SA sprinters fail to make cut for 200m in Tokyo

Jobodwana, Muniyai and Shaun flopped

SA's poor showing in track and field at the Olympic Stadium in Tokyo continued, with Anaso Jobodwana, Shaun Maswanganyi, and Clarence Muniyai failing to make the 200m final yesterday.

Antonio Alkana also failed in his bid to make the 110m hurdles final when he finished in sixth place in a time of 13.55.

The search for the first medal continues for SA, with the last day of the Olympics on Sunday fast approaching.

Seasoned campaigner Jobodwana finished last in his semifinal race in 20.88. His eighth-place finish shows that he is a shadow of the athlete who secured a place on the podium with the greatest Olympian of all-time Usain Bolt at the World Championships in China in 2015.

Muniyai qualified for the semis with the fourth-fastest qualifying time, and he ended his race in sixth place in 20.49.

American-based sprinter Maswanganyi finished his semis in fourth place in a race won by Canadian superstar Andre De Grasse.

The 20-year-old former SA junior champion missed the two non-automatic qualifying places. He was the best performer in Team SA colours in the semis.

At the 2019 World Championships in Doha, Qatar, SA failed to win a medal, and so far, the performance on the track is not convincing.

Jobodwana, the 2015 World Championships bronze medalist, is nearing the end of his career. He is the oldest of the sprinters and the worst performer from yesterday's races. He looked lethargic in his race, and he admitted that he had no power in his batteries after the race.

The Eastern Cape-born sprinter qualified for the Olympics based on the World Athletics rankings.

"It was a tough day and I don't think that there is anything else to say about that," said Jobodwana.

"I am just glad to be here to compete at this level again. When you run against the

top athletes in the world, you learn a lot from each race. I have learned a lot by being here. I don't have excuses for my poor performance," he said.

Muniyai said: "It was my fourth race of the season after injury, and coming to the Olympics to make the semifinal, I am happy. I will take the semifinals achievement."

Excitement gets better of Mashele in 5,000m

Debutant botches heat by going out too fast

The excitement of running in his debut Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan, got the better of SA's prominent track long-distance runner Precious Mashele.

Mashele messed up his 5,000m race in heat two to miss the final.

The 30-year-old star surprised everyone when he led the pack after four laps and exhausted all his energy halfway through the 12-and-a-half-lap race. He ran out of gas to finish completely out of contention, in 15th position. Only the first five runners in the field of 20 earned automatic qualification to the final.

Mashele had qualified for the Olympics on deadline day in Durban on June 29. He came into the race with a strategy to attack from the onset, but it backfired.

Mohad Katir of Spain won the race, clocking 13:30.10, followed by Paul Che-liomo of the US in second place (13:30.15), while Justyn Knight of Canada finished third in 13:30.22. Jacob Kiplimo (13:30.40) and his Kenyan countryman Joshua Cheptegei (13:30.81) grabbed the fourth and fifth automatic qualifying places.

Mashele, from Kalksprit near Polokwane, admitted that what happened on the track was not what he had discussed with his coach Hendrick Ramaala.

He said he got it all wrong as he wanted his rivals to run a fast race, but ended up being exhausted too early in the race.

"It did not go the way I had planned it with my coach [Ramaala]. It was a learning curve for me, and I hope to take the lessons to the World Championships in the US next year. I learnt a lot in this race."

"It was [my] first time, and there was a lot of excitement in there. I did not position myself the way the coach told me to, and I ended doing my own thing... when they began to kick, I had nothing left."
