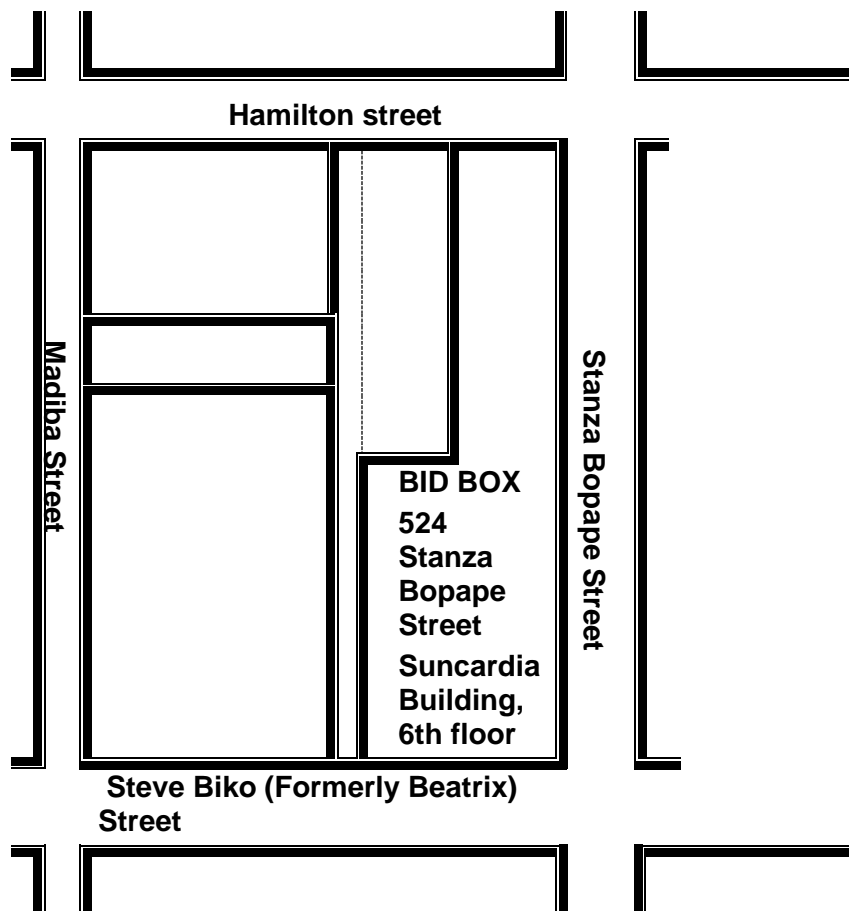

TERMS OF REFERENCE

TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A SERVICE PROVIDER(S) TO REVIEW THE R59 CORRIDOR STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT PLAN AND URBAN DESIGN FRAMEWORK WITHIN A PERIOD OF FOURTEEN (14) MONTHS, FOR MIDVAAL LOCAL MUNICIPALITY, SEDIBENG DISTRICT, GAUTENG PROVINCE.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. The Department of Land Reform and Rural Development (DLRRD) under the Branch Spatial Planning and Land Use Management (SPLUM) needs to appoint a service provider to Review the R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework for Midvaal Local Municipality (MLM) which is located within the Sedibeng District in Gauteng Province.
- 1.2. The Department of Land Reform and Rural Development (DLRRD) seeks to appoint a suitably qualified and experienced service provider(s), primarily Town/Urban/City and Regional Planners complimented by a team of other experts (outlined in section 8) for a period of fourteen (14) months to render professional services in preparing the Review the R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework for Midvaal Local Municipality.

2. PROBLEM STATEMENT

- 2.1 Midvaal Local Municipality appointed a service provider to compile the R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan to promote and guide the R59 as a development corridor, which was adopted in 2010. To further enhance the development proposals along the R59 Corridor, DLRRD assist the municipality with funding to appoint a service provider to compile the R59 Corridor Urban Design Framework (UDF), which was adopted in 2014. The following challenges are being experienced at the municipality that require a document review and the need for external services in this regard:

- 2.1.1 The development guidelines are not aligned with the development principles outlined in Spatial Planning and Land Use Management Act, Act no. 16 of 2013 (SPLUMA).
- 2.1.2 Subsequent national, provincial and Municipal Spatial Development Framework (MSDF), as well as local area plans developed in areas along the R59, have resulted in a misalignment of development proposals
- 2.1.3 Assessments of land development applications in the area are being assessed with contradictory planning policies
- 2.1.4 The Municipality, through its Spatial Planning section, has also concluded that an increased external perspective on drafting spatial planning policies is necessary to ensure the municipality remains up to date with new ideas and innovations.
- 2.1.5 There is a lack of capacity to conduct extensive public participation in compiling the R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework Review due to the size of the study areas and the various stakeholders who would need to be consulted.

- 2.2 Considering that the R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework Review were formulated 10-15 years ago, the municipality requires a review, as changing circumstances in development and policy trajectory warrant a review.

3. BACKGROUND AND LOCATIONAL CONTEXT

- 3.1 Section 21(d) of the SPLUMA requires municipalities, as a component of the MSDF, identify current and future significant structuring and restructuring elements of the spatial form of the municipality, including development corridors, activity spines and economic nodes where public and private investment will be prioritised and facilitated as well as (l)(i) identify the designation of areas in which more detailed local area plans must be developed.
- 3.2 Midvaal Local Municipality is in the south of Gauteng Province. The municipality forms part of Sedibeng District Municipality, which consists of three local municipalities, namely: Midvaal, Emfuleni and Lesedi Local Municipality. Emfuleni borders the municipal area in the west, City of Johannesburg in the northwest, Ekurhuleni in the north, Lesedi in the east and Metsimaholo (Free State Province) in the south and Dipaleseng (Mpumalanga Province) in the southwest.

- 3.3 The R59 originates at South Rand Road in the south of Johannesburg, north of the N12. It passes through Alberton, Meyerton, Vereeniging, and Vanderbijlpark, crossing the Vaal River into the Free State Province towards Sasolburg, as depicted in Annexure A. The R59 is an important regional route that acts as a lifeline connecting the City of Johannesburg and City of Ekurhuleni in the north, to the Midvaal Local Municipality, Emfuleni Local Municipality and Metsimaholo Local Municipality in the south.
- 3.4 The 59 Corridor, as outlined in the Midvaal context, includes the R59, K89 (M61/Morris Road/Old Vereeniging Road) and the railway line that runs parallel to each other. The study area begins at the R550 interchange in the north, passes through the Randvaal Road, Henley Drive, Meyer Street, and Johan Le Roux Drive interchanges, and ends at the Pierneef Boulevard interchange in the south. The areas affected by the R59 Corridor are Klipriver Business Park, Daleside, Highbury, Pendale AH, Henly on Klip, Meyerton Farms, Sicelo, Meyerton, Meydustria and Kookrus.

4. THE LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK

4.1 The Spatial Planning and Land Use Management Act (SPLUMA)

- 4.1.1 SPLUMA is a legislation that gives a framework for all spatial planning and land use management in South Africa. It seeks to promote consistency and uniformity in procedures and decision-making pertaining to issues such as spatial planning and land use management. Other objectives include addressing historical spatial imbalances and the integration of the principles of sustainable development into land use, planning regulatory tools and legislative instruments.
- 4.1.2 In terms of Chapter 4, Section 21 (l) of SPLUMA the MSDF must “identify the designation of area in which more detailed local plans must be developed”. This refers to identification and Prioritisation of more detailed local area plans/ precinct plans to ensure the implementation of the broader strategic spatial objectives at a local level with respect to the MSDF.

4.2 The Municipal Systems Act

- 4.2.1 In terms of Section 11(3) (a) of the Local Government Municipal Systems Act (MSA), 32 of 2000, A municipality exercises its legislative or executive authority by (j) monitoring the impact and effectiveness of any services, policies, programmes or plans and passing by-laws and taking decisions on any of the matters listed in Section 11(3).

5. OBJECTIVES

- 5.1 The key objective of the project is to appoint a service provider to prepare the R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework Review for the Midvaal Local Municipality (MLM) within a period of fourteen (14) months that should:
- a) Inform, improve and guide cross-sectoral policy or project implementation and integration.
 - b) Indicate in as much detail as possible to members of the public and others with an interest in the municipality, the desired spatial form for the R59 Corridor.
 - c) Indicate planning, environment, infrastructure and institutional issues that gave rise to the proposals contained in the final document and provide all stakeholders with an opportunity to participate during the process of formulating the document.
 - d) To provide a spatial reflection of the needs and priorities established in the integrated development plan and identify specific issues which are unique to the municipalities.
 - e) To address rural development issues such as the integration with urban areas, the provision of social and economic amenities, the provision of infrastructure and involvement during the public participation process.
 - f) To provide long-term strategic mechanisms on: -
 - i. Identifying areas for economic opportunities, particularly for industrial, commercial and agricultural.
 - ii. To identify infrastructure needs and services constraints and bring forward tangible solutions to address these constraints.
 - iii. Accommodate the growing housing needs, considering the need for development of various housing typologies and programmes (e.g. “Gap Housing”, social housing, FLISP, etc.)
 - iv. Protection of the natural environment, e.g. Conservation Corridors, Green Wedges, hydrological resources, biodiversity areas, etc.
 - g) Be data and systems supportive by containing spatial and financial modeling that can link seamlessly into project prioritization and budgeting through the Capital Expenditure Framework (CEF). Clear linkages are required to facilitate the interaction

between Spatial Planning, Infrastructure Planning and Financial Planning through integrated modeling.

6. SCOPE OF WORK

6.1 The successful service provider(s) would be expected to undertake the following towards the review of the R59 corridor strategic development and the urban design framework: -

- a) Conduct a status quo analysis which will entail but not be limited to sectoral and spatial analysis and policy analysis.
- b) Ensure that extensive public consultation is undertaken prior to the compilation of development proposals.
- c) Ensure that the previous 2010 R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and 2014 R59 Corridor Urban Design Framework are assessed and incorporated into one Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework for the Midvaal R59 Corridor.
- d) Provide a strategic development plan for the R59 Corridor in line with the development objectives of National, Provincial, District and government owned entities policies.
- e) Assess the R59 corridor boundary in relation to the Midvaal SDF established Urban Development Boundary and make recommendations for amendment of the existing corridor boundary.
- f) Assess and incorporate development proposals from various precinct plans to supplement the R59 Corridor development, including identifying and addressing any misalignments thereof.
- g) Reassess the development proposals in the corridor and determine proposed uses for the previously undetermined areas.
- h) Develop R59 Development Corridor proposals within the larger regional context as well as local opportunities and strengths.
- i) Formulate guidelines and policies to be introduced by the Midvaal Local Municipality to promote the development of the corridor.
- j) Develop programmes and action plans, in terms of an implementation framework, to further enhance the development of the corridor.
- k) Determine proposals and initiatives to market the development of the corridor and attract new investment along the corridor that is sustainable and compatible with the provisions of the plan.

- l) Develop spatial challenges, options and proposals for the municipality taking into cognizance the local circumstance, local policies, local economic challenges and development, provincial and national policies and strategies.
- m) Develop a stakeholder engagement plan for the various consultation processes with various stakeholders, including government, private sector and any other stakeholders throughout the lifespan of the project. The service provider should cater for additional unplanned meetings that may be required for the duration of the project.
- n) The service provider will also be required to assist the municipality in finalizing any documents for the presentation in various committees towards/and for the adoption by Council.
- o) The Service Provider is responsible for advertising for a 60-days public participation period after the draft document adopted by the Council.
- p) Inform, improve, and guide cross-sectoral policy or project implementation and integration
- q) Indicate planning, environment, infrastructure, and institutional issues that gave rise to the proposals contained in the final document and provide all stakeholders an opportunity to participate during the process of reviewing the plan and the framework.
- r) To address rural development issues such as the integration with urban areas, the provision of social and economic amenities, the provision of infrastructure and involvement during the public participation process.
- s) To provide long-term strategic mechanisms on:
 - i. Identifying areas for economic opportunities, particularly for industrial, commercial and agriculture.
 - ii. To identify infrastructure needs and services constraints and bring forward tangible solutions to address these constraints.
- t) Protection of natural environment e.g. Conservation Corridors, Green Wedges, hydrological resources, biodiversity areas, etc.

7. DELIVERABLES

- 7.1 The appointed service provider will be required to deliver the following to the DLRRD and the Midvaal Local Municipality: -
 - a) A final R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework Review with related mapping submitted in digital format and a full colour hard copy.
 - b) Implementation Plan (Graphically Illustrated) for approval by Council.

- c) A R59 Corridor Strategic Development Plan and Urban Design Framework textual document including all maps, tables and figures in both hardcopy (printed) and softcopy (electronic as MS word document) image files as (e.g. JPEG, windows Bitmap, GIF, etc.) must also be supplemented by:

- 7.2 The service provider will be responsible for the layout design and editing of the publication, ensuring it aligns with the municipal corporate identity. The project manager must sign off on the final document before it is printed in line with the above referred specifications.
- 7.3 All spatial data collected should be submitted in a GIS map package or Project Package include geodatabases data instead of referencing the data (geodatabases, layer files, and files for use in a GIS environment). The GIS file format must have clear metadata that

describes each Strategic Development Plan and UDF construct differently and should include the purpose of each construct. Metadata for all spatial information should be provided as per the metadata standard ISO 19115 & SANS 1878. All metadata must be Published on the electronic metadata catalogue after approval. <https://catalogue.sasdi.gov.za/emc>. Ownership of all metadata, data and spatial information generated and collected from this assignment vests in DLRRD and MLM. DLRRD and MLM will become the custodian of all spatial information collected.

- 7.4 Where base data set is used, the service provider must retain all mandatory reference fields for that base data set (e.g. if cadastral data is used to assign zoning, the 21-digit code, TAG-Value, should be maintained).
- 7.5 All geospatial information used or created during the project must be submitted to the Department unless there is a limitation prescribed by a license agreement. Where such limitations exist, the service provider must inform the department.
- 7.6 All geospatial data, products, and services must comply with the prescripts of the Spatial Data Infrastructure Act, Act 54 of 2003, its Regulations and Policies.
- 7.7 Where a service provider used graphics to represent proposals, such should be converted into GIS format and data must be inclusive of all spatial proposals made.
- 7.8 All datasets must be in a geographic coordinate system form in the Hartebeeshoek94 system.
- 7.9 All points proposals (e.g. nodes), line proposals (e.g. corridors) and polygon proposals (e.g. urban edges) must be in one GIS data file. Such file must include the following attributes: ID, Title and Description. A service provider may add additional attributes where necessary.
- 7.10 The GIS data must further meet the following requirements: -
 - a) All maps should be in A4 size in the document.
 - b) Maps must be numbered and listed in the table of contents.
 - c) All the text in the maps and the legends must be legible.
 - d) The same map template/ layout must be used throughout the document.
 - e) All maps should have the basic map elements, namely: a title, north arrow, legend, scale bar.
 - f) All the features on the map must be explained in the legend.
 - g) All mapping must be developed at an appropriate and readable scale.
 - h) All maps must also be available in Power point Presentation format as well as the corresponding ArcGIS Pro Project File (.APRX) with all spatial information in shapefiles or a geodatabase ready to be accessed in ArcGIS.

8. SKILLS REQUIREMENTS

8.1 Companies with individuals with qualifications and extensive experience will be required as detailed in Table 2 and in section 8.1 and 9 respectively.

9.4 Due to the Project's urgency, timeframes must be strictly followed. Financial penalties will be imposed for delay or non-compliance with time and quality requirements.

10. CONTENTS OF THE PROJECT PROPOSAL

The service provider will be expected to provide a clear and concise project proposal covering the aspects listed below, as well as responding to the terms of reference.

- 10.1 An executive summary of the key issues covered in the Proposal.
- 10.2 A company profile and profile of each employee forming part of the Project Team, with clear references to similar and related work undertaken in the past, with clear evidence where a person/member participated in or managed certain projects in the past, which bear relevance to the work at hand. - 11.2. Existing information which is available within the DLRRD and the MLM will be made available to the appointed service provider during the execution of the project.
- 11.3. In cases where a letter is required to confirm and support the request for information from different spheres of government or parastatals, the DLRRD will provide the requested letter.
- 11.4. Notwithstanding anything written in these terms of reference, the responsibility for collecting and obtaining information necessary for the successful execution of the project remains entirely with the service provider.
- 11.5. The service provider shall be required to request where available data quality reports for all data acquired for use in this phase. Where such reports are not available, the service provider shall be required to assess the level of quality of each dataset and document it in a report. This will allow the service provider to understand the various limitations of the dataset before any analysis can be done.

12. TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THE BID

- 12.3 The service provider should submit an acceptance letter and be available to commence with the project within five (5) days after receiving the official order and the service level agreement being signed.
- 12.4 During the execution of the project, the service provider is required to give reports on the progress of the project. It is the responsibility of the service provider to organise the progress report meetings and have one of their representatives assigned to take minutes and circulate them to the steering committee members.
- 12.5 Project team members must be available for the duration of the project; the service provider is not allowed to change the composition without prior consent from the DLRRD and MLM.
- 12.6 Any deviation from the project plan should be put in writing and signed by the project manager of DLRRD.
- 12.7 Any suggestions during the progress meetings, once accepted by both parties, shall form part of the contract.
- 12.8 Payments will be made on a work-completed basis, i.e., at set milestones as per the project plan.

- 12.9 Financial penalties will be imposed for agreed-upon milestones, targets, and deadlines not met without providing:
- a) Timely notification of such delays.
 - b) Reasons for the delays.
 - c) Supporting evidence that the delays were outside of the influence of the service provider.
- 12.10 Payment will **ONLY** be made as per deliverables and upon **SATISFACTION** of a good quality product. Therefore, original invoices submitted for payment must be accompanied by relevant supporting documents. No copies of invoices will be processed.
- 12.11 Financial penalties will be imposed if the output produced do not meet the agreed-upon deliverables criteria as stipulated in the General Conditions of Contract.
- 12.12 Original invoices must be provided to substantiate all costs. The invoices should include the DLRRD order number that will be provided to the selected service provider upon acceptance of the proposal.
- 12.13 When DLRRD accepts the final product, the appointed service provider will be liable to correct errors and fill gaps that may be discovered in the data/project, at no charge to DLRRD. This condition will apply for a period of one month from the day the project was completed and submitted to DLRRD.
- 12.14 The DLRRD reserves the right not to appoint anyone.
- 12.15 No material or information derived from the provision of the services under the contract may be used for any other purpose except for those of the DLRRD, except where duly authorized to do so in writing by the DLRRD.
- 12.16 Copyright in respect of all documents and data prepared or developed for the purpose of the project by the Service Provider shall be vested in DLRRD.
- 12.17 The successful Service Provider agrees to keep confidential all records and information of or related to the project and not disclose such records or information to any third party without the prior written consent of DLRRD.

- 12.18 All work relating to spatial information remains the property of the state and shall be disseminated in line with the policy on pricing spatial information products and services.
- 12.19 The successful Service Provider agrees to maintain the level of technical capacity as indicated in the bidding document submitted, throughout the duration of the project and any change to their team shall not compromise the technical capacity of the Service Provider or impact negatively on the pace and quality of the project outcome.

13. MANDATORY REQUIREMENTS

NB: Failure to submit / attach proof of the following requirements with the proposal will disqualify the bidder's proposal.

13.1 EVALUATION OF TENDERS/ PROPOSALS

Tenders will be evaluated in terms of the evaluation criteria stipulated below:

- Evaluation of mandatory criteria
- Evaluation in terms of Functionality
- Evaluation in terms of Presentation
- Evaluation in terms of 80/20 preference point system as prescribed in the Preferential Procurement Regulations 2022.

13.1.1 Evaluation of mandatory criteria:

a. Tax Requirements:

- i). Bidders must ensure compliance with their tax obligations.

14 REPORTING AND ACCOUNTABILITY

14.1. During the execution of the project, the service provider will be required to submit progress reports and attend meetings at intervals as it will be determined by the project team or steering committee managing the project.

14.2. All information captured and or used to generate the outputs of the project remains the property of DLRRD and Midvaal Local Municipality and must be handed over in its totality when the project is closed. DLRRD and Midvaal Local Municipality will retain the copyright and all associated intellectual property rights thereof. This document, together with all agreements to be reached during the project, becomes part of the contract. The information must be captured and provided in a digital format as agreed upon in writing between the service provider and DLRRD. This agreement must be reached and signed off together with the project plan before the project commences.

15 EVALUATION CRITERIA

15.1 Proposals will be evaluated in four (4) stages:

- a. Bidders need to be responsive to all Mandatory requirements
- b. Bids will be evaluated on functionality, which needs to score seventy-five (75) out of one hundred (100) to go to the third stage.
- c. Presentation and bidders will have to score seventy-five (75) out of one hundred (100) to go to the fourth stage
- d. The fourth stage in accordance with the 80/20 preference points system as stipulated below.

15.2 Evaluation of Functionality

The evaluation of the functionality will be evaluated individually by Members of Bid Evaluation Committee in accordance with the below functionality, criteria and values. The applicable values that will be utilized when scoring each criterion range from:

1 = poor, 2 = average, 3 = good, 4 = very good and 5 = excellent.

The minimum requirements, as highlighted in the table below, are an indication of the benchmark required to qualify for the third stage (presentation) of the evaluation.

The bids that fail to achieve a minimum of seventy-five (75) points out of one hundred (100) points for functionality will be disqualified. This means that such bids will not be evaluated on the third stage (presentation) and fourth stage (Preference Points System). 2.9 The organ of state reserves the right to require of a tenderer, either before a tender is adjudicated or at any time subsequently, to substantiate any claim in regard to preferences, in any manner required by the organ of state.



2.10 Tenderers who wish to claim points in terms of the table in paragraph 2.12 below need to provide proof for each point claimed as guided below:

2.10.1 Historically Disadvantaged individuals (HDI):

- **Attach a copy of Identity Document (ID) and company registration document.**

2.10.2 Who is female:

- (I) **Attach a copy of Identity Document (ID) and company registration document.**

2.10.3 Who has a disability:

- (II) **Attach a certified copy or original doctor's letter confirming the disability.**

2.10.4 Who is youth (a person that is not older than 35 years on the closing date of a bid):

- (III) **Attach a copy of Identity Document (ID) and company registration document.**

2.11 The Department will use the Central Supplier Database and documents submitted by the tenderer to verify the points claimed for specific goals.

2.12 **Specific goals for the tender and points claimed are indicated per the table below.**

(Note to organs of state: Where either the 90/10 or 80/20 preference point system is applicable, corresponding points must also be indicated as such.

Note to tenderers: The tenderer must indicate how they claim points for each preference point system.)

- 4.1. In terms of Regulation 4(2); 5(2); 6(2) and 7(2) of the Preferential Procurement Regulations, preference points must be awarded for specific goals stated in the tender. For the purposes of this tender the tenderer will be allocated points based on the goals stated in the table in paragraph 2.12 above as may be supported by proof/documentation stated in the conditions of this tender.
- 4.2. In cases where organs of state intend to use Regulation 3(2) of the Regulations, which states that, if it is unclear whether the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system applies, an organ of state must, in the tender documents, stipulate in the case of—
6. an invitation for tender for income-generating contracts, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the highest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system; or
7. any other invitation for tender, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the lowest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system,
- then the organ of state must indicate the points allocated for specific goals for both the 90/10 and 80/20 preference point system.
- 4.3 A consortium or joint venture may, based on the percentage of the contract value managed or executed by their members, be entitled to claim points in respect of specific contract participation goals.
- 4.4 A tenderer will not be awarded points for HDI if it is indicated in the tender documents that such a tenderer intends sub-contracting more than 25% of the value of the contract to any other enterprise that does not qualify for the same number or more points for equity ownership.
- 4.5 A tenderer awarded a contract as a result of preference for contracting with, or providing equity ownership to a HDI, may not subcontract more than 25% of the value of the contract to a tenderer who is not a HDI or does not qualify for the same number or more preference for equity ownership.

NOTES

The purpose of this document is to:

2. Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and
3. To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.

Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if (applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

General Conditions of Contract

1. Definitions

1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
 - 1.1 “Closing time” means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
 - 1.2 “Contract” means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
 - 1.3 “Contract price” means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
 - 1.4 “Corrupt practice” means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
 - 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
 - 1.6 “Country of origin” means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
 - 1.7 “Day” means calendar day.
 - 1.8 “Delivery” means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
 - 1.9 “Delivery ex stock” means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
 - 1.10 “Delivery into consignees store or to his site” means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
 - 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.



- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.



1.25 “Written” or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.

2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.

2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

3. General

3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.

3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from www.treasury.gov.za

• Standards

4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

• Use of contract documents and information; inspection.

5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.

5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.

5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier’s performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.

5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier’s records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

• Patent rights

6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

• Performance

7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award,



security

the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.

- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
- (J) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
 - (K) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

**• Inspections,
tests and
analyses**

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the6



cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.

- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

(JJ) Transportation 12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

(KK) services

Incidental 13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:

- (JJJ) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
- (KKK) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
- (LLL) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
- (MMM) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant



and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.

13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

14. Spare parts

14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:

such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and

in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:

Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and

following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

4. Warranty 15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser



may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. Payment

16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.

16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.

16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.

16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.

5. Prices

17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

6. Contract amendments

18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.

7. Assignment

19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

8. Subcontracts

20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

9. Delays in the supplier's performance

21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.

21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.

21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.

21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily



available.

21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.

21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

(c) Termination for default

23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:

6. if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
7. if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
8. if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.

23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the



envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

7. the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
8. the date of commencement of the restriction
9. the period of restriction; and
10. the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

2 Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights

24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anti-dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which may be due to him



**Force
Majeure**

25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.

25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

**v) Termination
for insolvency**

26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

**vi) Settlement of
Disputes**

27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.

27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.

27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.

27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.

27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,

(a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and

(b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

**(f) Limitation
of liability**

28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;

(a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and



- (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.

29. Governing language

29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.

30. Applicable law

30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

31. Notices

31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice

31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.

32. Taxes and duties

32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.

32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.

32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.

33. National Industrial Participation (NIP) Programme

33.1 The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.

34. Prohibition of Restrictive practices

34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).

34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.



- 4.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.
