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1.	PREFACE
1.1	Sivuyile Residential facility provides 24-hour residential care to persons (both adults and children), with profound and severe intellectual disabilities. The facility provides care to an extremely vulnerable group of people in society; a group of people that are not only intellectually disabled but also has a number of other special conditions like, autism, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, behavioural challenges, palliative care and some psychiatric illnesses. The residents of the facility are in need of high care which imply that the home-based carers are responsible to provide 100% care to the residents.
2.	BID CONDITIONS
2.1	General:
2.1.1	The bid has been drawn up so that certain essential information can be furnished in a specific manner. Bidders are not allowed to make changes to the original document. Only the original document will be recognised as authentic and for contract purposes, will supersede any changes that may have been affected by the bidder.
2.1.2	The bid forms should not be retyped or redrafted, but photocopies may be prepared and used but should be signed in the original.
2.1.3	Black or blue ink shall be used to fill in bids.
2.1.4	Bidders should check the numbers of the pages and satisfy themselves that none are missing or duplicated. No liability will be accepted in regard to claims arising from missing or duplicated pages.
2.1.5	Unless specifically provided for in the bid invitation, no bid by telegram, telex or fax will be considered.
2.1.6	Bidders must bid in accordance with the requirements stipulated in the bid documents.
2.1.7	The closing time for the receipt of bids in response to this invitation to bid is detailed on the cover page of this invitation to bid.
2.1.8	All bids must be submitted in a sealed envelope bearing the bid number, bid description and closing date.
2.1.9	All bids must be received before the closing time and date stipulated above and must be deposited in the bid box at the address detailed on the cover page of this invitation to bid.
2.1.10	Bid documentation submitted by the bidder will be valid and open for acceptance for a period of 90 (ninety) calendar days from the closing date and time of the bid.
2.1.11	The Department reserves the right to request an extension of the validity period of the bid prior the expiry. Bidders shall be required to confirm such extensions in writing within the period specified by the department.
2.1.12	The Department will evaluate bids in terms of disqualifying conditions, any condition with the word or term "must" or "will", is deemed to be a disqualifying condition.

- 2.1.13 The Department reserves the right to accept or reject any bid offer and may cancel the bidding process or reject all bids at any time before awarding a contract, for reasons including, but not limited to the following:
- (a) There has been a change in circumstances, and the services specified in the invitation are no longer required;
 - (b) Funds are no longer available to cover the anticipated expenditure;
 - (c) No acceptable bids have been received; or
 - (d) A material irregularity has occurred in the bidding process.

2.4 Supplier Database Registration

2.6.1 It is a condition of bid that bidders must have **at least a minimum of two-years relevant experience in the provision of home-based OR frail care services** for intellectually /physically disabled children and adults. To this end, experience in the provision of disabled home-based/frail care services with a focus on caring for the intellectually and physically disabled children and adults will be considered relevant experience. Bidders must provide references that will allow the department to verify their experience in the specified field. Bidders that do not provide references will be disqualified.

2.8.2 Prospective bidders that attend the site visit will be required to sign an Attendance Register before commencement of the site visit and will be issued with an Attendance Certificate after the site inspection is completed. The Attendance Certificate must be submitted with the bid document as proof of attendance.

2.8.3 Where a prospective bidder arrives late for the site inspection, the Department may refuse to issue an Attendance Certificate. Prospective bidders are therefore encouraged to be on time.

2.9 Pricing, price breakdown and price adjustments:

2.9.1 Pricing:

a) The Pricing Schedule (WCBD 3.2) must be completed in all respects.

2.9.2 Price breakdown, price adjustments and price adjustment intervals:

- a) Pricing must be stipulated inclusive of VAT.
- b) The Pricing Schedule (WCBD 3.2) must be completed in all respects.
- c) Bidders must complete the provided detailed cost breakdown that forms part of the Pricing Schedule (WCDB 3.2 – Detailed Cost Breakdown).
- d) Bidder must note that for the purposes of price adjustments, a minimum of 15% of the original bid price shall remain firm and will not be subject to any price escalations.

3. BID SPECIFICATIONS

3.1 Scope:

- 3.1.1 To provide an efficient and effective home-based care service at the Sivuyile Residential Facility (situated at Stikland Hospital) for persons with severe and profound intellectual and physical disabilities for a period of five (5) years. Currently, Sivuyile houses 110 such residents. The service must be conducted in a spirit of compassion and understanding of the needs of the residents.

3.2 Requirements

- 3.2.1 The requirements with regards to the number of home-based carers is stipulated in the WCDB 3.2

3.3 Profile for home-based care workers:

- 3.3.1 Must be in possession of a basic SETA Accredited Home-Based Care qualification.
- 3.3.2 Each worker must be able to communicate (verbal and written) in at least two official languages of the Western Cape, the total staff compliment must be able to converse in all three official languages (English, Afrikaans, Xhosa) of the Western Cape.
- 3.3.3 Must be physically fit for purpose i.e. able to lift clients (children and adults), etc.
- 3.3.4 Must have previous experience in care for intellectual disabled/frail care and residential care.
- 3.3.5 Must not have been declared unsuitable to work with children in terms of the Child Care Act 38 of 2005 i.e. the person must not be listed in part B of the National Child Protection Register.
- 3.3.6 Must not have a record of violence, neglect or abuse of persons.

3.4 Duties

- 3.4.1 Home-based care workers will be fully responsible to provide all the care needs. Their duties will include but will not be limited to:
- 3.4.1.1 Full time supervision of all residents on a 24-hour basis.
 - 3.4.1.2 Follow and strictly adhere to the structured daily program of the facility.
 - 3.4.1.3 Physical and hygiene care to all residents including bathing, dressing, oral hygiene, basic hair care and changing of nappies.
 - 3.4.1.4 Feeding of residents including dishing of meals, feeding, feeding supplements, tube feeding and preparation of milk supplements for tube feeding.
 - 3.4.1.5 Assist with neatness of cupboards and cleanliness of assistive devices.
 - 3.4.1.6 Assist cleaners with medical waste clearing from units.
 - 3.4.1.7 Seating and positioning of residents according to prescribed assistive devices.
 - 3.4.1.8 Turning of residents according to prescribed time frames.
 - 3.4.1.9 Facilitate daily stimulation program, e.g arts & crafts, recreational sessions, garden walks.

- 3.4.1.10 Facilitate and maintain a caring, therapeutic environment for residents.
- 3.4.1.11 Actively communicate with clients to assess their needs.
- 3.4.1.12 Participate in in-service training sessions.
- 3.4.1.13 Assist with self-help activities (potty training, brushing of teeth, etc.)
- 3.4.1.14 Manage input and output of residents.
- 3.4.1.15 Communicate with residents in an appropriate manner.
- 3.4.1.16 Report all reportable incidents in the prescribed manner.
- 3.4.1.17 Assist with folding and packing of washing.
- 3.4.1.18 Escort residents to hospital/community health centre appointments, family visits, school attendance and/or protective workshops.
- 3.4.1.19 Provide written incident reports to nursing staff.
- 3.4.1.20 Document and report on:
 - (a) Behaviour of residents,
 - (b) Input and output,
 - (c) Personal hygiene,
 - (d) Daily occurrences,
 - (e) Stimulation program, and
 - (f) Reportable incidents. E.g, damage to property, injuries of residents, health concerns.

3.4.2 Home-based care workers will perform their duties under the direct supervision of a departmentally assigned representative which may either be a professional nurse, enrolled nurse or an enrolled nursing assistant. Home-based care workers will be required to collaborate with the nursing professional in planning the maintenance programme for residents.

3.4.3 A detailed procedure manual will be provided for each post upon commencement of the service.

3.4.4 All home-based care workers shall be required to complete the institution's orientation programme before services to residents can be rendered.

3.4.5 Any additional duty that are conferred upon the carer that relates to the operational requirements for home-based care/residential care.

3.5 Conduct of home-based care workers

3.5.1 The code of conduct of the facility shall apply to the service provider and its staff.

3.5.2 The Provincial Government Western Cape expects the highest possible standards of conduct from all staff. Transgressions that are non-compliant to the code of conduct is:

- 3.5.2.1 Absence without proper notification,
- 3.5.2.2 Accepting gifts or bribes in the line of duty,
- 3.5.2.3 Drinking intoxicating liquor or using drugs, being under its influence on duty or reporting for duty while intoxicated,
- 3.5.2.4 Harshness or violence or using profane language,

- 3.5.2.5 Willful disobedience of site instructions, orders of a superior or a reasonable request by a staff member or resident.
- 3.5.2.6 Failure to always wear the standard uniform when on duty.
- 3.5.2.7 Failure to complete occurrence book or any other documents as specified,
- 3.5.2.8 Failing to present an acceptable image, or to deal with any client in a respectable manner,
- 3.5.2.9 Sleeping on duty, theft, eating food of clients, and withholding basic rights from clients.
- 3.5.2.10 Zero tolerance on sexual harassment and related offences.
- 3.5.2.11 Any deviation in the Code of Conduct as prescribed by Sivuyile will be regarded as extremely serious and may be sufficient reason to ask the service provider to remove and replace the person permanently from the site.

3.6 Legal Rights, Functions and Obligations

- 3.6.1 The service provider shall, to the extent to which it is applicable, adhere to the requirements of the following legislation.

4. SPECIAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT AND OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

4.1 Specific operational requirements:

- 4.1.1 The service provider, upon commencement of the service, must provide proof of Hepatitis B injections for all the staff that will be deployed at the site. The service provider must also provide proof during the contract term of top-up of these injections.
- 4.1.2 The service provider shall not deploy persons that have been declared unsuitable to work with children in terms of the Child Care Act 38 of 2005 i.e. the person must not be listed in part B of the National Child Protection Register. Upon commencement of the service, the service provider must provide proof of submission of form 29 as set out in the Child Care Act 38 of 2005 for all the staff that will be deployed at the site. Thereafter to be submitted annually.
- 4.1.3 The service provider, upon commencement of the service, must provide police clearances for all the staff that will be deployed at the site. No person with a record of violence, abuse or negligence to persons shall be deployed at the facility. Thereafter to be submitted annually.
- 4.1.4 The Department's authorised representative shall have the right to request the replacement of any employee that does not comply with contract requirements.
- 4.1.5 The service provider must in consultation with the Department's authorised representative make replacement staff timeously available for induction and orientation purposes. No home-based carer shall be allowed to provide care if such a person did not complete the institution's orientation programme.
- 4.1.6 All requirements stipulated in the bid document (special conditions, contract conditions, specifications, etc.) where applicable, will remain for the duration of the contract term.

4.2 Entrance Control:

- 4.2.1 All carers will be subjected to control at the gate when entering the hospital premises.
- 4.2.2 Carers must identify themselves by recognized methods of identification before being allowed on the premises. The service provider are responsible to provide the home-based care worker with a company logo identification card, with the employee's photo, full name, and identification number.
- 4.2.3 The service provider and/or its staff will not be allowed to bring anything that is prohibited (e.g. firearms, alcohol, etc.) onto the premises.
- 4.2.4 The service provider and/or its staff will not be allowed carry out any activity on the premises that is prohibited by the Department.

4.3 Obligations of the Service Provider

- 4.3.1 Not attend to or allow any labour and disciplinary issues, actions, meeting with trade unions or enquiries relating to labour related issues in respect of the Home-Based Care Workers to take place at the facility during the working hours of the Home-Based Care Workers, without the prior written consent of the Department;
- 4.3.2 Instruct Home Based Care Workers to duly complete the necessary documentation to record the care status, including but not limited to, individual care plans, hygiene registers and communication books regarding residents;
- 4.3.3 Immediately repair, or replace, if necessary, any equipment and/ or goods of the Department which were damaged by the Home-Based Care Workers;
- 4.3.4 Instruct Home Based Care Workers to not disclose any information, including clinical, personal and medical history and treatment of the resident, without the prior written consent of the Department and ensure that the Home-Based Care Workers complete confidentiality and non-disclosure forms in this regard;

4.4 Particulars of Home-Based Carers

- 4.4.1 The successful service provider must supply the particulars of the carers to be employed at Sivuyile Residential Facility two (2) weeks before the commencement of the contract.
- 4.4.2 Staff shall be available for onsite training (orientation) before commencement of the service. The training will not take longer than three days. The cost of the on-site orientation training will be for the account for the Department, but the costs associated with the attendance of the staff will be for the account of the service provider.

4.5 On-Site Administration

- 4.5.1 all carers are required to sign timesheets on a daily basis
- 4.5.2 All carers shall be supplied with a uniform that are prescribed by the Department of Health. The costs associated with the uniform will be for the account of the service provider. Samples of the uniform will be made available at the site inspection.
- 4.5.3 The service provider shall ensure that carers are presentable during shifts i.e. uniforms must be clean.
- 4.5.4 Each carer shall be provided with at least two sets of uniforms that are suitable for wear during different seasons (summer and winter).

4.6 Remuneration

- 4.6.1 For the duration of the contract period, the service provider must comply with all the applicable labour legislation, particular insofar it pertains to the payment of remuneration. The Department may from time to time require the bidder to provide proof of compliance with labour legislation and/or compliance with remuneration requirements.

- 4.6.2 Prior to commencement of the service, the service provider shall provide the Department with the following:
- (a) A COIDA letter of Good Standing or a letter from the Department of Labour that confirms that the bidder has made application for good standing or a letter from the Department of Labour that proves that the service provider is in the process of registering for COIDA.
- 4.7 Public Liability Insurance
- 4.7.1 The successful bidder must obtain public liability insurance at his own cost commensurate with the risk to which the service provider is exposed. The insurance shall make provision for all vicarious losses for which the successful bidder or his staff may be responsible.
- 4.7.2 The successful bidder shall on demand provide proof of public liability insurance and its validity.
- 4.8 Operational hours
- 4.8.1 The working hours is from 07:00 to 19:00 and from 19:00 to 07:00 per day including lunch hours for 7 days in a week including weekends and public holidays.
- 4.8.2 Staff will report for duty 15 minutes before the start of shift for handover.
- 4.8.3 No employee shall be allowed to work more than one shift per day.
- 4.9 Training:
- 4.9.1 It will be the service provider's responsibility to ensure that during the contract period, the home-based care workers' skills remain relevant to the operational needs of the facility. The service provider must provide proof of all training that the home-based care workers completed during the contract period.
- 4.10 Contract price adjustments and escalation of prices:
- 4.10.1 Bid prices shall remain firm for the first 12-months of the contract. For the period following the first 12-months of the contract and in the event that the service provider applies for an adjustment, prices will be adjusted in accordance with the CPI indices.
- 4.10.2 The service provider will be eligible to apply for increases annually. The anniversary date for adjustments will be calculated from the expiry date of the first 12-months of the contract.

4.11 Penalties and pro-rata deduction of penalties:

4.11.1 Penalties will be applied for non-adherence/non-compliance to contract conditions.

4.11.2 Penalties will be levied per incident/occurrence.

4.11.3 Pro-rata deductions will be made from the service provider's monthly contract amount.

4.11.4 Penalties will be levied for the following incidents/occurrences.

4.11.5 Penalty amounts will increase annually with inflation.

4.12 Advertising and Trading

4.12.1 Neither the successful bidder nor his staff shall be entitled to offer any article for sale, sell any article or distribute any article free of charge on the site.

4.13 Changes to Bidders Operational Status

4.13.1 As the bid is awarded on the information provided/available at the time, the successful bidder must maintain the status quo for the bid period. Should any deviation or changes occur, the successful bidder must advise the Department accordingly.

4.14 Service Level Agreement

4.14.1 The Department and the successful bidder shall enter into a Service Level Agreement.

4.15 Breach and Termination:

4.15.1 Bidders are referred to Paragraph 23 of General Conditions of Contract (GCC) relating to failure to comply with conditions of this contract.

4.15.2 Payment of any consideration in terms of the contract shall not constitute acceptance of any defective or non- conforming Services or otherwise relieve the service provider of any of its obligations under the contract.

4.16 Payment:

- 4.16.1 The Contractor shall at the end of each calendar month submit an invoice together with copies of the time sheets for that particular month, certified by the relevant office manager or his/her delegate.
- 4.16.2 The accounting period shall run from the first of the month to the end of the month except for the month of March where a proforma invoice will be provided at the beginning of March.
- 4.16.3 Invoices must be submitted within seven calendar days after the last day of the previous month and must be accompanied by a timesheet, completed and signed by the operator.
- 4.16.4 The terms of payment shall be 30 days upon receipt of invoice.

NOTES

The purpose of this document is to:

- (i) Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and
- (ii) To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

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General Conditions of Contract

1. Definitions

1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
 - 1.1 “Closing time” means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
 - 1.2 “Contract” means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
 - 1.3 “Contract price” means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
 - 1.4 “Corrupt practice” means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
 - 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
 - 1.6 “Country of origin” means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
 - 1.7 “Day” means calendar day.
 - 1.8 “Delivery” means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
 - 1.9 “Delivery ex stock” means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
 - 1.10 “Delivery into consignees store or to his site” means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
 - 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the

RSA.

- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such

obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

- 1.25 “Written” or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

- 2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.
- 2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

3. General

- 3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.
- 3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from www.treasury.gov.za

4. Standards

- 4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.

- 5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.
- 5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.
- 5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier’s performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.
- 5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier’s records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

6. Patent rights

- 6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

7. Performance security

- 7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.
- 7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
 - (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
 - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or

analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.

- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

12. Transportation

- 12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

13. Incidental services

- 13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
 - (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
 - (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;

- (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.

13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

14. Spare parts

14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:

- (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
- (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

15. Warranty

15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take

such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.

21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:

- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
- (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
- (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.

23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any

person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

- (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
- (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
- (iii) the period of restriction; and
- (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

24. Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights

24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anti-dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which

may be due to him

25. Force Majeure

- 25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.
- 25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

26. Termination for insolvency

- 26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of Disputes

- 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of liability

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
- (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and

	(b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.
29. Governing language	29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.
30. Applicable law	30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.
31. Notices	31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice 31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.
32. Taxes and duties	32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country. 32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser. 32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.
33. National Industrial Participation Programme (NIP)	33.1 The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.
34 Prohibition of Restrictive practices	34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging). 34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.

- 34.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.
