2. TERMS OF REFERENCE

2.1. INTRODUCTION

2.1.1 The Railway Safety Regulator (RSR) is a schedule 3A public entity established in terms of section 4 of the National Railway Safety Regulator Act, Act 16 of 2002 (“the Act”) as amended, to establish a national framework for South Africa and to monitor and enforce safety compliance in the rail sector.

2.1.2 The primary legislative mandate of the RSR is to oversee and enforce safety performance by all railway operators in South Africa including those of the neighboring states whose rail operations enter South Africa. Notwithstanding the foregoing, operators are, in terms of the Act, primarily responsible and accountable for ensuring the safety of their railway operations.

2.2. BACKGROUND

2.2.1 The RSR has been currently leasing in Durban, Kwa Zulu Natal for the past 4 years and the lease agreement is ending in November 2024. The Offices provide the RSR with the opportunity to have a footprint next to their stakeholders, particularly the railway industry.

2.2.2 The location of the building affords the RSR opportunity to be able to have easy access to both stakeholders, amenities and transport services such as the airport facility.

2.3. PURPOSE

- 2.3.1 The purpose of this Terms of Reference (TOR) is to appoint a service provider who has the capacity to provide office space in Umhlanga or within 10-kilometre (KM) radius from Umhlanga, Kwa Zulu Natal for occupation from 01 May 2025.
- 2.3.2 Multiple bidders are NOT allowed to submit a bid for the same office space and failure to adhere to this requirement will lead to an automatic disqualification.
- 2.3.3 The Railway Safety Regulator (RSR) is looking to sign a lease agreement/s, which include(s) inter alia office accommodation, office fit out, network cables and LAN points and electrical points (normal and safe plugs).

2.4. SCOPE OF WORK

- 2.4.1 The appointed service provider shall be required to provide the following:
- 2.4.1.1 Office Space (existing building) in a Grade A building as a minimum
- 2.4.1.2 Office space which has been installed with office fit-out (Installations) with electrical points (both normal and safe plugs) and network points that support voice-over Internet Protocol (only category 6 network LAN points will be accepted) as per the office layout requirements suitable for the RSR.
- 2.4.1.3 The successful service provider must be prepared to execute the fit-out of the premises as per designs and specifications prepared by its professional team as instructed by the RSR. It must be noted that the RSR will only contribute financially to RSR specific fit-out requirements of the premises and not towards clearing and preparing the premises prior to fit-out.
- 2.4.1.4 Office space in Umhlanga or within 10 KMs from Umhlanga, KwaZulu Natal for 60 Months.
- 2.4.1.5 The service provider must be prepared to afford the RSR with beneficial occupation during fit- out until the date of full occupation by the RSR. This beneficial occupation is prior and not included to the 60 months rental period.

2.4.1.6 Office Installation (fit- out)

- 2.4.1.6.1 Each bidder must ascertain that their proposal addresses the minimum mandatory fit-out requirements as indicated below:
- 2.4.1.6.2 Approximately 450 square metres (M²) office space in Umhlanga or 10 KMs radius from Umhlanga, KwaZulu Natal.
- 2.4.1.6.3 Four (4) enclosed offices (dry wall) with network LAN points and electrical red plugs (safe plugs).
- 2.4.1.6.4 Reception area with network LAN point and red plugs (safe plugs).
- 2.4.1.6.5 Internal divisions and internal wall finishes (doors, painting etc)
- 2.4.1.6.6 Flooring (carpets, tiles etc).
- 2.4.1.6.7 Data Centre (Air conditioned).
- 2.4.1.6.8 Installation of access control system and cameras.
- 2.4.1.6.9 Two (2) Storerooms with electrical points.
- 2.4.1.6.10 Kitchen (plumbing, double sink and kitchen cupboards and counter and space for a sitting canteen for 4 x 4-seater tables.
- 2.4.1.6.11 Four-way open plan seater electrical plugs and network points to accommodate 16 individuals.
- 2.4.1.6.12 One (1) x 20-seater boardroom with power skirtings and network LAN points.
- 2.4.1.6.13 One (1) x 4-seater consultation room with power skirtings and network LAN points.
- 2.4.1.6.14 Two Electrical red plugs (safe plugs) in the boardroom ceiling to power projector screen, projector and TV.
- 2.4.1.6.15 Motion and occupancy light sensors.
- 2.4.1.6.16 Vertical movements (ramp, lifts and stairs).
- 2.4.1.6.17 Lifts must be disability friendly.
- 2.4.1.6.18 Fire detectors.
- 2.4.1.6.19 Air conditioners/HVAC.
- 2.4.1.6.20 Ceilings
- 2.4.1.6.21 Thirty (30) parking bays inclusive of visitors parking

2.4.2 The RSR Space Utilisation & Standard Norms are 5 – 10sqm /staff. See below for the more detail:

2.4.2.1 Workstation- 10sq.m /staff member

2.4.2.2 Common areas- 10sq.m / staff member (Ablution facilities, foyers, meeting rooms, storage, pause areas)

2.5. FUNCTIONAL REQUIREMENTS

2.5.1 The appointed service provider is expected to have the above-mentioned office(s) **AVAILABLE FOR FULL ACCOMMODATION AND READY FOR BUSINESS OPERATIONS ON 01 MAY 2025**. The RSR reserves the right to change the date of occupation at any time without notice or publicly giving reason(s).

2.5.3 PROPERTY AND EMPLOYEE REQUIREMENTS

- 2.5.3.1 The property must be in compliance with the Occupational Health and Safety Act (OHSA), building regulations and relevant regulations.
- 2.5.3.2 The property should have a smoker's area in accordance with relevant legislation.
- 2.5.3.3 The entrances/exit points, reception counter(s), lifts, fire escapes, parking, ablution facilities and the general office layout and fittings should be disabled-friendly.
- 2.5.3.4 The Landlord must provide the **RAILWAY SAFETY REGULATOR** signage (as per the RSR's specifications, colors and material) on the outside and directional signage on the side of the premises/building, available on request before ending of clarification period.
- 2.5.3.5 Ablution facilities, including disability facilities, sufficient facilities to be provided in accordance with relevant legislation.
- 2.5.3.6 The property should have a clearly demarcated emergency assembly point.

2.5.4 MAINTENANCE

- 2.5.4.1 Over and above the building being at a minimum Grade A building, it is expected that during the lease tenure, the appointed service provider will maintain the exterior façade of the building and keep it in a good and usable condition.
- 2.5.4.2 The building must include air conditioning that is fully operational and effective. (Air conditioning units must be maintained by the service provider in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications and maintenance manual).
- 2.5.4.3 The service provider must be willing to accept changes to dry walling within the building if necessary.
- 2.5.4.4 The property must be equipped with a generator that can supply at least lighting.
- 2.5.4.5 An electrical compliance certificate for the building must be handed to the RAILWAY SAFETY REGULATOR prior to moving in.
- 2.5.4.6 An occupation certificate for the building must be handed to the RAILWAY SAFETY REGULATOR prior to moving in.

2.5.5 FIRE SAFETY

- 2.5.5.1 The following measures should be made available on the proposed premises and meet all fire regulatory requirements:
- 2.5.5.2 The building shall be equipped with fire detection, fire suppression system and an evacuation plan.
- 2.5.5.3 Efficient and easy evacuation in the case of fire must be possible with fitted signage and floor plan.
- 2.5.5.4 The property must have fire extinguishers in accordance with the relevant legislation.

2.5.6 SECURITY AND ACCESS CONTROL

- 2.5.6.1 The following security and access control measures should be made available on the proposed premises:
 - 2.5.6.1.1 A floor plan of the building is required.
 - 2.5.6.1.2 Provision must be made for an access control system.

- 2.5.6.1.3 The service provider will appoint, contract, manage and performance-appraise the Security Service Provider that guard the complex/building. This cost should be incorporated in the operational costs.

2.5.7 CLEANING SERVICES

- 2.5.7.1 The proposal must include (daily) cleaning services for common areas as part of the operational costs. The cleaning will include windows and common areas, with all cleaning detergents; cleaning materials, sanitary bins, air fresheners, hand soap, toilet rolls and hand dryers or paper towels to accommodate employees and visitors.
- 2.5.7.2 The lessor must maintain the yard, parking bays or garden around the office building and the building envelope.

2.5.8 SHOP FITTING

- 2.5.8.1 The RSR requires that the service provider appoint a full professional team to assist with the internal fit-out of the premises to ensure conformity to applicable South African statutory regulations, Acts and the RSR specific fit-out requirements. Should the building be deemed suitable during the design evaluation phase, the RSR will supply detailed shop fitting layouts to the landlord's professional team.

2.6. PROPOSAL SUBMISSION

- 2.6.1 The bidder must provide a detailed proposal as part of the tender, addressing and including at least the following:
- 2.6.1.1 Indicate the all-inclusive cost of rental (rental associated costs, parking, fit outs etc.) depicted on a monthly and yearly schedule of payment which includes annual escalations. All costs to be VAT inclusive.
- 2.6.1.2 Indicate pure rental which includes associated costs, parking etc. separate from the cost of installations.
- 2.6.1.3 Organisation profile.
- 2.6.1.4 A Joint Venture agreement signed by all parties in case of a Joint Venture / Consortium submission (if applicable).

- 2.6.1.5 Central Supplier database CSD Registration. Bidders (including each member of joint venture or consortium or partnership agreement) must submit proof of registration with the National Treasury's Central Supplier Database (CSD). Bidders must ensure that they are registered on the CSD before submitting the bid.
- 2.6.1.6 Valid B-BBEE certificate / B-BBEE sworn affidavit. A trust, consortium, or joint venture (including unincorporated consortia and joint ventures) must submit a consolidated B-BBEE Certificate, A valid B-BBEE certificate or sworn affidavit (the sworn affidavit must indicate the full date i.e., day, month, and year of the financial year period e.g., 31 March 2021).
- 2.6.1.7 Valid tax compliance status report with tax PIN.
- 2.6.1.8 Valid company registration documentation that are issued by Companies & Intellectual Property Commission (CIPC).
- 2.6.1.9 A Copy of the identity document of the company owner(s).
- 2.6.1.10 Valid Medical Certificate (Where applicable).
- 2.6.1.11 Valid South African Social Security Agency (SASSA) registration (Where applicable).
- 2.6.1.12 Valid National Council for Persons with Physical Disability in South Africa registration (NCPDPSA) (Where applicable).
- 2.6.1.13 Fully completed and duly signed Standard Bidding Documents (SBD) Forms documents supplied with these Terms of Reference.
- 2.6.1.14 Proven previous experience, including testimonials/references from previous successful completed projects, within the past 10 years. The reference letter should be on a client's official letterhead with valid contact details. ***RSR reserves the right to contact the references to confirm the validity of information of the letters provided.** No points shall be awarded for letters which the RSR cannot verify/validate.
- 2.6.1.15 A pricing proposal/schedule inclusive of all deliverables as per the required services. All estimated costs must be stipulated and itemised.
- 2.6.1.16 Only fixed prices will be accepted. (Any price escalations and costs incidental to the lease agreement must be specified in percentage and actual costs)
- 2.6.1.17 A pricing schedule should be submitted on a separate sheet from the technical proposal for ease of evaluation.

- 2.6.1.18 The RSR will not be bound by any costs not disclosed in the tender document.
- 2.6.1.19 All Prices must include VAT.
- 2.6.1.20 Tender document shall be submitted as one (01) original and one (01) scanned copy (PDF) of the original completed in a Flash Drive with all exhibits and forms required included in the proposal length.

2.7. TENDER BRIEFING SESSION AND FAQs

- 2.7.1 Interested bidders are required to attend the online compulsory briefing session and should send their e-mail addresses to tenders@rsr.org.za not later than the 20 November 2024, at 16:30. RSR will share the invitation on the 21 November 2024 for the briefing session to be held on 25 November 2024 at 11:00, via MS Teams.
- 2.7.2 Any enquiries relating to this bid should be sent to tenders@rsr.org.za no later than 04 December 2024, at 16H00. RSR will compile a list of the answers to the queries sent and share them with the interested bidders on the RSR website.

2.8. BID EVALUATION CRITERIA OF PROPOSALS

- 2.8.1 The proposals/BIDS will be evaluated on a five (05) phase approach consisting of:
 - 2.8.1.1 Phase 01: Submission of all administrative compliance documentation.** The evaluation of the administrative compliance requirements is indicated below. Failure to comply, may lead to disqualification.
 - 2.8.1.1.1 Fully completed and duly signed SBD forms
 - 2.8.1.1.2 A Joint Venture agreement signed by all parties in case of a Joint Venture / Consortium submission (if applicable).
 - 2.8.1.1.3 Central Supplier database (CSD) Registration. Bidders (including each member of joint venture or consortium or partnership agreement) must submit proof of registration with the National Treasury's Central Supplier Database (CSD). Bidders must ensure that they are registered on the CSD before submitting the bid.
 - 2.8.1.1.4 Valid tax compliant status report with PIN

2.8.1.2 Phase 02: Mandatory Requirements Evaluation. The evaluation of the mandatory requirements is indicated below. Failure to comply will lead to automatic disqualification

- 2.8.1.2.1 Confirmation letter from Architect indicating that the proposed building is a Grade A building or above as defined by SAPOA.
- 2.8.1.2.2 Proof of installation of alternative power supply/generator fitted in the proposed building.
- 2.8.1.2.3 Proof of valid insurance for the proposed building
- 2.8.1.2.4 Proof of Fibre Optic installation for the proposed building.
- 2.8.1.2.5 Business Zoning certificate from the relevant authority for the proposed building.
- 2.8.1.2.6 Mandate letter from the owner/landlord or proof of ownership.

2.8.1.3 Phase 03: Functionality Evaluation

The evaluation of the functional requirements as per Section 2.9 below. Bidders must attain a minimum of 70 points to be considered for the physical evaluation (Phase 04).

2.8.1.4 Phase 04 - Physical Evaluation of the proposed premises

The evaluation of the physical evaluation as per Section 2.10 below. Bidders must attain a minimum of 70 points to be considered for the Preference Point System evaluation (Phase 05).

2.8.1.5 Phase 05: Price and Specific Goals Evaluation

- 2.8.1.5.1 The price quotations will be evaluated in accordance with the pre-scripts of the Preferential Procurement Policy Framework Act (PPPFA) and its regulations, in particular Preference Procurement Regulation 2022 which stipulate 80/20 preference point system for acquisition of goods or services with Rand value equal to or below R50 million (inclusive of all applicable tax).
- 2.8.1.5.2 A maximum of 80 points for price and 20 points for the specific goal specified on the request for proposal may be awarded to a Service Provider.
- 2.8.1.5.3 For Points to be awarded for the specific goals the proof for the claim for such goal must be submitted.

2.9. FUNCTIONALITY CRITERIA EVALUATION- PHASE 03

2.9.1 Only bidders that score a minimum of 70 points of the total points at the functionality evaluation (Phase 03) will proceed to the physical evaluation (Phase 04).

2.11. PRICE AND SPECIFIC GOALS POINTS EVALUATION-PHASE-05

It is therefore against this background the RSR condemns any form of fronting.

For the purposes of this tender the tenderer will be allocated points based on the goals stated in table 1 below as may be supported by proof/ documentation stated in the conditions of this tender:
- 4.2. In cases where organs of state intend to use Regulation 3(2) of the Regulations, which states that, if it is unclear whether the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system applies, an organ of state must, in the tender documents, stipulate in the case of—
- (a) an invitation for tender for income-generating contracts, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the highest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system; or
 - (b) any other invitation for tender, that either the 80/20 or 90/10 preference point system will apply and that the lowest acceptable tender will be used to determine the applicable preference point system,

GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT

NOTES

The purpose of this document is to:

- (i) Draw special attention to certain general conditions applicable to government bids, contracts and orders; and
- (ii) To ensure that clients be familiar with regard to the rights and obligations of all parties involved in doing business with government.

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa and words in the masculine also mean in the feminine and neuter.

- The General Conditions of Contract will form part of all bid documents and may not be amended.
- Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to a specific bid, should be compiled separately for every bid (if applicable) and will supplement the General Conditions of Contract. Whenever there is a conflict, the provisions in the SCC shall prevail.

GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT

TABLE OF CLAUSES

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General Conditions of Contract

1. Definitions

1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
 - 1.1 “Closing time” means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
 - 1.2 “Contract” means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
 - 1.3 “Contract price” means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
 - 1.4 “Corrupt practice” means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of anything of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
 - 1.5 “Countervailing duties” are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
 - 1.6 “Country of origin” means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
 - 1.7 “Day” means calendar day.
 - 1.8 “Delivery” means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
 - 1.9 “Delivery ex stock” means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
 - 1.10 “Delivery into consignees store or to his site” means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
 - 1.11 “Dumping” occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.

- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.
- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 "Services" means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as

installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

1.25 “Written” or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.

2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.

2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

3. General

3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.

3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from www.treasury.gov.za

4. Standards

4.1 The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.

5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.

5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.

5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier’s performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.

5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.

6. Patent rights

6.1 The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

7. Performance Security

7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.

7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.

7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:

- (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
- (b) a cashier's or certified cheque

7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.

8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.

8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.

8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.

- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.
- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.
- 9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

- 10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.
- 10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

- 11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

- 12. Transportation** 12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.
- 13. Incidental Services** 13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:
- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
 - (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
 - (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
 - (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
 - (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.
- 13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.
- 14. Spare parts** 14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:
- (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
 - (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.
- 15. Warranty** 15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that

may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. Payment

16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.

16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfilment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.

16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.

16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.

17. Prices

17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

18. Contract amendments

18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.

19. Assignment

19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

20. Subcontracts

20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contracts if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in

the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

21. Delays in the supplier's performance

- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.
- 21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without cancelling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

- 22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:

- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
- (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
- (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.

23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

- (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
- (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
- (iii) the period of restriction; and
- (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

**24. Anti- dumping
and
countervailing
duties and
rights**

24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or anti-dumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which may be due to him

**25. Force
Majeure**

25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.

25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

**26. Termination
for insolvency**

26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right

of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement Disputes

- of** 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of Liability

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or wilful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
- (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and
 - (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.

29. Governing Language

- 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.

30. Applicable Law

- 30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

31. Notices

- 31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned

by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice

The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.

Taxes and Duties | <p>32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.</p> <p>32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.</p> <p>32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.</p> |
| 33. National Industrial Participation (NIP) Programme | <p>33.1 The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.</p> |
| 34. Prohibition of Restrictive Practices | <p>34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).</p> <p>34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.</p> <p>34.3 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), has / have been found guilty by the Competition Commission of the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may, in addition and without prejudice to any other remedy provided for, invalidate the bid(s) for such item(s) offered, and / or terminate the contract in whole or part, and / or restrict the bidder(s) or contractor(s) from conducting business with the public sector for a period not exceeding ten (10) years and / or claim damages from the bidder(s) or contractor(s) concerned.</p> |
