 11,5 degrees in the anticlockwise direction in relation to runway 01-19. The runway designation is therefore 18-36. In this configuration, the original runway 01-19 is no longer used for regular movements (landings and take-offs) but will remain as a taxiway. Runway 16-34 will be discarded for further use.

The scope of the project was adjusted during the stakeholder engagement process as follows:

- Addition of a new link taxiway between the northern end of the main apron and the current main runway 01-19
- Inclusion of the Isolated Aircraft Parking Position (IAPP)
- Addition of the Satellite Fire Station
- Addition of fillets at the intersection of the 36 threshold and taxiway 5 (south end)

The new scope of works is indicated in the drawing below:



New Runway 18/36 with associated Taxiways, showing the current Runway 01/19 being used as a taxiway

The Works include design, engineering, manufacture, supply, construction, installation, quality assurance, finishing, testing, commissioning and complete in working order of the following (in summary):

Airside Civil and Building Works

- New RWY 18-36 and associated taxiways
- Two new Rapid Exit Taxiways (RETs) on RWY 18-36
- New inner parallel taxiway (TWY 6) and partly outer taxiway (TWY 7)
- Connecting the new taxiways to the existing RWY 01-19
- Connecting RWY 01-19 to the Alpha Taxilane at Apron B31
- Satellite fire station
- Drainage and stormwater systems
- Mole protection
- Perimeter road and service roads and parking to airside facilities
- Emergency service roads
- Construction/Maintaining connecting taxiway to the SAPS Airwing apron
- Permanent fencing and emergency gates, and temporary construction fencing (NKP standard)
- Related civil and building works for services, visual aids, communications and NAVAIDS and meteorological equipment
- Temporary location for mobile DVOR to serve RWY 01-19
- Final location of DVOR and RX sites
- Demolition works
- Rehabilitation of the site
- Line markings



The scope of works for **airside electrical works** is the design, supply, delivery, installation, testing, commissioning and upholding during the defect's notification period of the following equipment and materials:

- The MV network from the Power & Lighting Substation to the 2 new substations 18 and Substation 36
- LV network to the different aviation support systems including power cables and cable accessories
- Alterations to the existing Standby Generator controller system or replacement of the entire control system
- Earthing of equipment
- Disconnection, decommission and removal of redundant electrical equipment and cables
- Power monitoring equipment (Communication equipment only)
- Testing and commissioning of the new electrical equipment
- Training Airports Company South Africa staff in the operation and maintenance of the new electrical equipment
- Relocation of existing services

The scope of works for **navigational aids (NAVAIDS), communication and meteorological (Meteo)** systems works is defined as follows:

- New Airfield Ground Lighting (AGL) on RWY 18-36
- Upgrading where appropriate existing AGL on interfacing TWY's
- Navigational Aids: ILS systems CAT III B
- Relocation measures for RX and DVOR
- New Meteorological Equipment
- Communication and control network for above systems
- Updating ATC tower desks for AGL, NAVAIDS and Meteo information
- Distribution of Power - Main, standby and UPS power for above systems

The **airside Mechanical systems** shall include design, supply and construction of:

- Pressurisation systems
- HVAC systems
- Fire protection system which consists of Fire detection, Gas suppression, cable coating, fire protection signage and fire extinguishers
- The control systems and linkage with the Airport BMS (Building Management System) and Power and Lighting complex's SCADA system
- The infrastructure affected by these works include new Substation 18R and 36L, Glidepath rooms and DVOR rooms.

The scope of works for the **IT works** include the following:

- Tetra Radio Network
- CCTV
- Perimeter intrusion detection system (PIDS)
- Telephone from substations
- Fiber network for transmission of data from Nav aids to Maintenance complex and ATNS
- Fiber network for transmission of data from CCTV and PIDS to the ACSA Control Room
- Capacity and information Backup

Stages 1 and 2 designs have been previously completed, and this will be issued to the Design and Build contractor. The contractor is to finalise the Stage 3 design making use of the relevant regulatory, SANS and ACSA standards. The design reviews shall be done between the contractor's design team, JMT and ACSA technical team (discipline engineers) at various stages of the planning and design process and in intervals during execution and concluded at Close out. The JMT and ACSA technical team shall provide inputs, comments and accept the following elements of the greenfield development:

Design standards and Specifications worth noting for the works:

- South African Civil Aviation Technical Standards.
- ICAO Annexure 3,4, 14
- SACATS 139.01.30 (if road markings are included in this scope)
- SANS Standards
- COTO Standard Specification
- ICAO Aerodromes Design Manual and Advanced Surface Movement Guidance and Control Systems
- IEC 61823 and 61822
- Other relevant ICAO standards
- IATA Development Manual
- Etc

2.3 Description of the Services

Standard professional services as per the Guideline Scope of Services rendered by persons registered in the relevant Built Environment Councils - (SACPCMP; SACAP; SACQSP; ECSA). The Capital programme includes building, civil; structural, mechanical and electrical related works.

2.4 Pricing Schedule

The pricing structure for the professional services fees are as per section C2.2: Pricing Schedule in the NEC PSC Contract document provided as a separate annexure to this tender.



SECTION 3: EVALUATION CRITERIA

3.1 Evaluation Criteria

3.1.1 ACSA will use a pre-determined evaluation criterion when considering received bids. The evaluation criteria will consider **mandatory administrative, functionality, Price and Preference**. During the evaluation of received bids ACSA will make an assessment whether all the bids comply with set minimum requirements and whether all returnable documents/information have been submitted. Bidders which fail to meet minimum requirements, thresholds or have not submitted required mandatory documents will be disqualified from the bid process.

3.1.2 The requirements of any given stage must be complied with prior to progression to the next stage. ACSA reserves the right to disqualify bidders without requesting any outstanding document/information.

3.2 A staged approach will be used to evaluate bids and the approach will be as follows:

3.3 Mandatory Requirements

A list of mandatory returnable documents must be consulted to understand which documents are required at the closing date and time. Further, to the mandatory returnable documents/information ACSA will only consider bidders which have:

- a) Attendance of compulsory briefing session. – Bidder must sign the register during the briefing session and have their Attendance certificate signed by an ACSA representative to meet this criteria.
- b) Completed in full and signed Form of offer – C1.1.

3.4. Functionality

Definitions:

- **"Multi-disciplinary complex projects"** are projects which involved multiple disciplines for the design and construction.
- **Acceptable projects being** (For all disciplines except the Pavement Engineer): New construction or Expansions, of Airport Terminals, Shopping Centres, Hospitals, Office Parks, Hospitality buildings, Major Transport Hubs, Warehouses, Factories, Harbours, Power Plants etc. (Not limited to these).

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Dual Appointments/Exclusivity Agreements

The Parties agree that any individual, firm, or entity that is a member of the Joint Monitoring Team (JMT), or is directly involved in the monitoring, evaluation, or oversight of the New Realigned Runway at Cape Town International Airport under this Agreement, shall be prohibited from:

- Participating in any capacity in the procurement, bidding, or execution of the related Design-Build Contract for the same project.
- Providing consulting, design, construction, or advisory services under the Design-Build Contract.

4.3 Validity of submitted information

SECTION 8: TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF RFP

8.1 Conditions of the request for proposal

- 8.1.1 This RFP is open only to bidders who are registered and duly authorised to provide the Services in South Africa.
- 8.1.2 Any bids received after the tender closing date and time **14th of October 2025 at 12:00am (Midday)** shall not be considered by ACSA and therefore be disqualified. These bids shall be retained unopened and destroyed after the award of the contract to the successful bidder unless a written request for the return thereof is received from the relevant bidder within thirty (30) days of the award.
- 8.1.3 Except where specifically provided for in this RFP, a bidder may make no changes to its bid after the closing time and date.
- 8.1.4 ACSA reserves the right to award the contract on the basis of bid submitted by a bidder subject to ACSA's terms and conditions and by submission of its bid the bidder agrees to be legally bound thereby if its bid is accepted by ACSA.
- 8.1.5 ACSA or its duly appointed representatives shall be the sole adjudicators of the acceptability and or feasibility of the bids. The decision shall be final and except as required by law or otherwise, no reason for the acceptance or rejection of any bid will be furnished.
- 8.1.6 If the bid has been awarded on the strength of information furnished by a Bidder, which information is proved to have been incorrect, in addition to any other legal remedy it may have, ACSA may at any time during the life of the contract:
- a) Recover from the relevant bidder all costs, losses or damages incurred by it as a result of the award; and/or
 - b) Cancel the award of the bid and/or contract and claim any damages, which it may have suffered or will suffer as a result of having to make less favourable arrangements.
- 8.1.7 The Bidder shall be liable to pay for losses sustained and/or additional costs or expenditure incurred by ACSA as a result of cancellation. ACSA shall furthermore have the right to recover such losses, damages or additional costs by way of set off against monies due or which may become due to the Bidder in terms of the said contract.
- 8.1.8 If ACSA and the successful Bidder fail to enter into or execute a formal written contract within thirty (30) days of the award (or such later date as may be determined by ACSA as a result of the bidder's failure to comply with any representation made in the bidder's bid, then the award shall be deemed null and void. ACSA's aforesaid rights are without prejudice and in addition to any other rights that ACSA may have in order to claim damages. For the avoidance of doubt, in the event the bid of a successful bidder is accepted by ACSA, no agreement shall come into being until the formal contract has been negotiated and executed between ACSA and the successful bidder.



- 8.1.9 ACSA reserves the right to amend the terms and conditions of this RFP at any time prior to finalisation of the contract between the parties and shall not be liable to any bidder or any other person for damages of whatsoever nature which they may have suffered as a result of such amendment. All bids are submitted at the entire risk of the bidder.
- 8.1.10 All representations, agreements or arrangements arising from bids submitted in terms hereof (including any negotiations that follow) shall not be binding on ACSA, its officers, employees or agents unless reduced to writing and signed by a duly authorised representative of ACSA.
- 8.1.11 ACSA reserves the right to postpone the closing date for submission of bids or to withdraw the RFP at any time.
- 8.1.12 Appendix 1 must be executed in the name of the business actually proposing to perform the Services if awarded the contract. Appendix 1 must be signed by an authorised representative of the bidder.
- 8.1.13 In the case of a joint venture or partnership between The Service Provider, evidence of such a joint venture must be included in the bid in the form of a Joint Venture Agreement or Memorandum of Understanding. Each member of the joint venture may complete and sign Appendix 1. Alternatively, all the members of the joint venture may in writing nominate one member of the joint venture to complete and sign Appendix 1 on behalf of the joint venture. This written authority must be signed by duly authorised members of the joint venture and be submitted with the proposal.

8.2 Binding Arbitration Provision

- 8.2.1 It is a condition of participation in this RFP process between the bidder and ACSA that should any dispute or difference arise between the parties, this shall be resolved by a single Arbitrator -
- Concerning the purport or effect of the RFP documents or of anything required to be done or performed there under;
 - Concerning any aspect of the RFP process to anything done or decided there under: or
 - Concerning the validity of the award of the RFP to any bidder or the failure to award same to any Bidder, then such dispute or difference shall be finally resolved by arbitration.
- 8.2.2 Such arbitration shall be by a single arbitrator who shall be –
- Selected by agreement between the parties, or failing such agreement nominated on the application of any party by the Arbitration Foundation of Southern Africa (AFSA); and
 - The arbitrator shall have power to open up, review and revise any certificate, opinion, decision, requisition or notice relating to all matters in dispute submitted to him/her and to determine all such matters in the same manner as if no such certificate, opinion, decision, requisition or notice had been issued.
- 8.2.3 Upon every or any such reference, the costs of an incidental to the reference and award shall be in the discretion of the arbitrator, who may determine the amount of the costs, or direct them to be taxed as between attorney and client or as between party and party and shall direct by whom and to whom and in what manner they shall be borne and paid.



- 8.2.4 The award of the arbitrator shall be final and binding on the parties and any party shall be entitled to apply to the Courts to have such award made an order of court.
- 8.2.5 Save as set out in this clause, the arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of the Arbitration Foundation of Southern Africa.
- 8.2.6 The arbitration shall be held in Johannesburg in the English language.
- 8.2.7 However, nothing in this clause shall preclude any party to the arbitration from seeking interlocutory relief in any court having jurisdiction pending the institution of a review or other appropriate proceedings for legal redress.
- 8.2.8 Such arbitration shall be commenced and concluded within 30 days of the dispute having noted.

5. **COPIES**
- 5.1 The receiving party may only make such copies of the disclosing party's confidential information as are strictly necessary for the purpose and the disclosures which are not in breach of this agreement and authorised in terms of this agreement. The receiving party shall clearly mark all such copies as "Confidential".
- 5.2 At the written request of the disclosing party, the receiving party shall supply to the disclosing party a list showing, to the extent practical –
- 5.2.1 where copies of the confidential Information are held;
- 5.2.2 copies that have been made by the receiving party (except where they contain insignificant extracts from or references to confidential information) and where they are held; and



5.2.3 the names and addresses of the persons to whom confidential information has been disclosed and, if applicable, a copy of the confidentiality undertaking signed by such persons complying with the provisions of this agreement.

- 3.4 The terms of the accompanying bid have not been, and will not be, disclosed by the bidder, directly or indirectly, to any competitor, prior to the date and time of the official bid opening or of the awarding of the contract.
- 3.5 There have been no consultations, communications, agreements or arrangements made by the bidder with any official of the procuring institution in relation to this procurement process prior to and during the bidding process except to provide clarification on the bid submitted where so required by the institution; and the bidder was not involved in the drafting of the specifications or terms of reference for this bid.
