SECTION A: INTRODUCTION AND SCOPE OF WORK

1. Introduction

About ATNS

The Air Traffic and Navigation Services (ATNS) Company of South Africa provides air traffic management, communication, surveillance, navigation, and related services, including training. ATNS manages **6% of the world's airspace** and employs over **1,100 staff** to ensure **safe, efficient, and orderly** air traffic services across **21 aerodromes** in South Africa, including OR Tambo, Cape Town, and King Shaka International Airports. In the broader African region, ATNS supports aeronautical satellite communication (VSAT networks) across **33 states**, connecting the continent from **Cape to Cairo** and extending to the Middle East.

ATNS Vision:

To be the leading provider of air traffic management solutions and associated services across Africa and select international markets.

ATNS Mission:

To provide safe, expeditious, and efficient air traffic management solutions, while ensuring economic, social, and environmental sustainability.

ATNS values include:

ATNS Business Environment

ATNS is a **State-Owned Company (SOC)**, established in 1993 under the **ATNS Company Act (Act 45 of 1993)** to provide air traffic services aligned with **ICAO** standards and **South African Civil Aviation Regulations**. As a **commercialised air navigation service provider (ANSP)**, ATNS operates on a **“user-pays” principle**, relying on revenues and debt funding to cover operational and capital expenses.

Regulated Business Activities

ATNS regulated activities contribute 90% of its revenue. Key offerings include:

-  **Air navigation services:** Planning, operating, and maintaining airspace infrastructure such as communication, navigation, and surveillance (CNS) systems.
-  **Air traffic service charges:** Governed by the Economic Regulating Committee (RC), ATNS sets service tariffs and maintains service standards under a five-year permission structure.
-  **Training:** The ATNS Aviation Training Academy (ATA) provides internationally accredited air traffic services and technical training, earning recognition as IATA's Top Regional Training Partner in 2012 and 2013.

Non-Regulated Business Activities:

- ATNS non-regulated operations contribute **10% of revenue** and focus on **regional expansion** through a subsidiary, **ATNS International**. This platform enables ATNS to explore **joint ventures and partnerships**, enhancing market opportunities and regional influence.

2. Purpose of the bid

- 2.1. The purpose of this bid is to appoint a suitably qualified and experienced service provider to provide ATNS (Air Traffic and Navigation Services SOC Limited) with a Media Publications Database Subscription that offers digital access to national and international newspapers, magazines, and related media publications for a period of five (5) years.
- 2.2. ATNS requires institutional access to a comprehensive collection of national and international newspapers and magazines, supporting current-awareness, environmental scanning, executive briefings, market intelligence, training and research. The service must combine real-time access to current news with deep historical archives suitable for research and reference. Where commercially available, integrated broadcast and online news monitoring is desirable, although the primary deliverable remains the digital print collection.

Technical Requirements

2.3. Platform and Hosting

- 2.3.1. The service must be delivered through a cloud-hosted, web-based platform accessible over the public internet.
- 2.3.2. The platform must be available on a 24/7 basis with planned maintenance windows communicated to ATNS at least 72 hours in advance.
- 2.3.3. Hosting arrangements must comply with the Protection of Personal Information Act, 2013 (POPIA) and any cross-border data transfer requirements where personal information is involved.
- 2.3.4. The bidder must disclose the hosting jurisdiction(s), the underlying cloud provider(s), and the data residency arrangements applicable to ATNS data

2.4. Browser and Device Compatibility

- 2.4.1. The platform must be fully compatible with current and prior major versions of Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge, Mozilla Firefox and Apple Safari.
- 2.4.2. The platform must render correctly on desktop, laptop, tablet and mobile form factors, with a responsive interface or a dedicated mobile application.
- 2.4.3. Where a mobile application is offered, it must be available on Android and iOS through the official app stores.

2.5. Authentication and User Access

- 2.5.1. The platform must support institutional authentication through one or more of IP authentication, proxy access, Virtual Private Network access, and Single Sign-On using SAML 2.0 or OpenID Connect.
- 2.5.2. Where Single Sign-On is offered, integration with Microsoft Entra ID (Azure Active Directory) must be supported.
- 2.5.3. The platform must support remote access for authorised users working off the ATNS network.
- 2.5.4. The bidder must specify whether the subscription provides for unlimited simultaneous users or a clearly defined concurrent user model. Where a concurrent user model is offered, the maximum number of simultaneous sessions must be stated.
- 2.5.5. ATNS administrators must be able to add, suspend and remove users without supplier intervention.

2.6. Search, Discovery and Content Delivery

- 2.6.1. The platform must offer advanced search functionality, including keyword, phrase, Boolean, proximity, fielded and faceted search.
- 2.6.2. Users must be able to filter results by date, publication, source, jurisdiction, subject and any other dimensions relevant to the category.
- 2.6.3. Search alerts and saved searches must be available to authenticated users.
- 2.6.4. Content must be downloadable, printable and citeable in standard formats, including PDF and HTML, where copyright permits.
- 2.6.5. Citation export must be supported in formats including Harvard, APA, Chicago, IEEE, Vancouver and OSCOLA, and to reference management tools including Zotero, Mendeley and EndNote

2.7. Integration and Interoperability

- 2.7.1. The platform must expose institutional-level usage statistics in COUNTER-compliant format where applicable, or in an equivalent industry-standard format suitable for collection assessment.
- 2.7.2. The platform should support integration with discovery layers, library management systems and learning management systems through OpenURL, Z39.50, SUSHI or equivalent protocols where relevant to the category.
- 2.7.3. The bidder must disclose any application programming interfaces available to ATNS for the integration of search, alerts and metadata into internal portals, intranet pages and SharePoint sites.

2.8. Usage Statistics, Analytics and Reporting

- 2.8.1. The platform must provide ATNS administrators with access to usage statistics covering at minimum the number of sessions, searches, full-text downloads, and unique users.
- 2.8.2. Reports must be available on a self-service basis through an administrator dashboard, with the ability to export to common formats including Microsoft Excel and PDF.
- 2.8.3. The bidder must commit to providing a quarterly usage report to ATNS, with commentary on trends, anomalies and recommended actions

2.9. Training, Onboarding and User Support Materials

- 2.9.1. The bidder must provide an onboarding programme for ATNS Library staff covering platform administration, user management, troubleshooting, and reporting.
- 2.9.2. The bidder must provide user training for end users at no additional cost, including initial training at contract commencement, refresher training annually, and on-demand training on request.
- 2.9.3. Training may be delivered through any combination of in-person sessions, live webinars, recorded sessions and self-paced modules.
- 2.9.4. User support materials, including platform guides, video tutorials and frequently asked questions, must be made available in English.

2.10. Technical Support and Service Levels

- 2.10.1. The bidder must provide 24/7 online technical support through a recognised support channel, or clearly defined business-hours support with documented escalation paths.
- 2.10.2. A named local support partner or dedicated account manager must be assigned to ATNS.
- 2.10.3. Critical incidents must be acknowledged within one hour and resolved or mitigated within 24 hours, with progress communicated to ATNS at agreed intervals.
- 2.10.4. The bidder must commit to a minimum platform uptime of 99.5 percent measured on a calendar-month basis, excluding pre-notified maintenance windows.

2.11. Content Updates and Currency

- 2.11.1. The platform must reflect updates to underlying content within the timeframes defined for this category of Media Publications
- 2.11.2. The bidder must notify ATNS of any planned changes to content scope, publisher arrangements or platform features that materially affect the service.

2.12. Data Protection, Information Security and POPIA

- 2.12.1. The bidder must comply with POPIA, the General Data Protection Regulation where applicable, and ATNS information security standards.
- 2.12.2. The bidder must maintain an information security management system aligned to ISO/IEC 27001 or an equivalent recognised standard, and must provide evidence of certification or independent assurance.
- 2.12.3. The bidder must notify ATNS within 24 hours of becoming aware of any data breach, security incident or unauthorised access affecting ATNS data or users.
- 2.12.4. Personal information of ATNS users must be processed only for the purposes of providing the service and must not be disclosed to third parties without ATNS written consent.

2.13. Copyright, Licensing and Intellectual Property

- 2.13.1. The bidder warrants that it holds all necessary rights, licences and authorisations to provide the contracted content to ATNS for institutional use.
- 2.13.2. Licence terms must permit institutional multi-user access, fair-dealing copying for research and private study and downloading within reasonable limits.
- 2.13.3. ATNS shall retain all intellectual property in its own data, queries, search histories, custom collections and annotations created within the platform.

2.14. Content Coverage –

The subscription must provide full-text digital access to the publication families listed below. Bidders must disclose the title-level inclusion against each family, including any embargo periods, where applicable.

2.14.1. South African Newspaper – Translation function

- a. Daily newspapers, including major English-language titles across the national and regional press, and the most widely circulating titles in other official languages where commercially available.
- b. Weekly newspapers, including national weekend titles and significant regional weeklies.
- c. Sunday newspapers, including major investigative and business-focused titles.

- d. Business and financial press, including dedicated daily and weekly titles covering markets, corporate news, public finance and economic policy.

2.14.2. African Continental Newspapers

- a. Major daily and weekly titles across SADC member states, with particular reference to titles covering aviation, transport, infrastructure and economic policy.
- b. Continental titles covering African Union processes, AFCAC engagements, and continental economic and trade matters.

2.14.3. International Newspapers

- a. Major English-language titles in Europe, covering the United Kingdom and continental Europe.
- b. Major English-language titles in North America, covering the United States and Canada.
- c. Major English-language titles in the Middle East and Asia, with particular reference to aviation, trade and emerging-market coverage.
- d. Selected non-English-language titles in translation, where commercially available

2.14.4. Aviation, Aerospace and Air Traffic Management Magazines

- a. Trade publications covering air traffic management, including titles produced by industry associations, equipment manufacturers and sectoral analysts.
- b. Aerospace and aviation industry magazines, including coverage of airlines, airports, manufacturers and regulators.
- c. Air navigation service provider focused publications and bulletins, where commercially available.
- d. WHO Media publications produced by the World Health Organisation
- e. ICAO Media publications produced by international civil aviation bodies.

2.14.5. Business, Finance and Sectoral Magazines

- a. Business management and strategy titles, with particular emphasis on those covering aviation, transport, infrastructure, energy , state-owned companies and international accounting and finance.
- b. Finance and economics titles, including coverage of public finance, audit, capital markets and economic policy relevant to a regulated state-owned company.
- c. Public administration and governance titles, including those covering Public Finance Management Act jurisprudence, Treasury reform and parliamentary processes

2.14.6. General- Interest Science and Innovation Magazines

- a. Science, technology and innovation titles relevant to engineering, digital transformation and emerging technology in aviation.
- b. Leadership, human capital and organisational development titles supporting executive development and HR practice.
- c. Selected lifestyle and general-interest titles supporting employee wellness initiatives and library reading collections.

2.14.7. Functional Requirements

- a. Full-text access to current editions of included titles, available on the day of publication or as soon as the publisher releases the digital edition.
- b. Searchable historical archives for each included title, with a minimum coverage of ten years where commercially available, and longer coverage for titles of strategic interest.
- c. Real-time or near-real-time breaking news feeds and topic-based news alerts.
- d. Custom alerts on keywords, organisations, persons, regions or industries, delivered to user email addresses or accessible through the platform.
- e. Curated newsletters or briefings on aviation, transport and regulatory topics, where offered by the bidder.
- f. Article-level downloading, printing and sharing within institutional licence terms.
- g. Clipping, annotation, tagging and folder management to support custom collections.
- h. Image and graphics rendering at sufficient resolution to support readable downloads and reuse within institutional licence terms.
- i. E-paper or replica-edition view for at least the most widely consulted daily and weekly titles, where commercially available.
- j. Topic-modelled news feeds covering aviation safety, transport policy, infrastructure investment, state-owned company governance, and labour relations.
- k. Translation Option

2.14.8. Update Frequency

- a. Newspaper and magazine content must be updated to reflect new editions on the day of publication, or as soon as the publisher releases the digital edition.

News-feed and breaking-news content must be updated continuously throughout the day.

- b. The bidder must disclose any embargo periods that apply to specific titles or publishers, and any title-level delays in archive.

2.14.9. Indicative User Profile

- a. Anticipated primary users include all ATNS employees. Anticipated peak usage occurs during business hours on weekdays, with sustained usage by Corporate Affairs and Communication as well as Customer Solutions across the working day, and elevated usage during sectoral events, parliamentary cycles, and operational incidents.

2.14.10. Title - Level Disclosure

- a. The bidder must submit, as an annexure to its proposal, a complete title-level schedule for all titles included in the subscription, disclosing for each title the publisher, the language, the archive depth in years, the update frequency, any embargo period and any restrictions on downloading or reuse.

2.14.11. Editorial Integrity and Source Authority

- a. All content delivered through the platform must be sourced directly from the originating publisher or from authorised aggregators. Editorial content must be presented in its published form, without summary substitution. Where the platform offers AI-generated summaries or thematic groupings, these must be clearly labelled as derivative and the link to the original article must be preserved.

3. Validity Period

- 3.1. Proposals must remain valid for **120 days** from submission.
- 3.2. Bidders may request an extension to this validity period in advance, providing reasons and justifications for the additional time required.
- 3.3. However, ATNS reserves the right to approve or decline such requests in the interest of maintaining the competitiveness, fairness, and transparency of the bidding process.
- 3.4. Bidders will be notified in writing regarding any matters related to extensions, if and/or when necessary.

40. GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT

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1. Definitions

The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:

- 1.1. **“Closing time”** means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
- 1.2. **“Contract”** means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
- 1.3. **“Contract price”** means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
- 1.4. **“Corrupt practice”** means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
- 1.5. **“Countervailing duties”** are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
- 1.6. **“Country of origin”** means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
- 1.7. **“Day”** means calendar day.
- 1.8. **“Delivery”** means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
- 1.9. **“Delivery ex stock”** means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.

- 1.10. **“Delivery into consignees store or to his site”** means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
- 1.11. **“Dumping”** occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.
- 1.12. **”Force majeure”** means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier’s fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13. **“Fraudulent practice”** means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14. **“GCC”** means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15. **“Goods”** means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16. **“Imported content”** means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17. **“Local content”** means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18. **“Manufacture”** means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.

- 1.24. **“Services”** means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.
- 1.25. **“Written”** or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

- 2.1. These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2. Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.
- 2.3. Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

3. General

- 3.1. Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.

4. Standards

- 4.1. The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.

- 5.1. The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample,

or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.

- 5.2. The supplier shall not, without the purchaser's prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause except for purposes of performing the contract.
- 5.3. Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier's performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.
- 5.4. The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

6. **Patent rights**

- 6.1. The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

7. **Performance**

- 7.1. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, security the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.
- 7.2. The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.
- 7.3. The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
 - (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
 - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4. The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's

performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

- 8.1. All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2. If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3. If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4. If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5. Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6. Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7. Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.
- 8.8. The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1. The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2. The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

- 10.1. Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2. Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

12. Transportation

- 12.1. Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

13. Incidental services

- 13.1. The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
 - (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;

- (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
 - (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.
- 13.2. Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

14. **Spare parts**

- 14.1. As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:
- (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
 - (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

15. **Warranty**

- 15.1. The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.
- 15.2. This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final

destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

- 15.3. The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.
- 15.4. Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.
- 15.5. If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. **Payment**

- 16.1. The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
- 16.2. The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
- 16.3. Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
- 16.4. Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.

17. **Prices**

- 17.1. Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

18. **Contract amendments**

- 18.1. No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.

19. **Assignment**

- 19.1. The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

20. **Subcontracts**

- 20.1. The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

21. **Delays in the supplier's performance**

- 21.1. Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2. If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3. No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4. The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.
- 21.5. Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6. Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without canceling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

- 22.1. Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

- 23.1. The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:
- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
 - (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
 - (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.
- 23.2. In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.
- 23.3. Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.
- 23.4. If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.
- 23.5. Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-

mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6. If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

- (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
- (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
- (iii) the period of restriction; and
- (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7. If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

24. **Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights**

24.1. When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or antidumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a **provisional** payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which may be due to him

25. Force Majeure

- 25.1. Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.
- 25.2. If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

26. Termination for insolvency

- 26.1. The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of Disputes

- 27.1. If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2. If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3. Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4. Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5. Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of liability

28.1. Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;

(a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and

(b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.

29. **Governing language**

29.1. The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.

30. **Applicable law**

30.1. The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

31. **Notices**

31.1. Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice

31.2. The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.

32. **Taxes and duties**

32.1. A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.

32.2. A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.

32.3. No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance

certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.

33. National Industrial Participation (NIP) Programme

33.1. The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.

34. Prohibition of Restrictive practices

34.1. In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).

34.2. If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.

34.3. If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.
