BACKGROUND TO SARAO

The South African Radio Astronomy Observatory (SARAO) is the National Research Foundation’s National Facility incorporating South Africa’s radio astronomy instruments and programmes such as the MeerKAT and KAT-7 telescopes in the Karoo in the Northern Cape, the Hartebeesthoek Radio Astronomy Observatory (HartRAO) in Gauteng, the African Very Long Baseline Interferometry (AVN) programme in nine African countries as well as the associated human capital development and commercialisation endeavours. PART A – THE TENDER

CONTEXT OF THE PROCUREMENT NEED

The Square Kilometre Array (SKA) project is an international effort to build the world's largest radio telescope. The SKA is not a single dish telescope, but a collection of telescope stations called an array, to be spread over long distances. The Astronomy Management Authority (AMA) is a directorate of the Department of Science & Innovation. AMA is designated by the Minister to be responsible for the management of the declared Karoo Central Astronomy Advantage Areas (KCAAAAs) in terms of the Astronomy Geographic Advantage Act, 2007 (the AGA Act). The KCAAAAs are protected by means of KCAAA Regulations for the purpose of radio astronomy and related scientific activities. More information about the AMA, AGA Act and KCAAA Regulations is available on www.dst.gov.za/ama/ or <https://ama.dst.gov.za/>.

The Regulations are limited to what is reasonably necessary to protect the scientific integrity of the SKA telescope as a priority, while other fundamental rights are also protected in so far as it is reasonably possible. The financial cost which directly results from the need to protect the SKA telescope is paid back by the Minister responsible for Science and Innovation. The Regulations protect scientific activities from radio frequency interference (RFI) emitted by radio communication services such as cellular phones or WiFi over long distances, and electromagnetic interference (EMI) of electrical equipment emissions over a shorter distance.

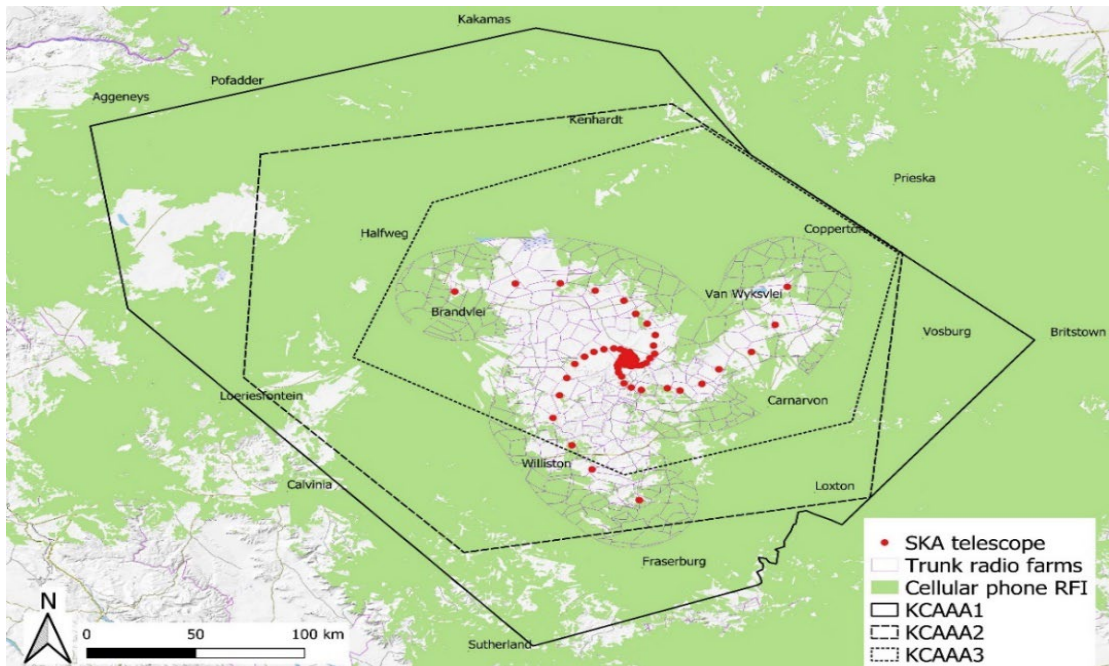


Figure 1: Cellular phone coverage in KCAA

National cellular phone operators applied for AMA permits to continue using the radio frequency spectrum in the KCAAAAs. To protect the SKA telescope from cellular phone RFI, the signal level at each telescope station is at a level below what could be used for making and receiving cellular phone calls. Farm portions that do not have cellular phone signals are located within the KCAAA2 and KCAAA3 designated zones as indicated in Figure 1 below. These farm portions are provided with VSAT (very small aperture terminal) earth station for satellite broadband internet connectivity and Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) service. **Figure 1** below, illustrates green areas that have cellular phone services, and white areas that use VSAT service and mobile trunk radio service, without cell phone signal.

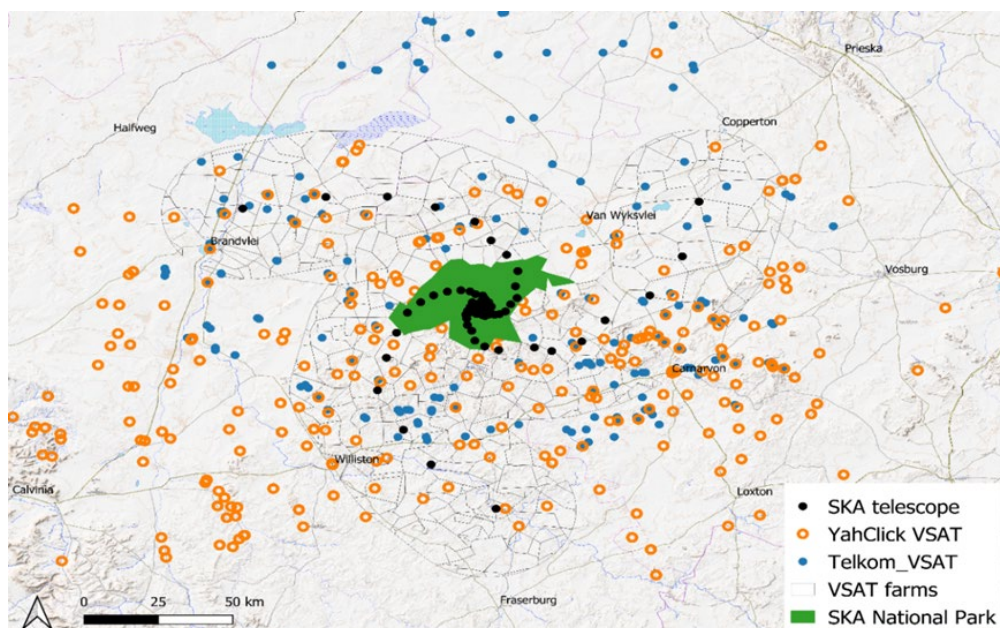


Figure 2: Satellite earth station

SARAO initially offered a subsidised a VSAT service through YahClick VSAT with internet connectivity speed of 2 Mbps and a telephone service on contract NRF\SKA N0001-0004/2014. The current VSAT service offering through Morclick (Tender Ref: NRF/SARAO SAGA/20/2021-22) includes packages with connectivity speed of 5Mbps, 10Mbps, 20Mbps, 30Mbps or 50Mbps that are selected based on needs and affordability. The current VSAT service expires in Oct 2024. The distribution of farm portions near the remote SKA telescope stations currently using VSAT services are shown in **Figure 2** below.

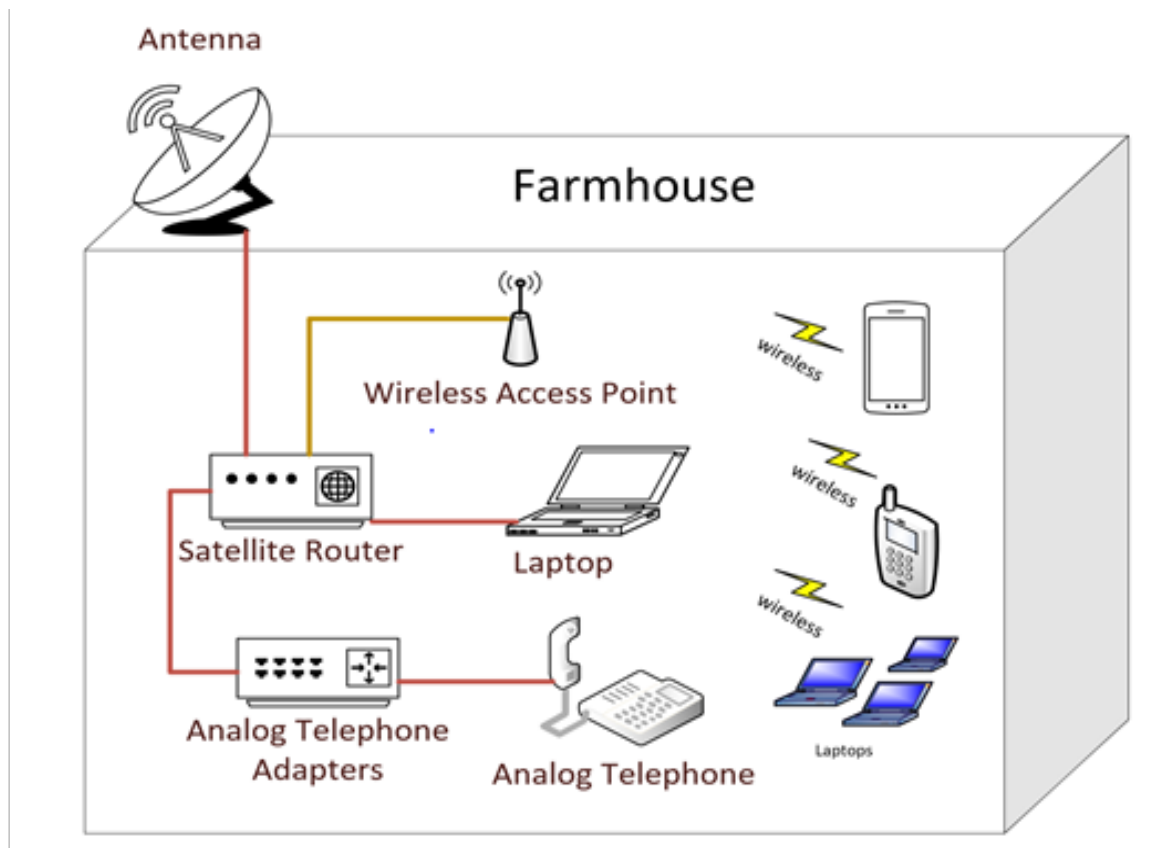


Figure 3: VSAT infrastructure

Satellite systems offer significant advantage for broadband coverage across a large land area. Satellite systems are reliable and immune to risks other networks systems such as cellular phone networks or landline cables face, which include accidental damage, theft and natural disasters. Satellite equipment installed in farm houses as identified in **Figure 3** includes outdoor satellite dish, satellite router, telephone handset and indoor Wireless Access Point.

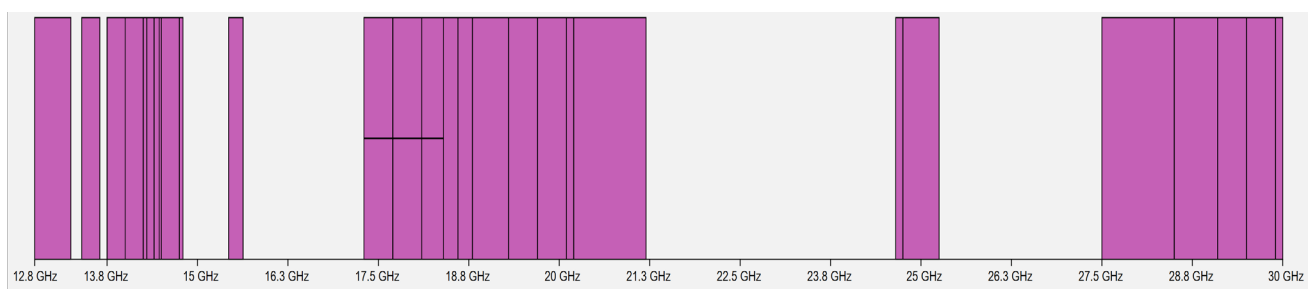


Figure 4: non-geostationary satellite system

Non-geostationary satellite system in the fixed satellite service across the African continent make use of the following radio spectrum bands 13.75-14.5 GHz (Earth-to-space), 17.8-18.6 GHz (space-to-Earth), 19.7-20.2 GHz (space-to-Earth), 27.5-28.6 GHz (Earth-to-space), 29.5-30 GHz (Earth-to-space), as illustrated in **Figure 4**.

The Ku frequency band, 13.75-14.5 GHz (Earth-to-space) is within the spectrum that is restricted in the KCAAA's regulations, while the Ka frequency band, 27.5-28.6 GHz (Earth-to-space) or 29.5-30 GHz (Earth-to-space) is outside of the spectrum that is restricted in the KCAAA's regulations. The Regulations for the protection of the KCAAA's prohibit the use of spectrum from 100 MHz to 25.5 GHz unless a permit is granted by the Astronomy Management Authority (AMA).

SATELLITE FREQUENCY BANDS FOR SATELLITE COMMUNICATION

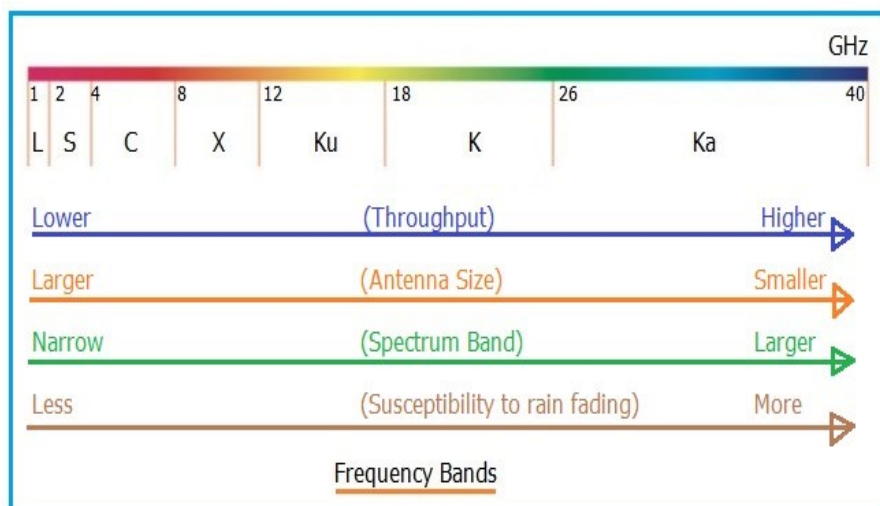


Figure 5: Satellite frequency Bands

The major difference between the Ka-band and the Ku-band satellite communication is the frequency of each band, which affects the quality of the connection provided. Ku-band use the frequency in the 12 to 18 GHz range, while Ka-band uses frequency in the 26 to 40 GHz range. There is more bandwidth for the Ka-band system in the higher frequency, which means a higher data transfer rate and higher performance. The Ku-band has the capacity to cover an entire continent with a single beam, whereas the Ka-band has a smaller range, which can provide country-wide coverage through multiple beams. **Figure 5** compares the performance and characteristics of satellite frequency bands, which includes higher throughput and larger spectrum bands for the Ka-band, when compared to lower throughput and narrow spectrum bands for the Ku-band.

The C-band and the Ku-band of the spectrum in **Figure 5** has been around for many years, which resulted in many satellites using frequencies in these bands; whereas, the use of the Ka-band that started recently has frequency re-use capability of multiple spot beam technology that has larger usable spectrum. The use of signals in the Ka-band is the next step in the evolution of satellite communication which has higher bandwidth requirements. Even though the technological shift towards higher frequency signals will continue to push many more applications towards the Ka-band in future, the Ku-band, like the C-band and the L-band before it, will continue to remain important and reliable options.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS NETWORK COMPONENTS

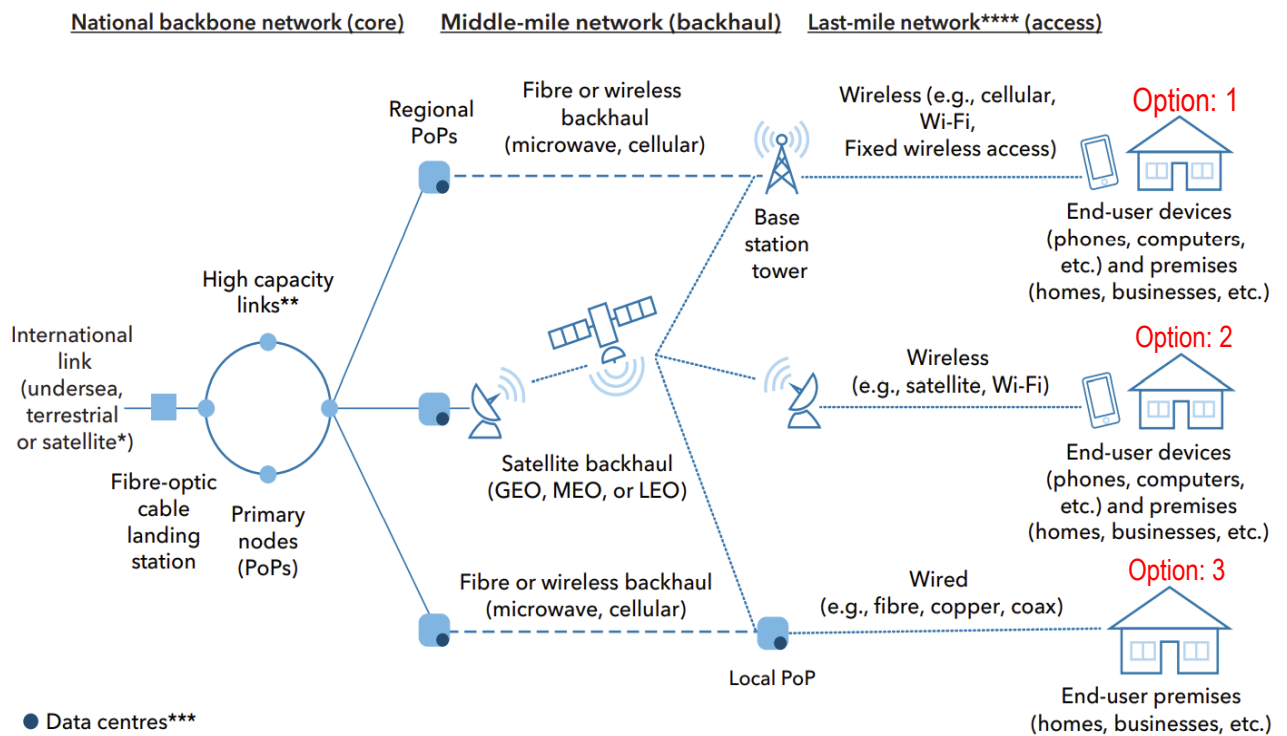


Figure 6: Last-mile interventions for KCAAs, Source: <http://handle.itu.int/11.1002/pub/8174ed4c-en>

Figure 6 is an illustration of possible options to deliver last-mile or access network in the KCAAs, which is where internet reaches end-user equipment such as smartphones, laptops and internet enabled devices. Option 1, make use of generic telecommunication network components that will continue to be accessible in town and not at the vicinity of remote SKA telescope stations as shown in **Figure 1** above. Option 2 makes use of correct telecommunication network components that will be available to the local public members at the vicinity of remote SKA telescope stations as shown in **Figure 2** above. Option 3 makes use of telecommunication network components that are used to connect each telescope station and office building.

The main objective of this bid, as shown in **Figure 6** is to provide the last-mile network or access network, which is where the internet reaches the end-user devices such as smartphones and laptops at home or businesses. The scope of the project assumes Middle-mile network and National backbone network are already available in the KCAAs; hence, the core and the backhaul components shown in **Figure 6** are out of scope. Wi-Fi is a very common and cost-effective last-mile access technology that can be used with network option 1, network option 2 or network option 3. Satellite technology is a mature technology that is increasingly used for Internet data communications. There are over 775 communication satellites orbiting the planet and the technology is useful for reaching suburban, rural and ultra-remote parts of the KCAAs.

WIRELESS ACCESS POINT AND VSAT EQUIPMENT SPECIFICATIONS

SATELLITE COMMUNICATION

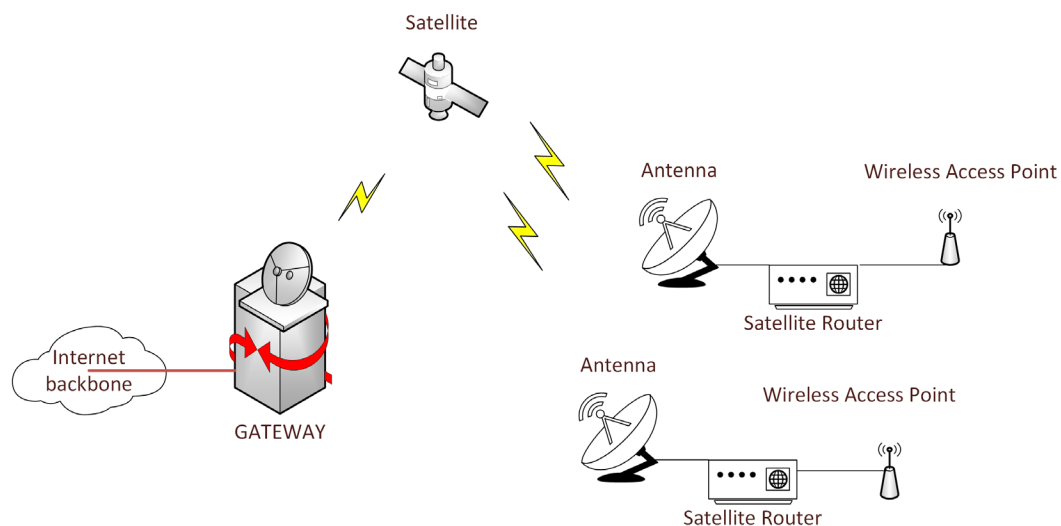


Figure 7: Satellite communication components

Satellite connectivity is utilised for a range of different deployment scenarios in support of last-mile connectivity such as Wi-Fi. The biggest advantage of satellites is their very wide coverage area, with service available wherever there is a line of sight to the satellite from a station located anywhere within the satellite's footprint. Satellite communication has two main components which consist of the ground segment transmitter and receiver, and the space segment which is the satellite itself. A typical satellite link involves the uplink of a signal from the Earth station to a satellite, and the satellite that receives and retransmit the signal back to earth, where it is received by the Earth station and terminal as presented in **Figure 7**.

Three types of communication services in **Figure 7: Satellite communication components** includes telecommunications, broadcasting and data communications. Telecommunication services include telephone calls and services provided to cellular network providers. Broadcasting services include radio and television delivered directly to the consumer such as direct to home (DTH) or satellite television. Data communications involve the transfer of data from one point to another. With the growth of the Internet, a significant amount of Internet traffic goes through satellites. Satellites face competition from other media such as fibre optics, cable and other land-based delivery systems such as microwave or power lines.

The main advantage of satellites is that they can distribute signals from one point-to-multipoint communications such as broadcasting. Satellite communication does not require massive investment on the ground making it ideal for the underserved and isolated areas with dispersed populations. The KCAAs is considered by ICASA, the national telecommunications regulator to be under served in terms of telecommunication services. The farming area of the KCAAs is mountainous and the farm houses distributed sparsely over a large geographic area. Satellite technologies are much more feasible in the KCAAs areas when compared to the feasibility of fibre, cable, and microwave links.

WI-FI NETWORK

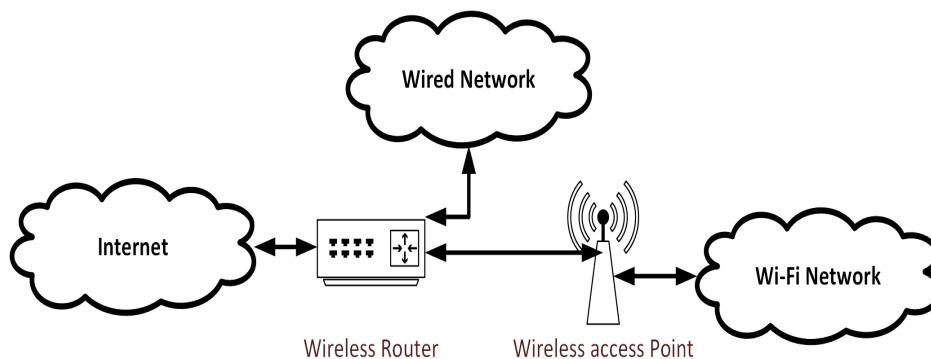


Figure 8: Indoor Broadband internet connectivity and voice telephone service

Wi-Fi is a radio access technology that is based on the IEEE 802.11 group of standards, used mostly to transmit data over licence-exempt frequency bands. Wi-Fi is commonly used for personal local area networking, connecting the Internet to a Wi-Fi access point which in turn is connected to end-user devices. Various types of wireless technology and networks allow devices to speak (send data) to each other and to the web (TCP/IP Networks) without cables. Wi-Fi uses radio waves to allow two devices to communicate with one another. The technology is most commonly used to connect Internet routers to devices like computers, tablets and phones. Wi-Fi can utilize both the global 2.4 GHz UHF and 5 GHz SHF ISM radio bands. The Wi-Fi technology in the 2.4 GHz band is susceptible to interference from Bluetooth devices, as well as microwave ovens and cordless phones. A wireless access point allows wireless devices to connect to the wireless network as illustrates in **Figure 8**.

The Wi-Fi technology as illustrated in Figure 8 interfaces with the internet to provide voice-applications, entertainment and information to computers (laptop or desktop), mobile devices (smart phones or wearables) and other equipment (printers or video cameras) through hot spots like Home, Office, Airport, Hotel and Restaurants. The applications of Wi-Fi include the following: Mobile applications, Business applications, home applications, Computerized applications, Automotive segment, Browsing internet and Video conference. The Wi-Fi technology make use of the radio spectrum in 2.4 GHz, 5 GHz, and 6 GHz bands as listed in Table 1. The higher the frequency of a wireless signal, the shorter its coverage range. Wi-Fi in the 2.4 GHz band cover a large area, while the Wi-Fi in 5 GHz band cover a small area. The signal in 5 GHz band do not penetrate solid objects as well as the signal in 2.4 GHz band. The 2.4 GHz band provide good coverage range, while 5 GHz band provide good speed or higher performance as listed in Table 1.

The bid requirement is for Wi-Fi technology that operates in the 5 GHz spectrum band using IEEE 802.11 protocol. The Wi-Fi Hotspot is backhauled over satellite links to offer Internet access to people in rural community where terrestrial service is too expensive or simply unavailable. This service allows end-users in rural communities to connect to the Internet using multimedia broadband connectivity for browsing, messaging, email, voice and video chat.

SERVICE SPECIFICATIONS

1. Satellite Equipment

- (i) Bidders must submit with their bid, a valid Electronic Communications Network Service (ECNS) license that allows service providers to deploy and operate physical networks in South Africa.
- (ii) Bidders must submit with the bid, a certificate of conformity issued by a designated certification body confirming the conformance of the electronic communications equipment with the applicable standard.
- (iii) The successful bidder that has an ECNS license shall supply, deliver, install and commission satellite equipment.
- (iv) The successful bidder shall provide Karoo communities with Ka-band satellite equipment that is funded by SARAO.
- (v) The successful bidder shall request approval from SARAO to confirm the customer is within the KCAAAAs.
- (vi) The successful bidder shall invoice SARAO for the equipment supplied after the customer signoff for acceptance.
- (vii) SARAO shall pay for the approved satellite infrastructure and/or the wireless access point on receipt of the invoices.

2. Connectivity Service Plans

- (i) Bidders must submit with their bid, a valid Electronic Communications Service (ECS) licence that enables its holder to provide electronic communications services to customers over its own or via another company's network.
- (ii) Bidders must submit with their bid, a marketing and sales plan for internet broadband and VoIP services with a dedicated contact person fluent in both English & Afrikaans.
- (iii) Bidders must submit with their bid, a detailed sample template of the customer service level agreement that will be signed with the local community member, which pay for internet services using satellite equipment subsidised by SARAO.
- (iv) The successful bidder shall provide Karoo community members with competitive uncapped broadband deals with a larger data package before throttling.
- (v) The successful bidder shall enable Karoo community members to select uncapped service plan with speed of 5Mbps, 10Mbps, 20Mbps, 30Mbps or 50Mbps
- (vi) Each customer shall receive VoIP service to enable voice communication services over satellite network.
- (vii) The successful bidder shall provide high speed broadband for indoor wireless local area network (WLAN) that contains many types of devices including: mobile phones, laptop, tablet computers, internet audio systems, gaming consoles, and other internet-enabled home appliances or devices.
- (viii) The satellite system shall give high priority access to voice service when compared to data services.

3. Customer Support and Maintenance

- (i) Bidders must submit a maintenance and support plan with their bids.
- (ii) The maintenance and support plan should include clear repair and replacement mechanisms should a fault occur.
- (iii) Bidders must conduct service evaluation surveys every six months.
- (iv) Bidders must submit an operations and billing plan with their bids.
- (v) The successful bidder shall provide maintenance and support services for satellite equipment that consist of satellite dish, router, telephone handset and indoor wireless access point with a 36-hour turnaround time.
- (vi) The successful bidder shall conclude a service level agreement with each customer to maintain the equipment.
- (vii) The successful bidder shall conclude a service level agreement with each customer to provide online support services, call centre support services and call - out services.
- (viii) The successful bidder shall provide billing services for the broadband internet and voice telephone calls.

4. WIFI Technical Parameters

- (i) Bidders shall submit with their bid, a certificate of conformity issued by a designated certification body confirming the conformance of the electronic communications equipment with the applicable standard.
- (ii) The successful bidder shall supply Wi-Fi equipment that operates in the radio frequency from 5150 MHz to 5350 MHz.
- (iii) The successful bidder shall supply and install Wi-Fi technology that does not exceed 20 dBm, 100 mW or 0.1 W (Watt) EIRP (Effective Isotropic Radiated Power).
- (iv) The successful bidder shall supply and install the Wi-Fi equipment that are configured to operate in the 20 MHz Channel Width.
- (v) WiFi equipment shall comply with the saturation threshold of (minus) – 100 dBm at any of the SKA telescope station for the radio spectrum from 5150 MHz to 5350 MHz.
- (vi) WiFi equipment shall comply with the Protection Levels Regulations published on 10 February 2012, in Government Gazette No. 35007, under Notice No. R90 for the spectrum outside the exempted band 5150 MHz to 5350 MHz.
- (vii) The bidder shall supply and install Wi-Fi which is “Wireless Fidelity” to allow computers and other devices to connect to the internet from proximity of a wireless access point (AP).
- (viii) The bidder shall supply and install Wi-Fi technology that is based on the IEEE 802.11ac group of standards in the 5 GHz radio spectrum. Wi-Fi devices shall not operate in other radio frequency bands such as the 2.4 GHz or 6 GHz near the telescope.
- (ix) Shortlisted bidders shall submit a sample of proposed equipment for radio frequency interference measurements and electromagnetic interference measurements prior to bid award, to confirm the compliance with specification.

5. Satellite Technical Parameters

- (i) Satellite equipment shall comply with the saturation threshold of (minus) – 100 dBm at any of the SKA telescope station for the radio spectrum from 26 GHz to 30 GHz.
- (ii) Satellite equipment shall comply with the Protection Levels Regulations published on 10 February 2012, in Government Gazette No. 35007, under Notice No. R90 for the spectrum outside the band from 26 GHz to 30 GHz.
- (iii) Shortlisted bidders must submit a sample of proposed equipment for radio frequency interference measurements and electromagnetic interference measurements prior to bid award, to confirm compliance with specification.

6. Miscellaneous

- (i) The successful bidder shall remove old equipment when installing new equipment.
- (ii) The successful bidder shall ensure that disposal of old equipment is undertaken in an ethical manner and compliant with prevailing e-waste legislation.
- (iii) All new equipment should have a warranty for the duration of the customer

contract.

- (iv) The successful bidder shall provide SARAO with monthly call centre fault reports.
- (v) The successful bidder shall provide SARAO with customer service evaluation surveys every six months.
- (vi) Method of reporting faults should be simple and well documented.
- (vii) Faults should be resolved within 36 hours.
- (viii) There should be top-up function when the data is exhausted.
- (ix) The customer should be able to upgrade their package without penalty.
- (x) Wi-Fi calling should get higher priority to avoid dropped calls.
- (xi) It should be possible to have a USSD code.
- (xii) Existing telephone numbers should continue to work under a new contract.
- (xiii) The brochure should clearly identify the cost of internet only and the cost of internet with a phone line.

BID SELECTION PROCESS

STAGE 1 – SUBMISSION OF RETURNABLE DOCUMENTS AND SCHEDULES

The National Research Foundation cannot amend the National Treasury’s General Conditions of Contract (GCC). The National Research Foundation compiles separate Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to this bid where applicable supplementing the General Conditions of Contract. Where there is conflict, the provisions of the Special Conditions of Contract shall prevail.

GCC 1	Definitions – The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
1.1	“Closing time” means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
1.2	“Contract” means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.

1.9	“Delivery ex stock” means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
1.10	“Delivery into consignees store or to his site” means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
1.11	“Dumping” occurs when a private enterprise abroad markets its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.

GCC13	Incidental services
13.1	The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
13.1.1	Performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
13.1.2	Furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
13.1.3	Furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
13.1.4	Performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
13.1.5	Training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, conducted in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.
13.2	Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.
GCC14	Spare parts

14.1	As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:
14.1.1	Such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
14.1.2	In the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
14.1.2.1	Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
14.1.2.1	Following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.
GCC15	Warranty
15.1	The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models and those they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.
15.2	This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.
15.3	The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.
15.4	Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.
15.5	If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights, which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.
GCC16	Payment
16.1	The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
16.2	The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
16.3	Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
16.4	Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.
GCC17	Prices
17.1	Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.
GCC18	Contract amendment
18.1	No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.
GCC19	Assignment

19.1	The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.
GCC20	Subcontract
20.1	The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contract if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract
GCC21	Delays in supplier's performance
21.1	Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
21.2	If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration, and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
21.3	No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.

 - (d) recommend that the tenderer or contractor, its shareholders and directors, or only the shareholders and directors who acted on a fraudulent basis, be restricted from obtaining business from any organ of state for a period not exceeding 10 years, after the *audi alteram partem* (hear the other side) rule has been applied; and

- (e) forward the matter for criminal prosecution, if deemed necessary.
