5. THE BIDDING SELECTION PROCESS

Stage 1 - Compliance to submission requirements

Bidders warrant that their proposal document has, as a minimum; the specified documents required for evaluating their proposals as set out in the Returnable Document List and conform to all the terms, conditions, and specifications as set out in this document.

Stage 2 - Evaluation of Bids against Technical Specifications

Bidders achieving the minimum threshold in the specification to enter the Price/Preference scoring stage:

Stage 2A - Evaluation of Bids against Specifications including Quality

The NRF evaluates each bidder's written response to the specifications issued in accordance with published evaluation criteria set as in Section D.

Stage 2B – Due Diligence Interviews or Proof of Delivery/Concept against Specifications

Where circumstances justify it, the NRF conducts interviews with shortlisted bidders for them to present further information or provide further proof to the evaluation committee. In these cases, the National Research Foundation provides the areas of concern to the shortlisted bidders to address in their presentations with this document and, where necessary, may provide further areas of concern to the shortlisted bidders at this stage.

Stage 2C - Due Diligence Research

The National Research Foundation confirms the recommended bidder(s)'s reference letters with referees to confirm the recommendation(s).

Stage 3 - Price/Preference Evaluation

Basis of fair competition:

The NRF compares each bidder's pricing proposal on an equal and fair comparison basis equitable to all bidders, taking into account all aspects of the bid's pricing requirements including the application of fair pricing tests as set out below in the section "Insufficiency of Funds".

Ranking of the bidders pricing:

The NRF ranks the qualifying bids on price with lowest priced Bid receiving the maximum points (either 80 or 90) and the remainder ranked in relation to the lowest priced bid. The NRF adds the bidders' claimed preference points as verified to the submitted preference claim form (SBD 6.1) to provide the final ranking for the award decision.

Stage 4 – Checking Tax Compliance

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TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR BIDDING (SBD 1B)

Stage 4A – Taxpayers Resident in South Africa

The NRF notifies the recommended bidder in writing where their tax compliance check reflects that they are non-compliant and provides the recommended bidder seven (7) working days to submit written proof from SARS of their tax compliance status or proof that they have made an arrangement with SARS to meet their outstanding tax obligations. Failure to deliver such written evidence of compliance results in the rejection of that recommended bid.

Stage 4B – Non-Resident Foreign Bidders

When foreign bidders are submitting a bid, they complete all sections of the SBD1, especially the tax questionnaire. The NRF submitted the Foreign Bidder's completed SBD1 to the South African Revenue Service to obtain from the South African Revenue Service the Confirmation of Tax Obligations letter. Where South Africa Revenue Services does not issue the letter, Stage 4A applies in clearing the reason for not receiving the letter.

Stage 5 - Award and Contract Signing

The NRF nominates the bidder with the highest combined score for the contract award subject to the bidder having supplied the relevant administrative documentation.

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The NRF, in ensuring that bidders conduct themselves in an honest manner will, as part of the bid evaluation processes where applicable, conduct or initiate the necessary enquiries/investigations to determine the accuracy of the representation made in the bid documents. The scope of work is to formally request the professional services of an Approved Inspection Authority (AIA), duly registered with the Department of Employment Labour, to undertake a Health Risk Assessment (HRA) and Occupational Hygiene Surveys. These required assessments and surveys, in terms of various Regulations within the Occupational Health and Safety Act, 1993 (Act 85 of 1993), include:

- Illumination Survey
- Noise Zoning and Monitoring Survey
- Chemical Monitoring Survey
- Ventilation Survey
- Facilities Hygiene Survey
- Ergonomics Assessment
- Indoor Air Quality Assessment
- Health Risk Assessment Review

INTRODUCTION TO THE NRF

The National Research Foundation Act, Act 23 of 1998, establishes the National Research Foundation ("NRF") as the juristic person that makes this bid invitation and will contract with the awarded bidder. The Public Finance Management Act classifies the organisation as a Schedule 3A Public Entity.

Introduction to the NRF's Business Unit and its Site Requesting this RFQ

The South African Environmental Observation Network (SAEON) functions as a long-term facility for environmental observation and research. SAEON maintains a distributed network comprising different sites across South Africa. One of these sites, the Elwandle Node, encompasses a research network that covers the major marine ecosystems and is located in **Gqeberha**, South Africa.

The Elwandle Node supports a diverse range of activities, centered on academic research and administrative functions. It handles administrative duties and general office work. The academic and research activities take place in housing offices, laboratories, and additional specialised research space in its extension, including a dedicated open-plan lab for postgraduate work. There is a workshop area for practical and logistical support, particularly for field trips. Furthermore, the Boat shed facilitates activities related to marine operations, primarily through vessel and fuel storage.

CONTEXT OF THIS PROCUREMENT

The SAEON seeks to appoint professional services of an Approved Inspection Authority, duly registered with the Department of Employment Labour, to undertake a Health Risk Assessment and Occupational Hygiene Surveys, in terms of various Regulations within the Occupational Health and Safety Act, 1993 (Act 85 of 1993).

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DESCRIPTION OF GOODS/DETAILED SPECIFICATION

The purpose of this procurement is to formally request the professional services of an Approved Inspection Authority, duly registered with the Department of Employment Labour, to undertake a Health Risk Assessment and Occupational Hygiene Surveys, in terms of various Regulations within the Occupational Health and Safety Act, 1993 (Act 85 of 1993).

- . These required assessments and surveys include the following:
 - Illumination Survey
 - Noise Zoning and Monitoring Survey
 - Chemical Monitoring Survey
 - Ventilation Survey
 - Facilities Hygiene Survey
 - Ergonomics Assessment
 - Indoor Air Quality Assessment
 - Health Risk Assessment Review

1. INITIAL ENGAGEMENT

1.1. Meet with client nominated representatives to understand operations, site size, and company-specific risks as and when required.

2. ILLUMINATION SURVEY

2.1. Measurement Standards: Average illuminance levels shall be measured in all occupied areas on site. All measurements must strictly adhere to the requirements specified in Table 4: Minimum maintained average illuminance values for interior workplaces of the Physical Agents Regulations (2024).

2.2. Time of Assessment:

- **2.2.1.** Day-time illuminance levels.
- **2.2.2.** Night-time illuminance measurements shall be performed in areas operational during night hours, where applicable.
- 2.2.3. Procedure: The illumination survey shall be executed in accordance with the recommended standards and/or methods prescribed in SANS 10114
 1: 2005, as referenced and included in the Physical Agents Regulations (2024).

3. NOISE MONITORING SURVEY

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- **3.1.** The active operational areas within the site will be subjected to a formal noise zoning survey, as mandated by the Noise Exposure Regulations (2024). The scope of work shall include:
 - **3.1.1. Area Noise Measurement:** Noise rating levels will be measured using an approved noise dosimeter. A statistically representative number of measurements shall be obtained over a sufficient period to accurately represent the area/source noise profile.
 - **3.1.2. Personal Noise Dosimetry:** Personal noise dosimetry will be performed on a minimum of two (2) selected, priority workers to quantify individual worker exposure to noise rating levels.
 - 3.1.3. Evaluation and Analysis: The service will encompass extensive observations and a comprehensive evaluation of prevailing conditions, specific noise sources, noise characteristics, existing controls (including personal protective equipment), and the identification of potential additional controls for noise reduction (if required).

3.1.4. Reporting and Documentation:

- 3.1.4.1. Information collected during the survey shall be incorporated into detailed noise zone drawings for each area. These drawings will clearly indicate specific noise sources, permanent worker positions (where applicable), relevant openings, measurement positions, the average noise rating level per area, and required demarcation.
- **3.1.4.2.** The noise zone drawings will be supplemented by a formal, detailed report containing discussions, comments, and recommendations. This report will provide a complete and comprehensive evaluation of each surveyed area.

4. HAZARDOUS CHEMICAL MONITORING SURVEY

- 4.1. The survey shall be carried out in terms of the Hazardous Chemical Agent (HCAs) regulations. The survey shall cover:
 - 4.1.1. Chemical Risk Assessment: Identify HCAs (reagents, solvents, waste), assess exposure scenarios (routine tasks, non-routine tasks, spills), evaluate existing controls (local ventilation performance, PPE, SOPs), and determine exposure routes and health effects.

- 4.1.2. **Personal Exposure Chemical Monitoring:** Conduct routine personal air sampling, focusing on high-risk tasks/employees. Simultaneously check local ventilation performance.
- 4.1.3. Comparing Chemical Monitoring Exposure Results to Legislation:
 Compare personal Time-Weighted Average (TWA) results against relevant local or international Occupational Exposure Limits to identify exceedances or approaching limits.
- 4.1.4. Making Recommendations: Provide specific, actionable recommendations based on the Hierarchy of Control to minimise exposure.

5. INDOOR AIR QUALITY (IAQ) & VENTILATION SURVEY

- 5.1. The assessment will evaluate the efficacy of office ventilation by measuring the following IAQ parameters within the occupied office areas on site, in compliance with the requirements of the Physical Agents Regulations (2024):
 - 5.1.1. Carbon monoxide (CO) gas concentrations.
 - 5.1.2. Carbon dioxide (CO2) gas concentrations.
 - 5.1.3. Relative Humidity.
 - 5.1.4. Dry Bulb Temperatures.
- 5.2. A calibrated, direct-reading IAQ Monitor must be used to measure the required parameters.
- 5.3. The results obtained shall be compared against the Table 3: Guideline levels for indoor air quality parameters stipulated in the Physical Agents Regulations (2024).

6. FACILITIES HYGIENE SURVEY

- **6.1.** Swab samples shall be collected from 10 selected surfaces within the kitchen and dining areas to assess the extent of contamination by potentially pathogenic micro-organisms. This assessment will inform comments regarding worker personal hygiene standards and the effectiveness of current cleaning regimens.
- **6.2.** The methodology shall include swab sampling will be performed in accordance with SANS 18593:2004 (Horizontal methods for sampling techniques from surfaces using swabs). The swabs will be submitted to a SANAS accredited microbiology laboratory for Total Microbial Activity and

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Escherichia coli analysis, using validated and standardised methodologies.

7. WHOLE BODY VIBRATION SURVEY

- 7.1. Whole-Body Vibration exposure measurements will be performed on tasks where there is exposure to vibration as an occupational stressor, i.e. forklift operators.
- **7.2.** The methodology shall include vibration exposure measurements that shall be performed according to **SANS 2631 (or** ISO 2631 series) for whole-body vibration.
- **7.3.** The assessment shall use a calibrated Vibration Monitor/Accelerometer.
- **7.4.** Reference will be made to South African exposure limits (Physical Agents Regulations, 2024) and/or any other relevant standards prescribed, i.e. the European Directive 2002/44/EC.

8. ERGONOMIC ASSESSMENT

- **8.1.** An assessment of the site's ergonomics risk shall be conducted within the administrative and operational areas, in compliance with the Ergonomics Regulations.
- **8.2.** The assessment shall employ a probability versus severity methodology for identifying ergonomic hazards and determining the associated risk, based on the likelihood of exposure and the potential severity of the resulting consequences.
- **8.3.** The scope of the assessment will encompass office-based activities (specifically, computer workstation use), repetitive tasks such as the operation of laboratory equipment, and manual handling duties performed within operational areas.
- 8.4. The assessment shall be performed using a combination of established Ergonomic Hazard and Risk Checklists/Scorecards (tools), such as the Ergonomic Risk Factor (ERF) Checklist adapted from Manitoba's Ergonomics Guideline and/or Ergonomics Guidelines derived from reputable standards.

9. HEALTH RISK ASSESSMENT (HRA)

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An Occupational Health Risk Assessment (HRA) will be completed using a systematic probability-versus-severity methodology to identify, evaluate, and prioritize Occupational Hygiene risks. The HRA must incorporate the following:

- 9.1. Occupation/Task-based Approach: Employees will be grouped into Similarly Exposed Groups (SEGs) (laboratory workers, drivers, forklift operators, field workers, personnel working at sea, and office workers) to facilitate control implementation.
- 9.2. Risk Assessment Methodology: Use a systematic probability-versus-severity-versus frequency approach to identify Occupational Hazards, assess hazard exposures, and determine risk across all related processes and employee activities.
- **9.3.** A comprehensive HRA shall be developed for the SEGs and determine:
 - 9.3.1. Worker exposure to various risk factors detected in the above surveys.
 - 9.3.2. Additionally, hazardous chemical risks associated with any pest control operations, worker exposure risk to heat/cold stress conditions, worker exposure to non-ionising radiation, and worker exposure risk to hazardous biological agents present in the working areas.
- 9.4. Risk assessment findings must rate risks by severity and priority.
- 9.5. Risk assessments shall identify potential differing physical agent exposure for men, women, young, and vulnerable employees where applicable.
- 9.6. Evaluate and comment on the suitability and adequacy of existing hazard exposure control measures.
- 9.7. Recommendations for controlling identified occupational hygiene risks shall typically cover:
 - 9.7.1. Medical Surveillance: Recommendation for a formal Medical Surveillance program, detailing the type and frequency of medical examinations (e.g., audiometry, lung function testing, biological monitoring) required where significant residual risks remain.
 - 9.7.2. Training: Recommendations for specific Occupational Health and Safety Training pertinent to the identified risks and control measures (e.g., safe work procedures, HCA handling, proper use and maintenance of PPE).
 - 9.7.3. Monitoring: Recommendation for further Occupational Hygiene Monitoring (e.g., personal or environmental sampling) to confirm the effectiveness of implemented controls or to better quantify an exposure risk.

10. LOCALITIES OF THE SITE

- **10.1.** The surveys will be conducted at the SAEON Elwandle Node. The assessments shall be carried out at all major buildings on site. These include:
 - 10.1.1. A-Block administrative section with one shared kitchen
 - 10.1.2. E-Block offices and laboratories
 - 10.1.3. E-Block extension laboratories
 - 10.1.4. E-block extension post graduate lab open plan lab with offices at the end of each bench
 - 10.1.5. H- block workshop area field trip preparation
 - 10.1.6. E and H block has one shared kitchen
 - 10.1.7. Boat shed vessel storage (this includes some fuel storage).

11. REPORTS

- **11.1.** Upon completion of the surveys/assessments, comprehensive reports shall be submitted, which must contain the following elements:
 - 11.1.1. Legal References
 - 11.1.2. Methodology used
 - **11.1.3.** References to statutory requirements and relevant Occupational Exposure Limits.
 - 11.1.4. Descriptions of exposure hazards.
 - 11.1.5. Tabulated results per individual and/or area.
 - 11.1.6. Description of employee tasks and exposure/source conditions.
 - 11.1.7. Evaluation of existing exposure control measures.
 - 11.1.8. Discussion and interpretation of results.
 - 11.1.9. Conclusions regarding risk.
 - 11.1.10. Recommendations for exposure control/improvements and management measures (including administrative, engineering, and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) controls, medical surveillance requirements, and training needs).
- 11.2. The reports shall be delivered (electronically) within 8 weeks from the completed date of the site visits.
- 11.3. The Approved Inspection Authority will be required to engage in discussions with the SAEON SHER Coordinator and SAEON Elwandle Node Management where clarification of the results is deemed necessary.

12. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS AND SERVICES

The following requirements are mandatory for this service:

- **12.1. Qualified Personnel:** All personnel must be an Approved Inspection Authority, with verifiable qualifications traceable to the Department of Employment and Labour and the Southern African Institute of Occupational Hygiene.
- **12.2. Experience and Portfolio of Work:** Submission of a Portfolio of Works demonstrating experience in similar Occupational Hygiene Surveys over the last five years. This portfolio must specify the value, duration, and scope of each contract.
- **12.3. Staff Qualifications and Registration:** Submission of Curriculum Vitae (CV) for all suitably qualified staff who will execute the works. The CV must confirm their qualifications, experience, relevant training, and professional registration.
