STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF RFQ

- A submission submitted in response to this RFQ will constitute a binding offer which will remain binding and irrevocable for a period of **thirty (30) days** from the date of submission to the MHSC. Bidders may not modify their initial pricing offer whilst the RFQ validity period is still in force. **(RFQ Validity Period: 30 days from date of closure)**
- No service will be rendered, or goods delivered before an official MHSC Purchase Order has been issued to the awarded bidder.
- It is the responsibility of the bidder to ensure that its response reaches MHSC on or before the closing date and time of the RFQ.
- Bidders may not make any alterations or additions to the content of this bid document, except to comply with the instructions issued by the MHSC.
- There shall be no discussions with any enterprise until evaluation of the proposal has been complete.
- RFQ's received after closing time and date will be classified as **LATE** and will not be considered.
- With regards to pricing, where a bidder submits both a quote and SBD 3, should the total bid prices differ, or calculation errors be identified, the one indicated on the SBD 3 pricing schedule shall be considered the correct price.
- MHSC reserves the right to cancel this RFQ due to the following reasons:
 - a) Due to changed circumstances, there is no longer a need for the services specified in this RFQ.
 - b) Funds are no longer available to cover the total envisaged expenditure for the project.
 - c) No RFQ meets the required specifications.
 - d) There is a material irregularity in the RFQ process.
 - e) Bidder fails to deliver in accordance with the requirements of the RFQ. TERMS OF REFERENCE/SCOPE OF WORK

1.1. OVERVIEW

The Mine Health and Safety Council is a national public entity (Schedule 3A) established in terms of the Mine Health and Safety Act, No 29 of 1996, as amended. The entity comprises a tripartite board represented by State, Employer, and Labour members under chairmanship of the Chief Inspector of Mines. The MHSC is funded by public revenue and is accountable to Parliament. The main task of the Council is to advise the Minister of Mineral Resources on occupational health and safety legislation and research outcomes focused on improving and promoting occupational health and safety in South African mines. The Council also oversees the activities of its committees; promotes a culture of health and safety in the mining industry; arranges a summit every two years to review the state of occupational health and safety at mines; and liaises with the Mining Qualifications Authority and any other statutory bodies about mining health and safety.

The MHSC invests significant resources in research and development, the development of legislation and guidelines, stakeholder engagement, and dissemination initiatives aimed at driving continuous improvements in MHS. Key initiatives conducting research on MHS, the development of MHS legislation and guidelines, and the Regional Tripartite Forums (RTFs), which provide platforms for stakeholder engagement, dissemination, collaboration and knowledge sharing.

While these initiatives have been implemented over many years, there is limited evidence on their effectiveness, industry uptake, value for money, and contribution to improving MHS performance within the SAMI. There is therefore a need for a consistent and practical approach to assess whether these interventions are being effectively implemented, achieving their intended outcomes and contributing to improvements in MHS.

The MHSC therefore intends to develop an Impact Evaluation Framework that can be applied across its research, legislative and stakeholder engagement (including RTFs) portfolio. The framework must enable the MHSC to evaluate the implementation, uptake, effectiveness and impact of its research, legislative and



stakeholder engagement interventions (including RTFs), in a consistent, practical and evidence-based manner.

As part of this project, the framework will be piloted using the Trackless Mobile Machinery (TMM) collision prevention regulatory requirements under Regulation 8.10. The pilot will be used to test the practicality and suitability of the framework, assess its ability to generate meaningful evidence on effectiveness and impact, and identify any refinements required before its broader application across the MHSC's research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio.

The scope of this project does not include the evaluation of the entire MHSC portfolio. The evaluation component of this assignment will be limited to the TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements selected for the pilot.

1.2. DESCRIPTION

The MHSC seeks to appoint a service provider to develop a practical Impact Evaluation Framework for assessing the effectiveness and impact of the MHSC's research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio, and to pilot the framework using the TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements under Regulation 8.10. The framework must be practical, evidence-based and suitable for future application across different types of MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement interventions, including the RTFs. However, for this assignment, the pilot evaluation will be limited to the TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements under Regulation 8.10. The pilot will be used to test and refine the framework before its broader application across the MHSC portfolio.

1.3. DETAILED SPECIFICATIONS/SCOPE OF WORK

The service provider will be required to undertake the following as part of the scope of work:

1.3.1. Development of an Impact Evaluation Framework

- Conduct a focused review of relevant MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement interventions to understand the nature and different types of interventions that the framework must



accommodate. The review must inform the design of the framework and does not constitute an evaluation of the entire MHSC portfolio.

- Review relevant monitoring, evaluation and impact assessment approaches applicable to research, legislative and stakeholder engagement interventions, including relevant good practices that can inform the MHSC framework.
- Develop a practical Impact Evaluation Framework that can be applied across the MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio, including RTFs. The framework must provide, where applicable, for the assessment of:
 - Relevance and intended objectives of the intervention.
 - Implementation and industry uptake.
 - Achievement of intended outputs and outcomes.
 - Effectiveness and impact.
 - Contribution to improvements in MHS.
 - Barriers and enabling factors affecting implementation and effectiveness.
 - Stakeholder experiences and perceptions.
 - Lessons learnt and opportunities for improvement.
- The framework must recognise the differences between research, legislative and stakeholder engagement interventions, including RTFs, and provide appropriate evaluation criteria, indicators and methods for each type of intervention.
- Develop practical indicators, minimum data requirements, data collection tools, assessment methods and reporting templates to support consistent application of the framework.
- Define appropriate approaches for establishing baselines and assessing changes over time, taking into consideration the availability and quality of historical data.
- Provide an appropriate approach for assessing the contribution of MHSC interventions to observed MHS outcomes, while recognising other factors that may influence such outcomes.
- Ensure that the framework is practical, evidence-based, repeatable and sufficiently flexible for future application by the MHSC across its research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio.



1.3.2. Piloting of the Framework in Alignment with Trackless Mobile Machinery (TMM) Collision Prevention Regulatory Requirements

- Apply the draft Impact Evaluation Framework to the TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements under Regulation 8.10.
- Review relevant regulatory, MHSC and industry documentation and available data relating to the development, implementation and outcomes of the TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements.
- Develop a practical and proportionate sampling approach, in consultation with the MHSC, for selecting applicable mines for the pilot. The sampling approach must take into consideration relevant factors such as mine type, commodity, TMM exposure, availability of data, geographic coverage, project timeframe and available budget.
- Assess the implementation of the applicable TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements across the selected pilot sample.
- Assess available quantitative and qualitative evidence on the effectiveness of the regulatory requirements and their contribution to reducing TMM collision risks and improving mine safety.
- Compare relevant available information before and after implementation of the regulatory requirements, where sufficient and comparable data are available.
- Engage a targeted sample of relevant stakeholders to obtain evidence on the implementation, effectiveness and practical impact of the regulatory requirements. Existing MHSC and industry stakeholder platforms should be utilised where practical to minimise duplication and cost.
- Identify key barriers, challenges and enabling factors affecting the implementation and effectiveness of the regulatory requirements.
- Identify data gaps, data quality limitations and other factors that may affect the assessment of effectiveness and impact.
- Assess the practicality and suitability of the draft Impact Evaluation Framework, including its indicators, data requirements, data collection tools, assessment methods and reporting approach.
- Document the findings and lessons from the pilot, including recommendations for improving both the framework and its future application.
- The pilot is intended to test and refine the Impact Evaluation Framework through a targeted application. It is not intended to constitute a comprehensive evaluation of the implementation of Regulation 8.10 across the entire South African Mining Industry.



1.3.3. Refine and finalise the Impact Evaluation Framework:

- Refine the Impact Evaluation Framework, indicators and supporting tools based on the findings and lessons from the TMM pilot.
- Ensure that the final framework is suitable for future application across the MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio, including RTFs.
- Develop practical guidance for the MHSC on how to select and apply appropriate evaluation criteria, indicators and methods depending on the type of intervention being evaluated.
- Develop a practical user guide setting out the steps for planning, conducting and reporting future impact evaluations using the framework.
- Define the minimum data requirements, roles and institutional arrangements required to support effective implementation and maintenance of the framework.
- Develop a practical roadmap for the future application and institutionalisation of the framework across the MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio.
- Present the final framework, TMM pilot findings and recommendations to the MHSC and conduct a knowledge-transfer session with relevant MHSC officials.

1.4. EXPECTED OUTCOMES

The expected deliverables are:

- 1.4.1. **Inception Report:** An inception report setting out the confirmed project methodology, work plan, stakeholder engagement approach, data requirements, sampling approach for the pilot, and approach for developing and testing the Impact Evaluation Framework.
- 1.4.2. **Draft Impact Evaluation Framework:** A practical draft framework for evaluating the effectiveness and impact of MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement interventions, including RTFs. The framework must include appropriate evaluation criteria, indicators, methodologies, minimum data requirements, data collection tools, assessment methods and reporting templates.
- 1.4.3. **TMM Pilot Evaluation Report:** A report on the application of the draft framework to the TMM collision prevention regulatory requirements under Regulation 8.10. The report must present findings on implementation, effectiveness and impact, based on available evidence, including key barriers, enabling factors, data limitations and lessons learnt. The report must also assess the practicality and suitability of the framework and identify areas requiring refinement.

- 1.4.4. **Final Impact Evaluation Framework and User Guide:** A refined Impact Evaluation Framework incorporating findings and lessons from the TMM pilot, together with practical guidance, indicators, tools and templates to enable its future application across the MHSC research, legislative and stakeholder engagement portfolio, including RTFs.
- 1.4.5. **Final Report and Implementation Roadmap:** A final report consolidating the project findings, conclusions and recommendations, together with a practical roadmap for the future application and institutionalisation of the Impact Evaluation Framework within the MHSC. The service provider must also present the final framework, TMM pilot findings, recommendations and implementation roadmap to the MHSC and facilitate a knowledge-transfer session with relevant MHSC officials.

1.5. CONTRACT PERIOD

The project should be undertaken over a period of 9 months, with 6 months allocated to project activities, and the remaining 3 months dedicated to MHSC administrative and close-out activities.

1.6. SPECIAL CONDITIONS: EXPERIENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS

The service provider must have at least 5 years' experience in conducting applied research. The project team must have members with the following expertise and qualifications:

1.6.1. Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Specialist (Project Leader)

The Project Lead will be responsible for the overall methodology, framework development, quality assurance and delivery of the project. The Project Lead must:

- Possess a Masters qualification in Monitoring and Evaluation, Evaluation Studies, Research, Public Policy or a related field.
- Have at least 10 years' experience in developing and applying monitoring, evaluation and impact assessment frameworks, including designing indicators, evaluation methodologies, data collection tools and reporting frameworks, and managing evaluation or research projects.

1.6.2. Mining Health and Safety Specialist

The specialist will ensure that the framework and pilot appropriately address the mining health and safety and regulatory context. The specialist must:

- 
- Possess at least a Masters qualification in mining, occupational health and safety, engineering or a related field.
 - Have at least 10 years' experience in mine health and safety within the mining sector.

1.6.3. Additional Experience (Advantageous)

- Knowledge and experience in implementation science or implementation evaluation approaches, including assessing implementation, uptake, barriers, enabling factors and sustainability of interventions.
- Experience in evaluating the impact and uptake of research outcomes and recommendations.
- Knowledge of mining legislation, regulations, and industry best practices related to occupational health and safety.
- Demonstrated ability to engage with multiple stakeholders, including industry representatives, organised labour, regulators, researchers, and government entities.
