



The SAFA Football School of Excellence (SOE) has a legacy of supporting and nurturing young football talent in South Africa. The School of Excellence is situated in Elandsfontein in Germiston, Gauteng. It was established in 1994 and officially opened by Dr. Moolman, the then Managing Director of Transnet SOC Ltd. The SAFA Football School of Excellence is registered as a private School with the Gauteng Department of Education under the Kempton Park district. The School of Excellence offers specialist football and education training for boys aged between 12-19 years old who are exceptionally talented in football; it identifies talented young football players from rural and underprivileged communities and prepares them for a professional career in football alongside ensuring they are educated up to matric.

The development of the school is based on studies that have shown the <u>constructive role that sport can and does play in the lives of young people</u>. Furthermore, focusing the youth on sport has a positive impact on family and community stability; with an additional benefit of strengthening the economic future of young people through professional sport. Each year, 120 high school boys from across South Africa attend the school where they receive a holistic education that focuses on academic skills, life skills, and football development.

The school currently employs 30 people; ten (10) educators, six (6) coaches, ten (10) support staff, (2) two housefathers, one (1) administrator and a principal. Care and concern are given to ensure the emotional stability and self-confidence of the boys, regarded as essential parts for their future wellbeing. Boys have the opportunity for involvement in other sporting activities at the discretion of the principal and staff. A library and common room (for games and with access to television) is available onsite. The football coaches are trained by local and international standards with continued professional development provided.



Since inception, **over 540 learners/players have benefited** from the school, many former students have been signed by Premier Soccer League (PSL) clubs, National First Division (NFD), overseas Clubs, and have represented Bafana Bafana. Trials are conducted annually at different South African Football Association (SAFA) regions and provinces. Outstanding pupils are identified and recruited to the school. While outstanding potential as a footballer is an essential prerequisite for entry to the school, the football school also needs to be satisfied that each boy is of good character, is willing to work and is prepared to support the aims and the corporate identity of the sport school.

- Club roadshows to introduce the School to clubs as a viable channel for talent



- The partner should be able to develop players technically, tactically, physically, and mentally.
- Proven track record of success rate is required additional focus will be on the development of youth in sports overall, including partnerships that have been built towards that effort.

Mission Alignment | Commitment to Education and Vocational Training — we understand that no tall the students in the school will necessarily become professional players, a structure to ensure their economic participation outside of playing soccer is vital.

- Proven track record in youth development, education, and vocational training (or partnerships towards vocational training).
- Willing and capable of integrating academic support into the program, ensuring that students keep up with their studies.
- Partners with experience in vocational training or career development programs are an added benefit
- A vital focus is on helping students explore career paths, develop skills beyond soccer, and prepare for future employment opportunities within the sports sector and others that may be of interest to them.

+ Resources for Academic Support

- The provision of resources such as tutors, study materials, or access to educational programs that support the academic needs of student-athletes.
- Ability to work closely with the Department of Basic Education will be important in helping to drive the education success of the students forward
 - A track record of working with provincial or national government (sports or other programmes) structures will be helpful for a partner to have.
- As much as sports build discipline, we also want to ensure the partner is able to provide a holistic approach to the development of the students participating in the programmes.
- We are seeking partners who emphasise character building, leadership skills, and personal development alongside athletic and academic achievements.

Capacity and Track Record | Community Engagement — communities and stakeholders with a common interest in the schools are important to engage and sustainably manage to ensure improved community support for the school and the programmes.

- Parents and caregivers of the students are an important stakeholder and require the attention of the partners to ensure strong relationship building.
- Partners who are actively engaged in the community can help broaden the program's impact and provide additional support networks for students.
- A track record of development within communities is required.
- Programmes focused on the school should also look to support the students themselves to participate actively in their communities through initiatives to give back. This is a part of creating a more holistic student.
