INTRODUCTION

1. DESCRIPTION

The appointment of a service provider to provide construction occupational health and safety services to the MHSC for its office building renovation project for a period of six (6) months.

2. BACKGROUND

The Mine Health and Safety Council (MHSC) is a national public entity (schedule 3A), established in terms of the Mine Health and Safety Act, No 29 of 1996, as amended. The MHSC is mandated to advise the Minister of Mineral Resources on Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) issues in the mining industry relating to the development and implementation of the MHSC annual OHS research programme, reviewing and development of mining OHS legislation and dissemination (knowledge and technology transfer) of MHSC research outcomes to improve OHS conditions in South African Mining Industry.

The MHSC will undertake the renovation and internal fit-out of its new premises located at Tuscany Office Park, Rivonia, Sandton. The facility measures approximately 2473m² with 96 parking bays, and the project will be delivered through separately appointed contractors, each responsible for a distinct package of work. The project must comply with all applicable South African building regulations, municipal by-laws and occupational health and safety standards. The renovation project is broken down as follows:

a) Construction Works

General building and structural work, including demolitions, partitions, ceilings, flooring, painting, plumbing, roofing, and civil-related alterations, as per architectural specifications.

b) Electrical Works

Installation and commissioning of all electrical systems, including power distribution, lighting, backup power, energy-efficient solutions and fire detection systems. Compliance with SANS 10142 and relevant safety codes is required.

c) Mechanical Works

Installation of HVAC systems, including ventilation, air conditioning, ducting, and controls to ensure thermal comfort and air quality in accordance with SANS and environmental standards.

d) ICT Infrastructure Works (incl. Electronic Services)

Installation of all structured cabling, network points, server room setup, CCTV, access control, public address systems and other electronic infrastructure necessary for a fully connected, secure facility.

e) Signage, Acoustics and Wallpaper Works

Supply and installation of wayfinding, safety and branding signage; acoustic panels in designated areas; and all wallpaper applications as per interior design specifications.

f) Furniture, Fittings and Fixtures (FF&E) Works

Supply, delivery and installation of office furniture, built-in joinery, storage solutions and other fixtures in line with the approved layout and standards.

g) Blinds Installation Works

Supply and installation of window blinds throughout the facility as per specifications.

h) Relocation Services

Planning, coordination and execution of the move from MHSC's current premises to the new facility. Includes inventory management, packing, transport, and reinstallation of equipment, files and personal items with minimal operational disruption.

Each contractor will be expected to coordinate with the appointed construction project manager, adhere to quality standards, maintain health and safety compliance and participate in joint commissioning and handover processes.

3. CONTRACT PERIOD

The estimated duration of the contract is (6) months.

4. DETAILED SCOPE OF WORK/SPECIFICATION

The MHSC intends to appoint a professional service provider to execute health and safety services on behalf of the MHSC for its office building renovation project, that includes a construction Health and Safety Agent. The health and safety agent will be responsible to ensure that all the health and safety requirements are in place in order for the renovation to be legally compliant in terms of the OHS ACT 85 of 1993.

5. TERMS OF REFERENCE

5.1 TENDER DOCUMENTATION AND PROCUREMENT

- Undertake a health and safety baseline risk assessment and develop a health and safety risk profile.
- Monitor the integration of the OHS aspects during the design process and finalise baseline risk assessment.
- Attend design and consultant meetings.
- Assist with the preparation of contract documentation for signature.
- Prepare construction project health and safety documentation for submission to authorities.

5.2 CONSTRUCTION DOCUMENTATION AND MANAGEMENT

- Assess, discuss, negotiate and approve the contractor(s) construction project health and safety plans.
- 5.1 Submit necessary construction health and safety documentation to authorities and facilitate permits that may be required to commence the construction work.
- Do inductions of the Principal Contractors site team.
- Check competency certificates of appointed persons.

- Distribute Mandatory Agreements and Appointment of contractors.
- Attend site handover meetings and lead construction project health and safety mobilisation and access plans.
- Ensure that health and safety communication structures and systems are established and maintained, including distribution of health and safety specific documents and site safety inductions to contractors.
- Attend regular site, technical and progress meetings.
- Monitor design risk management.
- Prepare revised construction project health and safety risk profile, specifications and cost estimates/budgets where there is scope of work changes.
- Monitor the implementation, review and update of the construction project health and safety plans in accordance with the construction project health and safety specification and further scope of work changes.
- Audit compliance with the construction project health and safety plans and brief the project management team and contractor(s) following site audits.
- Ensure the identification of the hazards and risks relevant to the construction project through regular coordinated site inspections.
- Recommend stop work orders where necessary.
- Ensure that project specific emergency response and preparedness plans are compiled and tested.
- Conduct construction health and safety management system audits.
- Use of trends analysis to identify system deficiencies and incident trends, outline relevant improvements.
- Facilitate construction health and safety system and plans reviews and ensure changes are incorporated for continual improvement.
- Development of technical reports in relation to health and safety issues and communicate through presentations to diverse groups of decision makers.
- Perform incident and accident investigations where necessary.
- Monitor the compilation of the construction project health and safety file(s) by the contractor(s).
- Prepare and maintain the consolidated health and safety file.
- Prepare the structure commissioning health and safety plans.

5.3 PROJECT CLOSE OUT

- Review, discuss and approve the health and safety file with the contractor(s) and manage the construction project health and safety during the defect's liability period.
- Cancel all construction project health and safety legal appointments.
- Prepare the health and safety operations and maintenance report.
- Prepare the consolidated construction project health and safety close-out report.

Specific goals

Bid price proposals are compared on an equal and fair basis, considering all aspects of the bid pricing requirements. Qualifying bids are ranked on price and specific goals points claimed in the following manner:

 - Bidders may not make any alterations or additions to the content of this bid document, except to comply with the instructions issued by the MHSC.
 - There shall be no discussions with any enterprise until evaluation of the proposal has been complete.
 - RFQ's received after closing time and date will be classified as LATE and will not be considered.
 - MHSC reserves the right to cancel this RFQ due to the following reasons:
 - a) Due to changed circumstances, there is no longer a need for the services specified in this RFQ.
 - b) Funds are no longer available to cover the total envisaged expenditure for the project.
 - c) No RFQ meets the required specifications.
 - d) There is a material irregularity in the RFQ process.
 - e) Bidder fails to deliver in accordance with the requirements of the RFQ. The MHSC reserves the right to terminate the contract/PO during the first week after work has commenced should the appointed service provider have misrepresented themselves and/or their product and will not be able to fulfil the requirements as contained in the contract.
 - f) Payment will be made in accordance with section 38(1)(f) and 76(4)(b) of the PFMA and Treasury Regulations 15.10.1. and 8.2.3 (within 30 days from receipt of invoice after completion of deliverables).

DUE DILIGENCE

The MHSC reserves the right to conduct supplier due diligence prior to final award or at any time during the contract period. This may include site visits, reference checks and requests for additional information. The MHSC may where applicable request samples from the bidder/s to confirm capability.



RFQ AWARD

Awarding of RFQ's will not be published on the National Treasury e-tender portal or MHSC' website. No regret letters will be sent out. An RFQ is considered awarded when an official purchase order as signed by the delegated authority of the MSC is issued to the service provider. Goods may be delivered, or services may be rendered only with an official purchase order as signed and issued by the MHSC.

REASONS FOR DISQUALIFICATION

MHSC reserves the right to disqualify any bidders who do not comply with one or more of the following RFQ requirements and may take place without prior notice to the bidder:
