

APPOINTMENT OF TRANSACTIONAL ADVISORS ON A MULTI-APPOINTMENT BASIS TO SUPPORT REVENUE-GENERATING INITIATIVES FOR TRADE AND INVESTMENT KWAZULU-NATAL IN LINE WITH THE ENTITY'S ACT AND THE PUBLIC FINANCE MANAGEMENT ACT (PFMA).

REFERENCE NUMBER: 3410/2026/03

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1. INTRODUCTION AND PROJECT BACKGROUND

- 1.1. Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal is a South African trade and inward investment promotion agency, established as a Schedule 3C public entity, to promote the province of KwaZulu-Natal as an investment destination and to facilitate trade by assisting local companies to access international markets. In terms of the Public Finance Management Act, Act No 1 of 1999 as amended (PFMA), Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal must fully comply with all the requirements of the PFMA and all other relevant and applicable legislation.
- 1.2. Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal is governed by the KwaZulu-Natal Trade and Investment Agency Act, 2010 (Act No. 05 of 2010). In terms of Chapter 2, Section 4 (1) and (2) of the KwaZulu-Natal Trade and Investment Act, the main functions of the entity are to:
 - Identify, develop, market, and promote investment opportunities in the province to international and domestic investors.
 - Develop the export capacity of the province.
 - Develop the export market of the province.
 - Foster trade and investment within the province.
 - Develop a provincial investment and export plan for the development, promotion and marketing of inward investments and exports from the province; and
 - Keep and maintain a database of investment opportunities within the province in such a manner as to benefit all sectors of the economy.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 TIKZN is fully funded by the KwaZulu-Natal Department of Economic Development, Tourism, and Environmental Affairs (EDTEA), which serves as its sole shareholder. At present, TIKZN does not have independent revenue-generating streams and is not financially self-sufficient. While there is an approved agreement for EDTEA to fund its operational costs, there is a growing need for the agency to generate additional revenue beyond the allocated funding.
- 2.2 As a result, TIKZN seeks to appoint five (5) qualified and experienced Transactional Advisors on a multi-appointment basis to support the structuring, funding mobilisation, and implementation of revenue-generating initiatives, thereby strengthening the organisation's capacity to unlock investment, secure sustainable funding, and accelerate the execution of priority projects.
- 2.3 Given that TIKZN primarily relies on grants from EDTEA, it has been established that these funds are insufficient to cover all operational expenses. As a result, an alternative approach must be explored to secure additional revenue streams.
- 2.4 To achieve this, TIKZN intends to appoint five (5) qualified and experienced Transactional Advisors on a multi-appointment basis to assist in securing funding and supporting the implementation of revenue-generating initiatives.

2.5 The appointed Transactional Advisors will provide specialised support in securing funding, financial structuring, project preparation, legal and commercial advisory, and strategic partnership facilitation in compliance with PFMA Act No 1 of 1999.

3. PROJECT PURPOSE

3.1 The purpose of this Request for Proposal (RFP) is to appoint experienced and qualified Transactional Advisors on a multi-appointment basis to secure funding and facilitate the implementation of revenue-generating initiatives for TIKZN, in a fully outcome-based arrangement with no upfront cost to the Agency.

4. CONTRACT PERIOD

4.1 The appointed Transactional Advisors will be contracted for an initial period of three (3) years, with an option to renew for a further one (1) year, subject to satisfactory performance, project pipeline requirements, and an annual performance review conducted by Trade and Investment KwaZulu-Natal.

5. SCOPE OF SERVICES

5.1. GENERAL SCOPE OF WORK

The appointed Transactional Advisors will be required to undertake the following activities:

5.1.1. Feasibility and Market Assessment

- Conduct comprehensive feasibility and market assessments for proposed initiatives, thereby identifying viable revenue-generating opportunities that align with TIKZN's strategic objectives.
- Evaluate the commercial, financial, and operational viability of each opportunity and develop detailed business cases to support informed decision-making and prioritisation of initiatives

5.1.2. Fundraising and Capital Mobilisation

- Secure funding for TIKZN-approved initiatives through grants or project-specific financing from Development Finance Institutions (DFIs), commercial banks, private investors, donor organisations, and Public-Private Partnerships (PPPs). TIKZN itself cannot take loans or assume debt because, as a Schedule 3C public entity, it is fully funded by the provincial government and may only incur debt with explicit approval from its shareholder (EDTEA) and the Provincial Treasury.
- Provide strategic and financial advisory services to ensure that initiatives are financially sustainable and investment-ready, including the development and negotiation of funding agreements on behalf of TIKZN, in compliance with the Public Finance Management Act (PFMA), Treasury Regulations, and other applicable legislation.

5.1.3. Transaction Structuring

- Manage the structuring of the transaction (financial, legal and commercial structuring).

5.1.4. Compliance and Risk Management

- Provide expert guidance to ensure that all initiatives comply with applicable legislation, including the PFMA and Treasury Regulations.
- Conduct thorough risk assessments, identify potential financial, operational, and legal risks, and propose effective mitigation strategies, and
- Ensure that all transactions and project activities are fully aligned with TIKZN's policies, governance frameworks, and strategic objectives.

6. EXPECTED DELIVERABLES

The appointed Transactional Advisors are expected to deliver the following outputs:

6.1 Funding Commitments – Secured grants, investments, or partnership agreements for TIKZN-approved initiatives.

6.2 Transaction Structures – Financial, legal, and commercial frameworks are developed and finalised in compliance with the PFMA and Treasury Regulations.

6.3 Signed Funding Agreements or Partnership Contracts – demonstrating secured commitments.

6.4 Implementation and Progress Reports – Periodic monthly reports on project progress, challenges, and achieved revenue outcomes.

7. DOCUMENTS TO BE SUPPLIED BY TIKZN

The following documents will be supplied to the appointed Transactional Advisors:

- 7.1 TIKZN Annual reports
- 7.2 TIKZN's founding act and related legislative framework
- 7.3 TIKZN Strategy documents
- 7.4 Board-Approved Revenue-Generating Strategy
- 7.5 Any other documents deemed relevant for the exercise.

8. STRUCTURE OF THE PROPOSAL

The bid must be structured in the following sequence when submitted. Each section/heading must be clearly marked for ease of reference.

The headings required are:

8.1. BIDDER'S PROPOSAL ON APPROACH AND METHODOLOGY

Bidders must submit a detailed proposal outlining their approach and methodology for delivering the required services. The proposal should clearly demonstrate an understanding of TIKZN's mandate, objectives, and funding challenges. At a minimum, the proposal should cover the following:

- 8.1.1 Understanding of the Assignment** – A clear interpretation of TIKZN's revenue-generation objectives, funding needs, and compliance requirements under the PFMA and Treasury Regulations.
- 8.1.2 Proposed Approach** – A step-by-step explanation of how the bidder intends to mobilise funding, structure transactions, and support implementation in a manner that minimises risk to TIKZN.
- 8.1.3 Methodology** – The specific methods, tools, and processes to be applied in identifying funders, securing commitments, negotiating agreements, and ensuring compliance.
- 8.1.4 Work Plan and Timeline** – A practical implementation roadmap, including phases, activities, milestones, and expected timeframes for delivery.
- 8.1.5 Risk Management** – Identification of potential risks (financial, legal, or operational) and proposed mitigation measures to safeguard TIKZN's interests.
- 8.1.6 Value Proposition** – An explanation of the bidder's unique strengths, networks, or innovative approaches that will maximise revenue-generation opportunities for TIKZN.

8.2. BIDDER'S EXPERIENCE AND REFERENCES

Bidders must demonstrate relevant experience and capability to deliver the required services. Bidders should provide:

- 8.2.1 Relevant Experience** – A company track record in fundraising, capital mobilisation, transaction advisory, or similar assignments for public entities, DFIs, private sector clients, or donor-funded programmes. Bidders are required to demonstrate verifiable evidence of funding raised on an accumulative basis, with a minimum threshold of not less than R10 million per qualifying transaction or across aggregated transactions, as applicable.
- 8.2.2 Completed Assignments/ Project Examples** – The bidder must provide at least three (3) examples of comparable assignments successfully completed within the past five (5) years. For each assignment, the bidder must indicate the project scope, contract value, outcomes achieved, and its specific role and responsibilities. The submission must also include contactable references for each assignment, including the reference person's name, designation, organisation, email address, and telephone number.
- 8.2.3 Team Capability** – Profiles of the proposed team members, highlighting qualifications and experience in areas such as finance, legal, investment structuring, and project implementation.

8.3. BIDDERS RESOURCES

Bidders must demonstrate that they have the necessary resources and capacity to execute the assignment effectively. This should include:

- 8.3.1 Human Resources** – A qualified team with expertise in finance, legal, investment structuring, fundraising, and project management. Detailed CVs of key team members must be provided, highlighting their qualifications, relevant experience, and specific roles in this assignment.
- 8.3.2 Technical Resources** – Access to relevant tools, systems, and platforms required for financial modelling, transaction structuring, due diligence, and reporting.
- 8.3.3 Institutional Capacity** – Evidence of organisational capacity to manage multi-stakeholder transactions, including administrative, legal, and compliance support.
- 8.3.4 Network and Partnerships** – Demonstrated relationships with DFIs, investors, donor organisations, and other funding sources that can be leveraged to mobilise financing.

9. PRICING PROPOSAL

The Transactional Advisors' remuneration will be based on a success-fee model. TIKZN will apply a uniform success fee of five per cent (5%) on all funding successfully mobilised, regardless of the amount.

9.1. PRICING

Given that TIKZN has no available funds for upfront payment, the appointed Transactional Advisors will be remunerated entirely based on outcomes, as follows:

9.1.1. Performance-Based Fee

9.1.1.1 A success fee of up to 5% will only be paid once funding has been successfully secured and reached financial close, and the funds have been received by TIKZN.

9.1.1.2 Where deemed appropriate by TIKZN, limited payments may be structured around the achievement of specific, measurable, and verifiable project milestones. However, all such payments shall remain conditional upon the successful conclusion of the transaction, including the securing, financial close, and transfer of funds.

9.1.2. Cost Recovery / Expenses

9.1.3.1 Reasonable out-of-pocket expenses (e.g., travel, due diligence) must be recovered from the funding secured or factored into the success fee.

9.1.3.2 No expenses may be charged to TIKZN's operational budget.

9.1.3. Compliance Requirements

9.1.4.1 All fees and payment structures must comply with the PFMA, Treasury Regulations, and TIKZN's internal financial policies.

9.1.4. Fee Transparency and Reporting

9.1.5.1 The Transactional Advisors must provide clear documentation of fee calculations, including amounts mobilised, percentages applied, and milestone achievements.

9.1.5.2 Reports on fees and expenses must form part of the Transactional Advisor's regular progress reporting to TIKZN.

NB: TIKZN reserves the right to appoint Transactional Advisors on a multi-appointment basis for this bid. Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal reserves the right to negotiate any aspect of the proposed fees and disbursements with the preferred Transactional Advisors.

10. INSTRUCTION TO SERVICE PROVIDERS

10.1 The services required by Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal are described in these Terms of Reference, and therefore, all applicable sections which are listed as mandatory must be comprehensively covered in your proposal.

10.2 TIKZN intends to enter into a formal Service Level Agreement (SLA) with the successful Transactional Advisors on a multi-appointment basis to provide the services described hereunder.

11. COMPULSORY BRIEFING

12. EVALUATION CRITERIA

Evaluation will be carried out on the Functionality and the Preferential Point System (Price and specific goals allocation). The evaluation criteria will consist of the following phases:

13. ALTERATIONS OR WITHDRAWAL OF PROPOSALS

Service Providers may withdraw their proposals by written notification on or before the closing date.

14. COSTS OF PREPARATION OF BID PROPOSAL

The costs incurred by the Service Provider in respect of the attendance of any briefing or presentation meetings or costs incurred in preparing any proposal will be borne by the Service Provider, and Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal **shall in no way** be liable to reimburse the Service Provider for such costs incurred.

15. FEE STRUCTURE

Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal reserves the right to negotiate any aspect of the proposed fees and disbursements with the preferred Service Provider and shall not be bound by the fees and disbursements submitted by any Service Provider.

16. VALUE OF BID

The value of this bid is estimated not to exceed R50 000 000 (all applicable taxes included), and therefore, the 80/20 system shall be applicable.

17. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

Copyright, patent rights and other similar rights in any works or products created as a result of the performance of this tender and its assignments shall vest in and are hereby transferred to TIKZN, unless specifically agreed otherwise, in the form of an individual written Agreement signed by both parties.

For this purpose, all works created in terms of this tender and the assignments thereof shall be deemed to have been created under the control and direction of TIKZN. All information documents, records and books provided by TIKZN to any service provider in connection with the proposal or otherwise are strictly private and confidential. Proposals to any third party shall not be disclosed by them, except with the express consent of TIKZN, which shall be granted in writing before such disclosure. TIKZN, however, reserves the right to disclose any information provided by any service provider to any of the members of TIKZN.

18. TERMINATION OF CONTRACT

TIKZN reserves the right to terminate the award of any tender to any party if there are reasonable grounds for considering that there is non-performance by the contractor in terms of the contract. TIKZN also reserves the right to curtail the scope of any tender awarded or to curtail any aspect of any tender. In the event of any such cancellation or curtailment, the tenderer shall have no claim or recourse against TIKZN, of whatsoever nature, save the recoupment of the tenderer's actual and reasonable costs already expended on the project.

19. OWNERSHIP OF RFP AND PRESENTATIONS

Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal shall, on receipt of any proposal relating to this RFP and submitted in accordance with this RFP procedure, become the owner thereof, and Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal shall not be obliged to return any proposals to Transactional Advisors who request such a return.

20. CONFIDENTIALITY

The entire process of calling for proposals, as initiated by Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal in terms of its procurement policy, is confidential. All deliberations in respect of the acceptability or otherwise of the proposals shall be conducted in closed sessions, and members of the bid evaluation, bid adjudication and procurement committees are bound by confidentiality.

21. ETHICS

Any attempt by a Transactional Advisor to obtain confidential information or enter into unlawful agreements with competitors or influence the Evaluation and/or the bid adjudication and/or Procurement Committee of Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal during the process of examining, evaluating and comparing proposals will lead to the rejection of its proposal in its entirety. The Transactional Advisors must declare any business or other interests it has in Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal or any employee of Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal, failing which the Transactional Advisors shall be automatically disqualified from further participation in the RFP.

22. CANCELLATION OF BID PROCEDURE

Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal shall be entitled, within its sole and entire discretion, to cancel this RFP at any time and shall notify the Transactional Advisors accordingly. Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal shall in no way be liable for any damages whatsoever, including, without limitation, damages for loss of profit, in any way connected with the cancellation of this RFP procedure. The publication of an invitation to call for proposals does not commit Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal to appoint any of the qualifying Transactional Advisors.

23. SERVICE LEVEL AGREEMENT

The acceptance of any proposal shall only be confirmed with the conclusion of a written service level agreement between Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal and the Successful Transactional Advisors, in terms of which the rights and duties of the parties are recorded, which agreement shall regulate the relationship between Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal and the successful Transactional Advisors. Until such a time that an appropriate service level agreement has been concluded between Trade & Investment KwaZulu-Natal and successful Transactional Advisors, no rights shall be conferred, nor shall any legitimate expectations be conferred on the successful Transactional Advisors to carry out the works or services provided for in this call for proposals.

24. SUBMISSION OF PROPOSALS

SECTION G: GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT

1. Definitions

The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:

- 1.1 "Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
- 1.2 "Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
- 1.3 "Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
- 1.4 "Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of anything of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
- 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
- 1.6 "Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
- 1.7 "Day" means calendar day.
- 1.8 "Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
- 1.9 "Delivery ex stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
- 1.10 "Delivery into consignees store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
- 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.
- 1.12 " Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser

in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.

- 1.13 “Fraudulent practice” means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 “GCC” means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 “Goods” means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 “Imported content” means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 “Local content” means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 “Manufacture” means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 “Order” means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 “Project site,” where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 “Purchaser” means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 “Republic” means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 “SCC” means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- 1.24 “Services” means those functional services ancillary to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.

1.25 “Written” or “in writing” means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.

2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.

2.3 Where such special conditions of contract are in conflict with these general conditions, the special conditions shall apply.

3. General

3.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents, the purchaser shall not be liable for any expense incurred in the preparation and submission of a bid. Where applicable a non-refundable fee for documents may be charged.

3.2 With certain exceptions, invitations to bid are only published in the Government Tender Bulletin. The Government Tender Bulletin may be obtained directly from the Government Printer, Private Bag X85, Pretoria 0001, or accessed electronically from www.treasury.gov.za.

4. Standards

4.1. The goods supplied shall conform to the standards mentioned in the bidding documents and specifications.

5. Use of contract documents and information; inspection.

5.1 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, disclose the contract, or any provision thereof, or any specification, plan, drawing, pattern, sample, or information furnished by or on behalf of the purchaser in connection therewith, to any person other than a person employed by the supplier in the performance of the contract. Disclosure to any such employed person shall be made in confidence and shall extend only so far as may be necessary for purposes of such performance.

5.2 The supplier shall not, without the purchaser’s prior written consent, make use of any document or information mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 except for purposes of performing the contract.

5.3 Any document, other than the contract itself mentioned in GCC clause 5.1 shall remain the property of the purchaser and shall be returned (all copies) to the purchaser on completion of the supplier's performance under the contract if so required by the purchaser.

5.4 The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so, required by the purchaser.

6. Patent rights

6.1. The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.

7. Performance security

7.1 Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.

7.2 The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.

7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:

- a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
- a cashier's or certified cheque

7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.

8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.

- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.
- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

- 9.1 The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.

9.2 The packing, marking, and documentation within and outside the packages shall comply strictly with such special requirements as shall be expressly provided for in the contract, including additional requirements, if any, specified in SCC, and in any subsequent instructions ordered by the purchaser.

10. Delivery and documents

10.1 Delivery of the goods shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the terms specified in the contract. The details of shipping and/or other documents to be furnished by the supplier are specified in SCC.

10.2 Documents to be submitted by the supplier are specified in SCC.

11. Insurance

11.1 The goods supplied under the contract shall be fully insured in a freely convertible currency against loss or damage incidental to manufacture or acquisition, transportation, storage and delivery in the manner specified in the SCC.

12. Transportation

12.1 Should a price other than an all-inclusive delivered price be required, this shall be specified in the SCC.

13. Incidental Services

13.1 The supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following services, including additional services, if any, specified in SCC:

- (a) performance or supervision of on-site assembly and/or commissioning of the supplied goods;
- (b) furnishing of tools required for assembly and/or maintenance of the supplied goods;
- (c) furnishing of a detailed operations and maintenance manual for each appropriate unit of the supplied goods;
- (d) performance or supervision or maintenance and/or repair of the supplied goods, for a period of time agreed by the parties, provided that this service shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under this contract; and
- (e) training of the purchaser's personnel, at the supplier's plant and/or on-site, in assembly, start-up, operation, maintenance, and/or repair of the supplied goods.

13.2 Prices charged by the supplier for incidental services, if not included in the contract price for the goods, shall be agreed upon in advance by the parties and shall not exceed the prevailing rates charged to other parties by the supplier for similar services.

14. Spare parts

14.1 As specified in SCC, the supplier may be required to provide any or all of the following materials, notifications, and information pertaining to spare parts manufactured or distributed by the supplier:

- (a) such spare parts as the purchaser may elect to purchase from the supplier, provided that this election shall not relieve the supplier of any warranty obligations under the contract; and
- (b) in the event of termination of production of the spare parts:
 - (i) Advance notification to the purchaser of the pending termination, in sufficient time to permit the purchaser to procure needed requirements; and
 - (ii) following such termination, furnishing at no cost to the purchaser, the blueprints, drawings, and specifications of the spare parts, if requested.

15. Warranty

15.1 The supplier warrants that the goods supplied under the contract are new, unused, of the most recent or current models, and that they incorporate all recent improvements in design and materials unless provided otherwise in the contract. The supplier further warrants that all goods supplied under this contract shall have no defect, arising from design, materials, or workmanship (except when the design and/or material is required by the purchaser's specifications) or from any act or omission of the supplier, that may develop under normal use of the supplied goods in the conditions prevailing in the country of final destination.

15.2 This warranty shall remain valid for twelve (12) months after the goods, or any portion thereof as the case may be, have been delivered to and accepted at the final destination indicated in the contract, or for eighteen (18) months after the date of shipment from the port or place of loading in the source country, whichever period concludes earlier, unless specified otherwise in SCC.

15.3 The purchaser shall promptly notify the supplier in writing of any claims arising under this warranty.

15.4 Upon receipt of such notice, the supplier shall, within the period specified in SCC and with all reasonable speed, repair or replace the defective goods or parts thereof, without costs to the purchaser.

15.5 If the supplier, having been notified, fails to remedy the defect(s) within the period specified in SCC, the purchaser may proceed to take such remedial action as may be necessary, at the supplier's risk and expense and without prejudice to any other rights which the purchaser may have against the supplier under the contract.

16. Payment

- 16.1 The method and conditions of payment to be made to the supplier under this contract shall be specified in SCC.
- 16.2 The supplier shall furnish the purchaser with an invoice accompanied by a copy of the delivery note and upon fulfillment of other obligations stipulated in the contract.
- 16.3 Payments shall be made promptly by the purchaser, but in no case later than thirty (30) days after submission of an invoice or claim by the supplier.
- 16.4 Payment will be made in Rand unless otherwise stipulated in SCC.

17. Prices

- 17.1 Prices charged by the supplier for goods delivered and services performed under the contract shall not vary from the prices quoted by the supplier in his bid, with the exception of any price adjustments authorized in SCC or in the purchaser's request for bid validity extension, as the case may be.

18. Contract amendments

- 18.1 No variation in or modification of the terms of the contract shall be made except by written amendment signed by the parties concerned.

19. Assignment

- 19.1 The supplier shall not assign, in whole or in part, its obligations to perform under the contract, except with the purchaser's prior written consent.

20. Subcontracts

- 20.1 The supplier shall notify the purchaser in writing of all subcontracts awarded under this contract if not already specified in the bid. Such notification, in the original bid or later, shall not relieve the supplier from any liability or obligation under the contract.

21. Delays in the supplier's performance

- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As

soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.

- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.
- 21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without cancelling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

- 22.1 Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for default

- 23.1 The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:
- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;

- (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
- (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.

23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.

23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.

23.5 Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer / Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer / Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer / Authority actively associated.

23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:

- (i) the name and address of the supplier and / or person restricted by the purchaser;
- (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
- (iii) the period of restriction; and
- (iv) the reasons for the restriction.

23.6.1 These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an offence as contemplated in sections 12 or 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No. 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction, and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

24. Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights

24.1 When, after the date of bid, provisional payments are required, or antidumping or countervailing duties are imposed, or the amount of a provisional payment or anti-dumping or countervailing right is increased in respect of any dumped or subsidized import, the State is not liable for any amount so required or imposed, or for the amount of any such increase. When, after the said date, such a provisional payment is no longer required or any such anti-dumping or countervailing right is abolished, or where the amount of such provisional payment or any such right is reduced, any such favourable difference shall on demand be paid forthwith by the contractor to the State or the State may deduct such amounts from moneys (if any) which may otherwise be due to the contractor in regard to supplies or services which he delivered or rendered, or is to deliver or render in terms of the contract or any other contract or any other amount which may be due to him.

25. Force Majeure

25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.

25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

26. Termination for insolvency

26.1 The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of Disputes

- 27.1 If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.
- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
- (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

28. Limitation of liability

- 28.1 Except in cases of criminal negligence or willful misconduct, and in the case of infringement pursuant to Clause 6;
- (a) the supplier shall not be liable to the purchaser, whether in contract, tort, or otherwise, for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, loss of use, loss of production, or loss of profits or interest costs, provided that this exclusion shall not apply to any obligation of the supplier to pay penalties and/or damages to the purchaser; and
 - (b) the aggregate liability of the supplier to the purchaser, whether under the contract, in tort or otherwise, shall not exceed the total contract price, provided that this limitation shall not apply to the cost of repairing or replacing defective equipment.

29. Governing language

- 29.1 The contract shall be written in English. All correspondence and other documents pertaining to the contract that is exchanged by the parties shall also be written in English.

30. Applicable law

30.1 The contract shall be interpreted in accordance with South African laws, unless otherwise specified in SCC.

31. Notices

31.1 Every written acceptance of a bid shall be posted to the supplier concerned by registered or certified mail and any other notice to him shall be posted by ordinary mail to the address furnished in his bid or to the address notified later by him in writing and such posting shall be deemed to be proper service of such notice

31.2 The time mentioned in the contract documents for performing any act after such aforesaid notice has been given, shall be reckoned from the date of posting of such notice.

32. Taxes and duties

32.1 A foreign supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, stamp duties, license fees, and other such levies imposed outside the purchaser's country.

32.2 A local supplier shall be entirely responsible for all taxes, duties, license fees, etc., incurred until delivery of the contracted goods to the purchaser.

32.3 No contract shall be concluded with any bidder whose tax matters are not in order. Prior to the award of a bid the Department must be in possession of a tax clearance certificate, submitted by the bidder. This certificate must be an original issued by the South African Revenue Services.

33. National Industrial Participation (NIP) Programme

33.1 The NIP Programme administered by the Department of Trade and Industry shall be applicable to all contracts that are subject to the NIP obligation.

34. Prohibition of Restrictive practices

34.1 In terms of section 4 (1) (b) (iii) of the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998, as amended, an agreement between, or concerted practice by, firms, or a decision by an association of firms, is prohibited if it is between parties in a horizontal relationship and if a bidder (s) is / are or a contractor(s) was / were involved in collusive bidding (or bid rigging).

34.2 If a bidder(s) or contractor(s), based on reasonable grounds or evidence obtained by the purchaser, has / have engaged in the restrictive practice referred to above, the purchaser may refer the matter to the

Competition Commission for investigation and possible imposition of administrative penalties as contemplated in the Competition Act No. 89 of 1998.
