TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A SUITABLE SERVICE PROVIDER TO AUDIT TECHNICAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING COLLEGES IMMOVABLE ASSETS BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND TRAINING.

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REQUEST FOR TENDER

Terms of Reference for the appointment of a suitable Service Provider to Audit Technical and Vocational Education and Training Colleges Immovable Assets by the Department of Higher Education and Training.

The Department of Higher Education and Training (the Department) is requesting potential service providers/consultant/consultants/experts to submit proposals for a tender to Audit Technical and Vocational Education and Training Colleges Immovable Assets at all TVET College sites of activity (Annexure A).

PART A - INFORMATION ON THE TENDER

1. BACKGROUND

1.1 The Department of Higher Education and Training is planning to support TVET colleges to develop a TVET immovable asset register, conduct a conditional technical assessment to establish the status quo of TVET infrastructure, quality assure the sourced data, load the data into the Infrastructure software platform Archibus, recommend appropriate remedial interventions, prioritize in terms of criticality and priority (as per National Immovable Asset Maintenance Management Standard), and determine the associated cost estimates.

2. PURPOSE OF THE TENDER

2.1 The purpose of the tender is to develop an asset and condition register for the 50 TVET Colleges, assess maintenance priorities and costs, quality assure data, and develop infrastructure management capacity at the Department and TVET Colleges.

3. SCOPE OF WORK

- 3.1 The scope of the appointed service provider will be to:
- 3.1.1 Update the current GRAP 17 asset register (Book Value) per college
- 3.1.2 Create an immovable asset register with infrastructure condition assessments (Archibus).

- 3.1.3 Create an Annual Maintenance Plan with priorities and costing (NIAMMS).
- 3.1.4 Adhere to the set Barcoding Standard (Annexure B)
- 3.1.5 Produce a site layout for each college site (Annexure C)
- 3.1.6 Provide site Audit services for all immovable Assets (buildings & fixed components) on the sites summarised below:

- 3.1.7 Collect data where existing data is insufficient i.e. for the GRAP 17 register
- 3.1.8 Meet all data quality requirements as specified by the Archibus System and its reporting requirements.
- 3.1.9 Training of Departmental and College Staff to maintain the immovable asset data and to add and update information.

4. **DEFINITION OF WORK**

4.1 The Condition Asset Register

The provider shall segment and classify TVET college immovable asset portfolio(s) according to the National Infrastructure Asset Maintenance Management Standard (NIAMMS), which requires the level of maintenance-significant items in accordance with a predetermined asset hierarchy, and shall furthermore, for purposes of

maintenance and renewals planning, determine and record the following information against each asset in its asset register:

- a) Asset identification number;
- b) Physical description;
- c) Physical parameters;
- d) Estimated useful life:
- e) Actual and minimum acceptable asset failure mode ratings (condition, performance, capacity and cost-of-operations);
- f) Remaining useful life;
- g) Current and depreciated replacement cost;
- h) Asset criticality rating;
- i) Photographic Reportage;
- j) Any statutory obligations regarding the operation and maintenance of the asset;
 and
- k) Responsible person(s).

The service provider will conduct a desktop review at the Department, using the available information and determine any gaps or omissions which will form part of the audit. NIAMMS requires each college to have its own asset register and the Department shall have a consolidated GRAP 17 asset register.

4.2 CONDITION ASSESSMENT

4.2.2 Condition assessment/monitoring will be done according to the GIAMA/NIAMMS manuals. The service provider will identify all rooms in the facility and compile the work packages and photos with specific reference to the relevant room i.e. linked to square meterage(m²) and barcode. The purpose of this activity is to perform inspection, assessment, measurement and interpretation of the resultant data, to indicate the condition of a specific component so as to determine the need for preventive or remedial action.

4.2.3 The NIAMMS requires the provider to adopt the following steps during Condition assessment:

4.2.4 Collate documentation and determine facility components

- a) Collate documentation on the facility
- b) Determine the components of a facility

4.2.5 Analyse Components

- a) The impact of failure
- b) The likelihood of failure
- c) Condition and reliability
- d) Condition rating based on the scale in Table 2A
- e) Reliability rating based on the scale in Table 2A

4.2.6 Determine the criticality of a component

- a) First determining the most severe impact of component failure
- b) Secondly determining the highest likelihood of failure
- c) Then rating the impact of failure against the likelihood of failure

4.3 **DETERMINE THE PRIORITY OF A COMPONENT**

- 4.3.1 First determining the most severe impact of component failure.
- 4.3.2 Secondly determining the most severe of the condition status or reliability of a component.
- 4.3.3 Then followed by rating the impact of failure against the condition status or reliability (select the more severe of the two) of a component (as depicted in **Table 2A**, the priority matrix).

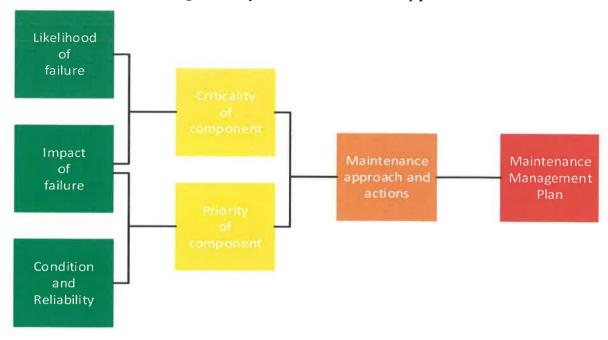

4.5 SCHEDULE MAINTENANCE ACTIONS

The Maintenance Management Plan should aim to have over 80% of the maintenance work planned and scheduled for all high risk and critical elements.

4.6 CATEGORIES OF THE ASSESSMENT

- 4.6.1 The assessment categories of elements
 - a) Building Structure, both internal and external;
 - b) Civil Works, both internal and external;
 - c) Mechanical Systems, both internal and external;
 - d) Electrical Services, both internal and external;
 - e) Lifts and Escalators (disability access SANS 10400-S:2011);
 - f) Wet Services, both internal and external;
 - g) Waste Water Services;
 - h) Fire Safety and Protection Compliance (as per statutory requirements);
 - i) Fire Detection (existing);
 - j) Basic Data and Telecommunication (connection points only);
 - k) Environmental aspects, Landscape Irrigation and Solid Waste Management;

- I) Site Safety and Security; and
- m) Occupational Health and Safety compliance.
- 4.6.2 The provider will also comply with the NIAMMS requirements by including the following:
- a) The provider shall check conformity of TVET college immovable assets according to GIAMA (GRAP 17).
- b) The assessment shall also indicate the buildings and particular parts that require corrective maintenance;
- c) The provider shall identify critical immovable assets according to GIAMA/NIAMMS;
- d) The assessment shall provide the current replacement cost according to GIAMA/NIAMMS;
- e) The assessment shall provide necessary information related to decommissioning according to GIAMA/NIAMMS where an asset is found to be beyond reasonable maintenance or repair; and
- f) The assessment shall cover depreciated replacement cost according to NIAMMS and GRAP.

5. DELIVERABLES

The Deliverables of the appointed service provider will be to:

- 5.1 provide a project plan which will achieve the set scope within set timeline and approved budget for Departmental Approval;
- 5.2 provide a complete GRAP 17 asset register (Book Value) per college;
- 5.3 provide an immovable asset register with infrastructure condition assessments, loaded into Archibus;
- 5.4 provide an Annual Maintenance Plan per college with priorities and costing (NIAMMS) from Archibus;
- 5.4 mark all specified spaces with approved Barcodes (Annexure B) and information loaded into Archibus:
- 5.6 Load a site layout as per specification for each college site (Annexure C) into Archibus;
- 5.7 Provide an Audit Report verifying all immovable Assets (buildings & fixed components) on the sites summarised in **Table 1A**;
- 5.8 provide a report per site which verifies that all data quality requirements as specified by the Archibus System and its reporting requirements have been met;
- 5.9 provide training competency certificates of Departmental and College Staff trained to maintain the immovable asset data and to add and update information on Archibus:

5.10 provide reports as set out in PART F Section 1 and 2.

6. APPROPRIATE QUALIFICATIONS, EXPERIENCE, SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE

- 6.1 The Service Provider is required to have extensive experience in conducting Audits of Immovable Assets and conducting conditional assessments. Experience in conducting such for State Entities will be preferred.
- 6.2 State Immovable Assets are required to be audited utilizing requirements as stipulated in NIAMMS (National Infrastructure Asset Maintenance Management Standards) and GIAMA (Government Immovable Asset Management Act). The service provider is required to have working knowledge of NIAMMS and GIAMA especially with regard to preparing asset registers, condition registers and maintenance plans.
- 6.3 Service Providers are required to have completed projects of a similar nature within the last 10 years.
- 6.4 The service provider should have a Project Manager (who will also be considered as the Lead Consultant) with over 10 years' experience in preparing Immovable Asset Registers and conducting condition assessments. The Project Manager should have working experience with professionals such as Electrical Engineer(s), Civil Structural Engineer(s), Mechanical Engineer(s), Architect/Draftsman, Property Valuer(s), Quantity Surveyor(s), Auditor(s)/Charted Accountant(s) and Data Programmer in conducting such assessments.
- 6.5 A CORE team is required which is to comprise at a minimum of a professionally registered Electrical Engineer(s), Civil Structural Engineer(s), Mechanical Engineer(s), Property Valuer(s), Architect(s)/Draftsmen, Quantity Surveyor(s), Auditor(s)/Charted Accountant(s) with GRAP 17 experience and a Data Programmer with experience in conducting condition assessments and data quality and capturing into an Infrastructure Management system such as Archibus or similar. Each of these must have over 5 years' experience. The required experience should be in the conducting of condition assessments of multi-storey buildings within a State context or similar. (Note: Should an individual have more than one of

the stipulated qualifications, only one of the qualifications will be considered including their experience in that specific qualification).

- 6.6 The service provider must have at least 6 teams to be deployed across the 6 Higher Education Regions within the 9 provinces who will be executing the terms of reference concurrently. Each team should have no less than 4 members (with appropriate qualifications/experience) for conducting the Immovable Assets Audit physically on site, under the supervision of the CORE team. The CORE team will be responsible and accountable for the work performed by the teams.
- A suitably qualified Project Coordinator to be appointed and based at the Department of Higher Education and Training to report directly to Director: Building Development and Maintenance. The Project Coordinator is to have at least 3 years' experience in supporting a project of this nature or similar. The Project Coordinator is required to be the direct link/contact between the TVET Colleges, the appointed Service Provider and the Department. The Project Coordinator is also to conduct day to day facilitation of the project. The service provider is to provide all tools of trade and other requirements. The Department will provide office space at 178 Francis Baard Street, Pretoria. Office attendance will be structured to comply with COVID 19 restrictions.

7. DURATION OF THE CONTRACT

The successful bidder must complete the scope of works set out in the project within 12 months from the date of issuing of the order.

8. IMMOVABLE ASSET AUDITING

The following are key recommended procedures for auditing immovable assets of the TVET College by the provider:

- a) Prepare and sign-off asset hierarchy (project documents mention the level of audit details as per campus/satellite, per building, per room);
- b) List and compile the list of items to be included in the audit and sign off (the project documents mention buildings of TVET Colleges and campuses);

- c) Produce the list of reports showing the content and formats, specifications, user/custodian, and asset maintenance plan according to NIAMMS, GIAMA and GRAP 17. This will be done during integration of data collection and Archibus database;
- d) Finalise and sign off the list of buildings that qualify for audit;
- e) Perform desk assessment using data TVET GRAP 17 asset registers, existing sites layouts, Annual Maintenance Plans and rooms' barcodes;
- f) Set up the timetable for audit showing distribution of company's personnel with involvement of DHET, Regional, and TVET personnel;
- g) Configure smart phone/reader software/App that can be used to capture data (GPS codes, pictures, upload files, read barcodes, etc.). The configuration shall be able to submit data to the Archibus database. This exercise will involve audit provider, TIMIS provider, DHET, and TVET personnel;
- h) Deploy teams (Company's personnel, DHET, and TVET personnel) to the sites; an example of a site layout plan is included as an (Annexure C);
- i) Conduct quality assurance for data collected from the existing data and from sites before submission to the Archibus database; and
- j) Submit final reports from Archibus (including drawings, photos, data transferred to Archibus) and the database in a separate storage as backup to be kept by DHET. The reports shall also show the room/space ID from the barcode.

9. SITE LAYOUT DRAWINGS (SKETCHES)

- a) The service provider shall review the site layout developed by colleges to quality assure and fill the gaps. The provider shall develop site layouts for TVET colleges which are either inadequate or not available. The site layouts shall include the layout of all the structures and buildings on the site, indicating the boundary fence, visible connection points and manholes of all water, electricity, sewer, etc. on site as well as in the building.
- b) The drawings also need to indicate the space inside each building: room number (as designated at site), barcode number and the size of each room. Multi-storey buildings will be drawn showing the ground floor on the site plan and the remaining floors separately but coded to allow easy identification.

c) The site drawing must be to scale in a WinWord version (for colleges to maintain after audit). If the site information is available in CAD (*.dwg), a copy of this must be obtained and loaded with the data capturing. An example of a site layout plan is included as in (**Annexure C**).

10. BARCODING

- 10.1 The provider shall install (as part of project cost) durable barcodes plates (Annexure B) on each building and in each space found not to have them or not to have a suitable barcode during auditing OR where the college does not have barcode labels available. The barcoding of permanent fixtures is also required where such has not been effected by the college.
- 10.2 The barcode verifiers shall comply with the iso/iec 15426-2 (2d) or iso/iec 15415 (2d) or international standard: iso/iec 18004 to allow smart-phones camera reading from them. This data will later be stored in Archibus database. The specific sequencing, technical details on labels and placement thereof will be provided to the successful bidder.

11. TRAINING

- 11.1 The service provider shall train 382 users from the Department, Regional Offices, and TVET colleges in infrastructure management. NIAMMS requires personnel dealing with the infrastructure management to have the following competency:
 - a) Introduction to infrastructure management in South Africa
 - b) Maintenance planning
 - c) Maintenance operations management
 - d) Maintenance monitoring
 - e) Records and knowledge management
 - f) Performance management and reporting

- 11.2 The following are details of the training areas that shall be covered by the provider:
 - a) Introduction to public immovable assets management
 - b) The South Africa legal framework and standards guiding immovable asset management: Guiding standards (NIAMMS, GRAP 17, GIAMA, etc).
 - c) Asset Registers (the immovable assets register: Best practice and requirements, integration and updating, maturity matrix, practical assessment of the organization, compiling audit plans for immovable assets):
 - d) Maintenance planning
 - i. Aligning maintenance plans with Departmental/TVET Sector plans
 - ii. Collate documentation and determine facility components
 - Analyse components to determine the impact and the likelihood of failure
 - iv. Assess the condition and determine the reliability of components
 - v. Determine the criticality of a component
 - vi. Determine a maintenance approach
 - vii. Schedule maintenance actions
 - viii. Cost maintenance actions
 - ix. Prepare a maintenance budget
 - 11.3 Maintenance Operations Management (Elementary)
 - a) Scheduling work and resource planning
 - b) Planning shutdown or outage (including demand management and decanting) & Prepare job cards
 - c) Manage outsourcing of work:
 - i. developing specifications for work;
 - ii. procuring service providers;
 - iii. managing contracts;
 - iv. managing access to site;
 - v. verifying and signing off of work; and
 - vi. Completing job cards and paying service providers.
 - d) Manage stores:
 - purchasing spares and tools;
 - II. managing and controlling stock levels; and

- III. Issuing of spares and tools.
- IV. Manage Safety, Health and Environment
- V. Re-commission components after shutdown or outage
- 11.4 Maintenance monitoring function (Elementary)
 - a) Record maintenance calls and determine maintenance actions
 - b) Assessing the condition of a facility or component
 - c) Monitoring condition & Testing Components
 - d) Analysing historic maintenance information
- 11.5 Records and knowledge management function
 - a) Maintenance records management
 - b) Knowledge management
 - c) Maintenance Management System
- 11.6 Maintenance performance management and reporting functions
 - a) Assessing the current state of maintenance management performance
 - b) Developing performance improvement targets
 - c) Monitoring maintenance actions implemented against the maintenance plan
 - i. Monthly reporting against the maintenance plan
 - ii. Quarterly performance reviews
 - iii. Analysing and planning corrective actions
- 11.7 Transfer of data to Archibus databases.
- 11.8 Practical session (includes application of auditing tools);
- 11.9 Archibus Training (train the trainer and first cohort of users) to be conducted in collaboration with the appointed Archibus Software Provider.

12. TRAINEES

Two hundred officials from 50 colleges (two from each college), 262 campus managers (one from each campus), 14 officials from regional offices (two from each

regional office), and 6 DHET officials to receive the training listed in above. This makes a total of 382 users.

12.1 The provider shall adopt the following training model:

- a) Develop training strategy for approval by the Department;
- b) Develop a training model for trainers and end users for approval by the Department (On-site training, Video Clips and Manuals);
- c) Develop the training curriculum (in consultation with the Software Provider,
 Colleges and the Department) for approval by the Department;
- d) The service provider must include in their bid a training proposal (regional combinations, number of learners etc.) which will optimise the learning outcomes as listed. The successful bidders training proposal may be subject to review before implementation;
- e) The Department will set the location for training once the approach has been agreed with the service provider. The Department will ensure classrooms, computers, printers and the required connectivity are available;
- f) The service provider shall in addition provide "train the trainers" training for 10 officials, whom will be selected in consultation with the Department;
- g) The responsibility for the training of end users lies with the service provider. A determination of competency must be effected on all trainees after completion of each training component. The Users who successfully complete the Train the Trainers Programmes may be deployed to conduct user training under the supervision of the service provider;
- h) The ownership and intellectual property rights of all training materials (hard and electronic copies) shall vest in the DHET.

13. FINANCE FRAMEWORK

9.5.5 Joint Ventures, Consortiums and Trusts:

2.2.5 Exhibit 6: Regional Footprint (TEAMS)

The project requires a concurrent programme of teams conducting audits across the 6 TVET College Sector Regions in all 9 Provinces of South Africa.

The CORE team is required to comprise at a minimum of a professionally registered Electrical Engineer(s), Civil Structural Engineer(s), Mechanical Engineer(s), Property Valuer(s), Architect(s)/Draftsmen, Quantity Surveyor(s), Auditor(s)/Charted Accountant(s) with GRAP 17 experience and a Data Programmer with experience in conducting condition assessments and data quality and capturing into an Infrastructure Management system such as Archibus or similar. *It remains the sole responsibility of the service provider to ensure that the appropriate skills and expertise are in place at all times with these teams. The service provider is also responsible and accountable for the work of these teams in all its aspects.

2.2.7 Experience with Archibus or similar software

The data/programmer listed in the CORE team must have experience in supporting the conducting of condition assessments, data quality assurance and capturing into an Infrastructure Management system such as Archibus or similar software with the capability to export the data into Archibus (to prescribed data quality standards).

Experience in supporting hand held devices for the capturing of data onsite is essential.

A table listing the experience (actual work conducted) and actual systems worked on with duration on must be stated.

The points for this requirement will be allocated on the basis of 2 per project provided that the project/s were completed within the last 8 years.

- 1.1 Any subsequent award/concession made to a prospective bidder in terms of this TOR is conditional on, (among others):

The Department reserves the right to:

- 5.1.1 Engages in any collusive tendering, anti-competitive conduct, or any other similar conduct, including but not limited to any collusion with any other bidder in respect of the subject matter of this bid;
- 5.1.2 Seeks any assistance, other than assistance officially provided by a Department, from any employee, advisor or other representative of a Department in order to obtain any unlawful advantage in relation to the procurement or services provided or to be provided to the Department;

In the event of a conflict between the bidder's proposal and the Service Level Agreement concluded between the parties, the contents of the Service Level Agreement will prevail.

7 PREPARATION COSTS

- 7.2 Furthermore, no statement in this bid will be construed as placing the Department, its employees or agents under any obligation whatsoever, including in respect of costs, expenses or losses incurred by the bidder(s) in the preparation of their responses to this bid.

8 INDEMNITY

8.1 If a bidder breaches the conditions of this bid and as a result of that breach, the Department incurs costs or damages (including, without limitation, the cost(s) of any investigations, procedural impairment, repetition of all- or any part of the bid process and/or enforcement of intellectual property rights or confidentiality obligations), the bidder then indemnifies and holds the Department harmless

from any and all such costs which the Department may incur and for any damages or losses the Department may suffer.

9 PRECEDENCE

9.1 This document will prevail over any information provided during any stage whether oral, electronically or written, unless such written information provided, expressly amends this document by reference.

10 LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

10.1 A bidder participates in this bid process entirely at its own risk and cost. The Department shall not be liable to compensate a bidder on any grounds whatsoever, for any costs incurred or any damages suffered as a result of the Bidder's participation in this bidding process.

11 TAX COMPLIANCE

- 11.1 No tender shall be awarded to any bidder which is not tax compliant. The Department reserves the right to withdraw an award made, or cancel a contract concluded with a successful bidder in the event that it is established that such bidder was in fact not tax compliant at the time of the award, or has submitted a fraudulent Tax Clearance Certificate to the Department, or whose verification against the Central Supplier Database (CSD) proves non-compliant.
- 11.2 The Department further reserves the right to cancel a contract with a successful bidder in the event that such a bidder does not remain tax compliant for the full term of the contract.

12 TENDER DEFAULTERS AND RESTRICTED SUPPLIERS

- 12.1 No tender shall be awarded to a bidder whose name (or any of its members, directors, partners or trustees) appears on the Register of Tender Defaulters maintained by National Treasury, or who have been placed on National Treasury's List of Restricted Suppliers.

- 13.2 No part of the bid may be distributed, reproduced, stored or transmitted, in any form or by any means, electronically, or by way of photocopying, recording or otherwise, in whole or in part except for the purpose of preparing a tender. This bid and any other documents supplied by the Department remain proprietary to the Department and must be promptly returned to the Department upon request, together with all copies, electronic versions, excerpts or summaries thereof or work as a consequence derived there from.
- 13.3 Throughout this bid process and thereafter, bidders must secure the Department's written approval prior to the release of any information that pertains to:

15 COPYRIGHT AND ALL OTHER INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

- 15.1 All copyright and all other intellectual property rights in respect of any documents and materials (works) developed by the service provider during this project, shall vest in the Department.
- 15.2 The Department will have the right to release the works under an appropriate copyright license, including an open license that will allow any individual, official,

company, agency or organisation to use or modify the works for any purpose as stated in the open licence.

16 RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUB-CONTRACTORS AND BIDDER'S PERSONNEL

- 16.1 A bidder is responsible for ensuring that its personnel (including agents, officers, directors, employees, advisors and other representatives), its subcontractors (if any) and personnel of its sub-contractors comply with all terms and conditions of this bid.
- 16.2 In the event that the Department allows a bidder to make use of subcontractors, the actions and activities of such sub-contractors will at all times remain the responsibility of the bidder and the Department will not under any circumstances, be liable for any losses or damages incurred by or caused by such sub-contractors.

- b) For each deliverable, as identified in Part A Information on the Tender, paragraph 4, the service provider will submit, every second week, progress reports to the Department in line with approved timeframes in the project plan.

- The reports should be in MS Word and submitted electronically to the Director: Building Maintenance and Development.
- c) In addition to the above and in conjunction with deliverables submitted, sectional compliance pre-assessment, practical completion pre-assessment and final works pre-assessment reports.

3. LANGUAGE

All correspondence including reports must be written in English.

4. SUBMISSIONS/COMMENTS TIMING

- a) The submission of the monitoring framework plan and evaluation process shall be submitted to the Director: Building Maintenance and Development within 10 days after the commencement of the project for approval by the Department.
- b) Other reports shall be submitted as per the agreed project implementation plan.
- c) The Department, shall within 15 days of receipt of deliverables, notify the service provider of the approval or not of the deliverable.
- d) The Department shall, within 30 days of receipt of the final works preassessment report [whatever the final deliverable is], notify the service provider/consultant/lead consultant/team leader of its decision concerning the final pre-assessment report [whatever the final deliverable is]. If the Department does not give any comments on the final pre-assessment report [whatever the final deliverable is] within such time limit of 30 days, the final pre-assessment report [whatever the final deliverable is] shall be deemed to have been approved by the Department if they do not expressly inform the service provider/consultant/lead consultant/team leader of any comments or delays. timeframes will then be negotiated between service provider/consultant/lead consultant/team leader and the Director: Building Maintenance and Development.

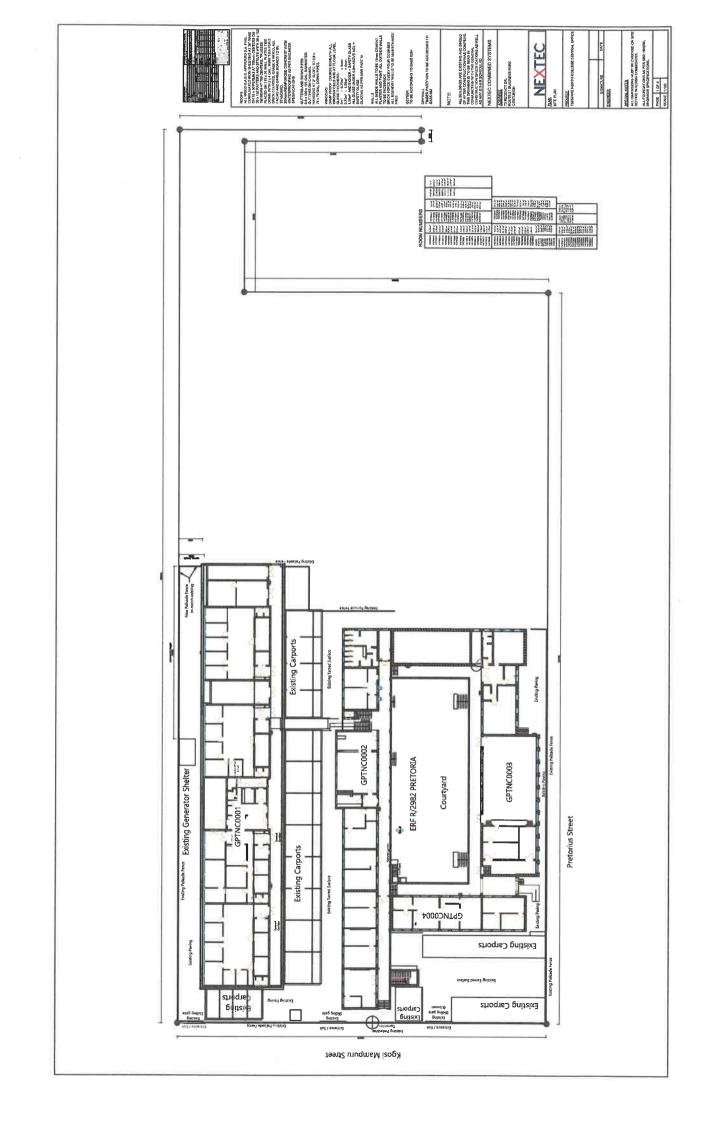

NOTES

The purpose of this document is to:

- (i) Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and
- (ii) To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if (applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

General Conditions of Contract

1. Definitions

- 1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
- 1.1 "Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
- 1.2 "Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
- 1.3 "Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
- 1.4 "Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
- 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
- 1.6 "Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
- 1.7 "Day" means calendar day.
- 1.8 "Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
- 1.9 "Delivery ex stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
- 1.10 "Delivery into consignees store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
- 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the

RSA.

- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such

obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

1.25 "Written" or "in writing" means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

- 2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.
- 2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

3. General

- 3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.
- 3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from www.treasury.gov.za

4. Standards

4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.

- 5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.
- 5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.
- 5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier's performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.
- 5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

6. Patent rights

6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

7. Performance security

- 7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.
- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
 - (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
 - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or

analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.

8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

12. Transportation

12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

13. Incidental services

- 13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
 - (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
 - (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
 - (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods:

- (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.
- 13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

14. Spare parts

- 14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:
 - (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
 - (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

15. Warranty

- 15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.
- 15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.
- 15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.
- 15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.
- 15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take

such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. Payment

- 16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
- 16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
- 16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
- 16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.

17. Prices

17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

18. Contract amendments

- 18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.
- 19. Assignment
- 19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

20. Subcontracts

20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

21. Delays in the supplier's performance

- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the

supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.

- 21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

- 23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:
 - (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
 - (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
 - (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.
- 23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.
- 23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.
- 23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any

person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

- 23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.
- 23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:
 - (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
 - (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
 - (iii) the period of restriction; and
 - (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

- 23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.
- 24. Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights
- 24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or antidumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a
 provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is
 increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is
 not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of
 any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional
 payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or
 countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such
 provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable
 difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the
 State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any)
 which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or
 services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in
 terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which

may be due to him

25. Force Majeure

- 25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.
- 25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

26. Termination for insolvency

26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of Disputes

- 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
 - (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of liability

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
 - (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and

- (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.
- 29. Governing language
- 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.
- 30. Applicable law
- 30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.
- 31. Notices
- 31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice
- 31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.

32. Taxes and duties

- 32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.
- 32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.
- 32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.
- 33. National 33.1 Industrial Participation (NIP) Programme
- The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.

34 Prohibition of Restrictive practices

- 34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).
- 34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.

34.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.
